## CHRISTMAS TREE PICK UP

Salem City will pick up Christmas trees from Wednesday, January 2nd until Friday, January 4th. Please have your tree curbside by 8:00 a.m. on the 2nd. If you miss this pick up, the green waste area will be open from January 7th -11th and you can take your tree there.

**If the phone numbers listed on your utility bill are incorrect, please notify the City Office of your updated information. It is very important that we have your correct information so we can contact you in case of an emergency. Thank you for your cooperation in this matter.**

## SALEM CITY PURCHASING STRAWBERRY WATER SHARES

Beginning in January 2013, Salem City will be purchasing Strawberry water shares for \$650 per acre foot. Because 2012 was a dry year, it is important that we have that water for our pressurized irrigation system so that we can keep our rates as low as possible. If you have not sold your water shares to Salem City and are interested in doing so, please contact the city as soon as possible.



## SNOW REMOVAL POLICY

Salem City's objective is to provide an adequate transportation system for vehicles properly equipped for winter driving conditions. Optimal conditions will be provided as soon as practical after a storm. Certain streets have a higher intensity use and thus have a higher priority for snow removal. Please note that it is not the position of Salem City to maintain a bare pavement policy nor to provide snow and ice removal on every city street during or after every snow storm.

Salem City also asks that residents please keep their sidewalk clear of snow. When you clear out your drive way, if you would push the snow to the left side of the driveway it helps so the snow plow drivers won't push that snow back into your driveway. The Post Office has reminded us that it is the citizen's responsibility to clear the snow away at their mail-boxes. **Also please remove your empty garbage can from the curb as soon as possible after it is dumped. Garbage cans on the street hamper snow plowing efforts. Please remove all basketball standards and similar items from the city streets during the winter months.**

The Public Safety Department would like to also remind you to be aware of the snow plows. The plows are trying their best to clean the roads but you are responsible to watch out for them. **Please drive cautiously!**

### Senior Spotlight

A man of many talents, abilities, and capabilities is Don Cole. With his wife, Jane Ann (Beck) Cole, he has accomplished a great deal and I suspect they might not be through. Both graduated the same year from Spanish Fork High School and they got married shortly after. To help Don get through college, Jane Ann went to work at Glades Drive In and during this time they had their first child and they refer to him as their "French fry baby". She also taught piano and organ lessons. It's a good bet that a good share of the long time members of Salem that play the piano or organ were taught by her. There was no work so Don joined the National Guard and during that time he became an officer and eventually became a Bird Colonel and then after more time, he became the Commanding Officer of the Utah National Guard—Impressive. Don has also worked for the Bureau of Land Management and received his Masters Degree in Civil Engineering and started his own land survey business. He wrote his thesis on the study of underground water in this area and helped all the cities locally on where to drill for water and how deep they would have to go down. He also designed the half million gallon water tank that we still use and will for a long time to come. He was the City Engineer for Salem and Payson cities.



During his tenure as Utah National Guard Commander, Jane was the president of the Ladies Association of the National Guard. After she left, other women have tried to fill the job but were unable to make it work and that function has fallen by the wayside. Through all of Don's many endeavors, Jane has always been his biggest supporter and their three sons have all honorably served our country in the military. Don & Jane Ann have 8 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren.

Don retired from the National Guard in 1986 and from the Bureau of Reclamation in 1987. Now they like to spend time with their family, all of whom live less than ten miles away. They like to travel, and have made several trips to Alaska (always with his fishing pole) and many fishing trips to Montana. They love Salem. This has always been home for them. Their bedroom now is about 50 feet from his bedroom in the house where he grew up. However, the warmer winter temperature of Arizona is getting more and more inviting.



Don would seriously like to encourage all adults who have a trade or vocation to be a mentor to the youth. Help someone to see it's better to work toward something productive. Help them set goals and how to work toward them rather than possibly doing nothing and getting in trouble. He had such a mentor who taught him the basics of civil engineering and how to land survey. It sure worked for him and ... who knows????

Indoor Soccer

4 divisions will be offered this year for youth that want to play indoor 4vs.4 indoor soccer. Games will be played Saturdays. **Schedule will not conflict with the same age group of basketball.** The 4 vs. 4 format is set up to stimulate passing and quick ball movements. No goalie is allowed to simulate scoring and scoring attempts. It is a fast paced sport, similar to South American Futsal. Cost per participate is \$30.00 a team indoor soccer t-shirt will be include in the registration cost. A \$5.00 non-resident fee will be charged for this program. Division will be: Kindergarten, 1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup> grade, 3<sup>rd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> grades, 5<sup>th</sup> & 6<sup>th</sup> grades. New this year we will also offer a 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> grade league.

**SOARING HOOPSTERS BASKETBALL** will be available for boys and girls who are in 1st & 2nd grade. This is a clinic style introductory program using fun activities to teach proper mechanics and skills. The program helps young players progress in their basketball development. This 5 week program will begin Jan. 8th at Salem Elementary School. Sessions will be held on Tuesday & Thursdays for one hour. There will be two sessions to choose from, either 6:00 or 7:00 p.m. 32 spots are available in each session. **Cost is \$30 (includes T-shirt) Space is limited so be sure to register early.**

Salem January Hunter Safety

We are excited to offer a January course for youth (10 and older) and adults that need to take Hunter Safety. This course will be held on Tuesday and Thursday evenings 6 P.M. – 8 P.M, for 6 dates.. Shooting range will be assigned January 26<sup>th</sup>. Class will begin Thursday, **January 3rd - 2013** and will be held at the **Salem Civic Center. All Participants must register at the Salem Recreation Office, and pay a \$10.00 registration fee.

Once registered participants will be required to purchase a Hunter Safety Voucher/License prior to first class. Licenses may be purchased for \$10.00 at any location that sells hunting licenses.
