## Coming Construction Projects

**Pages Lane:** Currently underway between 800 West and I-15, this project involves upgrading a 50 year old water line and increasing storm drainage capacity. A grant from UDOT will fund curb construction where it is currently missing and dedicated bicycle lanes on both sides of the street. The City is also filling in gaps of sidewalk on both sides of the street to improve access to the park. The road will remain open through the project, but please slow down and be careful. Construction should finish up in time for Independence Day festivities.

**Basketball Court:** A grant from the Utah Jazz/LHM Charities is helping fund a new regulation-size basketball court to be constructed in the City Park this spring. The court will have six adjustable height baskets and be located near the new playground and north parking lot.

**500 South water line:** There is a 60 year old water line under 500 South in Bountiful which serves as a main water feed for our city. Late this summer, the City plans to replace the aged pipe. The new pipe will be larger than the existing pipe, which will improve fire flow capabilities. Because of other sources, this project should not affect day-to-day water delivery.

**UDOT 400 North:** UDOT will replace the surface of 400 North between Main Street in Bountiful and 800 West in our city. This project will take the entire summer to complete. Work between 500 West and I-15 will be delayed until June to give the City as much time as possible to complete Pages Lane. Construction west of I-15 will not begin until July and will take roughly sixty days to complete.

## Council Spotlight: Andrew Williams



## PUBLIC WORKS: WATER EDUCATION

### Why Cross Connection is Harmful

Anytime a pipe from another water system is connected to a drinking water system, it is considered a cross connection. The most common cross connection is when a secondary irrigation system (such as Weber Basin) is connected to house water. Sometimes this connection is on accident, but it's usually intentionally connected so a property owner can water a yard before irrigation water is turned on or after it is turned off. This is a huge health risk to everyone in the city.

Weber Basin's irrigation water system operates at a higher water pressure than the city's drinking water system. If the two systems were connected, irrigation water could flow into our system. Water from the Weber Basin system is not safe to drink. The result would be a "boil order" for all residents until the connection could be located,



disconnected, and the city water system disinfected.

Unfortunately, the cross connections are usually not detected until after someone has become ill.



Connecting chemical systems such as weed killer, pesticides or liquid fertilizer to the water system in the house can also create a cross connection.

All water systems constructed since 1990 have a backflow preventer built in with the water meter. These backflow preventers keep house water from flowing back into the rest of the city system. The backflow preventer provides a measure of safety for city residents, but it does nothing to protect persons living in a house where a cross connection exists.

The hose bibs for homes built after 1990 also have an anti-siphon, at-

Please make sure your valves are shut no later than April 1 to prevent flooding and wasting water.

### Back-Flow Class

Required annual testing of all back-flow assemblies is coming up! Back-flow protection is required on home sprinkler irrigation systems that use city water and do not have atmospheric vacuum breaker (AVB) sprinkler valves. Businesses are evaluated on a case by case basis. More information is available at our annual back-flow class on Wednesday, June 1 from 7-8 pm at city hall. Backflow test reports are due back to the city by June 30, 2016.

mospheric vacuum breaker. Hose bibs without an anti-siphon device can cause cross contamination. For houses constructed prior to 1990, a new hose bib can be purchased at any hardware store for a few dollars and replaced.

Fortunately, the city's water system has never been compromised by a cross contamination.

### Weed Abatement Resident Responsibility

We love the beautiful spring and summer weather in West Bountiful, but with it comes something we don't love—WEEDS. Section 8.12.020 of the West Bountiful Nuisance Ordinance declares the following to be nuisances:

**"Noxious Weeds."** Noxious weeds located on vacant lots or other property, along public sidewalks or the outer edge of any public street, or weeds in any other location which constitute a fire hazard.

**"Vegetation."** Dead, decayed, diseased, or hazardous tree, weeds, hedges, and overgrown

or uncultivated vegetation which is in a hazardous condition, is an obstruction to pedestrian or vehicular traffic, or which is likely to harbor rats, vermin or other pests.

Please keep your property maintained, and if you own a vacant lot, please check it often to make sure there is not a problem.

**If properties fall into violation and are not addressed after being noticed, fines of \$100 per day may be assessed.**

### Flood Maps Available

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) assists individuals and communities in the event of natural disaster. FEMA also evaluates flooding potentials. The flood potential from natural drainages is shown on Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) for the more developed areas across the United States, including our community. The FIRM maps are available for review at city hall and at any Davis County Library. Anyone interested in reviewing the FIRM maps can contact the city.

FRIDAY, APRIL 8, 2016 - 7 PM



## Free Tax Prep Help

The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program offers free tax help to people who generally make \$54,000 or less, persons with disabilities, the elderly and limited English speaking taxpayers who need assistance in preparing their own tax returns. IRS-certified volunteers provide free basic income tax return preparation with electronic filing to qualified individuals.

There is also free tax preparation online at [UtahTaxHelp.org](http://UtahTaxHelp.org) for those who earn \$62,000 or less.

In addition to VITA, the Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) program offers free tax help for all taxpayers, particularly those who are 60 years of age and older, specializing in questions about pensions and retirement-related issues unique to seniors. The IRS-certified volunteers who provide tax counseling are often retired individuals associated with non-profit organizations that receive grants from the IRS.



## Lt. Hamilton: Protect Our Youth

As I prepare to wrap up my career in law enforcement, I have given a lot of thought to what advice I could give to help protect the children and youth of our wonderful community. We are fortunate to be in a neighborhood where, for the most part, our children are safe and well cared for, but certain dangers exist and can even make it into our homes if we are not careful. Please let me share with you a few things I hope every parent or grandparent will take a moment to think about:

- ***Have you set rules and boundaries regarding electronic devices and social media with your youth?*** The best protection you can give is to talk with your kids often about what is OK and what is not.
- ***Do you know who your children communicate with on their electronic devices?*** I strongly encourage you to read their texts and posts, and
- ***Do you know every app that is on your child's/teen's phone/tablet?*** Apps that allow youth to share pictures and texts, or even worse, hide things, can present real dangers. - ***How well do you know your children's friends and their friend's parents?*** Staying involved with your kids' friends in both the physical and virtual worlds can help everyone be more comfortable and safe.
