Our city employees did a great job preparing the sites and cleaning up afterwards to ensure our city looked beautiful for the celebration.

I'd like to take a minute to express a concern the City Council and I still have over our water conditions for the balance of this year. We have several weeks left in our water season and as long as I have been involved in the city, I have never seen our springs at Water Canyon as low as they are. I have never seen our well at Maple Canyon draw down so far and take so long to recharge so we can start pumping again. We need your help and support to only water on the days and times that are specified and if you don't you will be cited and that's fine too. We have doing a lot road work the last 40 days and we appreciate the citizens that complied with the requests so we could repair our roads. With the approval of our City Council, I have reached out to some members of our community to put together a pond quality committee to help secure the safety and beauty of our pond. We will be meeting with different individuals who deal with water quality issues as well as the State Board of Health, County Board of Health as well others who can assist us in keeping our pond the unique landmark that our city is known for. I will let you know as we get testing results and recommendations from the experts on this project. We did get the results from the test done on some of the ducks that had died in our pond. I would encourage all of you to read the results on our City website www.salemcity.org

I would like to thank the City Council for their diligence in making sure that developers turn over the required water shares to the City before they begin their projects, and making sure that it is useable water for our community. This is a must and we need to make sure that it continues to happen so we have water secured for future needs.

Now that the new school year has begun, I would like to remind our citizens to be aware of the many students that we have on the walkways and roadways going to and from school. Please pay special attention to speed limits, and crosswalks as our children go to the school activities. This is all of our jobs to make sure the children of Salem are safe and our Police Department and I could use your help in doing so.

I want to thank you for keeping Salem, the City of Peace and I hope you have a good and safe fall.

Acceptable Discharges.

The rule of thumb is; "If you don't drink it, don't dump it," but there are a few exceptions to what you can safely and legally discharge into a storm drain other than storm water;

- Lawn and Landscape Irrigation Runoff * Foundation and Footing Drain Flow * Water from Non-Commercial Car Washing * Water Main Flushing * Diverted Stream Flows * Pumped Groundwater * Air Conditioning Condensate * Water from Crawl Space Pumps * Residual Street Washing Waters * Discharges from Potable Water Sources * Residential, De-Chlorinated Pool Discharges * Flows from Emergency Fire Fighting Activities

We'd like to introduce you to Beverly Faretta. She was born December 12, 1931. She was born and raised in the family home at 555 East 200 South, Provo. Her parents were Ervin and Minnie Bell Brailsford. They lived in this home until she was 12, then they moved up Provo Canyon. She attended Provo High School until the Tenth Grade, then she moved to Ely, Nevada and graduated from high school there. She is the third to the oldest with two older sisters and one younger sister and four younger brothers.

She met her first husband, Leon Choate, in Ely. She said he had been watching her and asked her for a date. He was a very handsome man. Leon worked in Kennecott, Nevada in the mills. They were married and lived there for 9 years. After being on strike for 3 months they moved to Spanish Fork where they lived for 18 years. Leon was a brick mason by trade. They had three boys: Brent Leon (Janice), Spanish Fork; David Wayne (deceased); Steven (Larene), Spanish Fork. She has 6 grandchildren and 1 great grandchild.

When she was 15 she worked a couple of summers at a café in Provo. She wore roller skates while taking the orders and serving the food. She also worked for Keely's Candy Company in Provo. After she was married and they moved to Spanish Fork she started to work at the Utah State Hospital in Provo as a Psych Tech. She was responsible to hire employees for that unit. She worked there for 29 years. During this time her husband, Leon, passed away. She met her husband, Dan Faretta, who was working at the hospital also. He had moved here from Chicago to be near one of his daughters, who was attending BYU. With this marriage she gained 10 step-children. She said Dan served in the Navy during WWII, but he never did learn to swim. After they were married they lived in Spanish Fork for 4 years then they moved to Salem. They have lived here for 27 years. Dan passed away this last March.

While Dan was alive they loved to travel and have visited, Mexico, Canada, Alaska and several of the other States. She loves to go camping, deer and elk hunting. She said when she was 8 she would go deer hunting with her dad. She loves being out in nature and especially loved fishing with Dan. She cheers the Jazz Basketball Team on.

Don't feed her pomegranates, spinach, Swiss chard, or beet greens. But she loves homemade noodles especially in chicken and noodles. And she likes a good gravy. Her talents are crocheting, quilting, reading, and when she was younger she would draw portraits of people or just doodle. She likes the quiet streets of Salem. She enjoys going to the Senior Citizen Center and seeing her friends. She loves to be around older people. She said they have so much to offer.
