CHAPTER 2

FROM A TOWN TO A CITY

On February 21, 1924, a meeting of the citizens of the Lindon First Ward was held in the Lindon First Ward Meeting House under the direction of Bishop A. L. Cullimore. The purpose of the meeting was to commence proceedings to incorporate Lindon into a town for the purpose of installing a water system. The town now had a population of 455 people and it was necessary for the health and welfare of the people to have an adequate water supply and system.

The motion to incorporate was made by J. D. Wadley and seconded by Albert Anderson. It carried by a large majority. J. D. Wadley and Albert Anderson were named as a committee of two to secure the necessary information regarding the formation of a town.

A committee of four was named to investigate the cost of a water-works system. They were Benjamin Walker, J. D. Wadley, Sr., A. L. Cullimore, and R. M. Rogers.

A committee of nine ladies was appointed to advertise meetings to hear the results of the two committees. They were Maude Brown, Lizzie Cullimore, Eva Thorne, Etta Fowlke, Kate Rogers, Viola Fage, Dahlia Walker, Idella Cobbley and Hattie Bezzant.

Albert L. Cullimore was not only a spiritual leader in Lindon, but also a great civic leader. As a businessman, he had the foresight to see the need for and advantages of incorporating and becoming a town. As the people of Lindon came into his store, he talked to them and encouraged them to be informed and take an active and interested part in this civic venture that would help Lindon progress as other towns of the area were doing. Spurred on by his civic pride, Albert Cullimore rallied the people together and the town of Lindon came into being, with a town president, a four-man board of trustees, and a town clerk-treasurer.



The second meeting was held on February 28, 1924, at which time it was reported that the requirements to incorporate were: that 300 citizens must reside in said district and the majority must sign the petition, which they did and the said petition was filed with the County Commission asking for the privilege of incorporating the town.

The waterworks committee reported that a water system would cost about \$38,000.00 and that the town could bond for 12% of its assessed valuation. The assessed valuation of the town at that time was \$591,000.00. Also, in order to secure Dry Canyon Springs for the source of the town water supply, a petition was circulated for subscriptions to secure the option on the springs. This was done and on June 15, 1924, the town paid \$7,500.00 to Bird and Jex, the owners of Dry Canyon Springs.

The County Commission approved the petition to incorporate and on March 5, 1924, a town meeting was held for the purpose of electing a town president and a town board of trustees. Their term of office was to be two years. Nominations were from the floor and the voting was by secret ballot.

Albert Anderson was elected the first town president with trustees C. J. Cobbley, D. B. Thorne, W. C. Brown, and A. E. Cobbley. Robert Walker was appointed town clerk and treasurer.

At this same meeting the motion was made that the spelling of the town be Lindon instead of Linden. The motion carried.

All of the above information is recorded on pages 1 and 2 of the Lindon Town Records for 1924, as is the fact that the first town board meeting was held at the home of Albert Anderson.

The town board meetings were held at the homes of the members until about 1934. From then until 1942 they were held at Lindon School. After that time they were held at the town clerk's home until the present city building was completed in February 1967. Since that time the city council meetings have been held there.

On Saturday, May 24, 1924, a special bond election was held to vote for the issuance of \$45,000.00 worth of waterworks bonds for the purpose of acquiring a sufficient water supply and constructing and installing a waterworks system for the town. Fifty-nine votes were cast--fifty-two for and seven against.

Jesse M. Walker was appointed city engineer for the supervising of installation of the water system. Land on the east foothills of Lindon four rods square was purchased from Leonard Walker for \$50.00 to put the storage tank on.

And thus began the town of Lindon which has continued to grow from the few scattered families that made up "Stringtown" to its present population of approximately 3,000 people (1983).

In April of 1950 Lindon had a population of 801 people. This citizenry of Lindon presented a petition to the governor to become a third-

class city--a proposal which was granted on November 8, 1951. At this change, the town president's title became that of mayor and the town board became the city council. Along with the changes in titles came the rather unfortunate side effects of growth--more costly and complicated government.

It is interesting to know which of the residents of Lindon have contributed their time and energy to the making and running of a city, because public service is a job that is never fully appreciated. Following is a list of the public officials who have served the Town and City of Lindon. To them we raise our hats.




Officials re-elected for 1926-27

Albert Anderson, town president. C. J. Cobbley, D. B. Thorne, W. C. Brown, and A. E. Cobbley as trustees.

Robert Walker was re-appointed as town clerk and treasurer.

At this time the salary of the town president was \$40.00 per year, the trustees \$25.00 per year, and the town clerk and treasurer \$75.00 per year.

Leonard Fryer served as the first Lindon town marshal and pound keeper. J. D. Wadley was appointed in August 1927 as the first justice of the peace.

Officials elected for 1928-29

Albert Anderson, town president. D. B. Thorne, C. J. Cobbley, A. E. Cobbley, and Fred Culmer as trustees.

Robert Walker was re-appointed town clerk and treasurer.

Officials elected for 1930-31

Charles J. Cobbley, town president. Albert Anderson, Albert Cobbley, Royal Hooley, and Robert Walker as trustees.

Floyd A. Walker was appointed as town clerk and treasurer.

The above group was re-elected in 1932-33.

Officials elected for 1934-35

Ed Lewis, Sr. town president. Leonard S. Walker, Lafayette Wright, Robert Walker, and George Fage as trustees.

Marlin Dittmore was appointed town clerk and treasurer. He resigned on May 8, 1934, and William H. Dittmore was appointed in his place and also acted as justice of the peace.

Lafayette Wright resigned in November 1935, and M. R. Rogers was appointed to take his place on the board.

Officials elected for 1936-37

Robert Walker, town president. Albert Anderson, William Hooley, Wrenard Tomlinson, and Clarence Wright as trustees.

William H. Dittmore was re-appointed as town clerk and treasurer.

Officials elected for 1938-39

Jesse K. Thorne, town president. Richard Cullimore, Reed Gillman, Wrenard Tomlinson, and Joseph Wadley as trustees.

William H. Dittmore was re-appointed as town clerk and treasurer.

Officials elected for 1940-41

Jesse K. Thorne, town president. Richard Cullimore, Reed Gillman, Arnold Hooley, and Clarence Wright as trustees.

William H. Dittmore was re-appointed as town clerk and treasurer.

It is interesting to note here that three women entered this election. Mary B. Fage ran for town president, and Annie Kirk and Hattie Bezzant ran for trustees. They each received one vote.

Alroy Gillman, town president. Albert Anderson, Joseph Ash, Arnold Hooley, and C.C. Wright as trustees.

Verland Johnson was appointed town clerk and treasurer.

Albert Anderson resigned in September 1942, and George Lovell was appointed to take his place.

On July 9, 1943, a committee headed by Jesse K. Thorne asked that the town of Lindon seek

annexation with the city of Pleasant Grove. This has been proposed several times since then, but the people have a strong loyalty for their town and always reject the suggestion for annexation.

Officials elected for 1944-45

Alroy Gillman, town president. Joseph Ash, Arnold Hooley, C. C. Wright, and George Lovell as trustees.

Verland Johnson was re-appointed town clerk and treasurer.

Alroy Gillman was made bishop of the Lindon Ward in September 1944 and asked to resign his position as town president. The trustees appointed Arnold Hooley to act as town board president to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Gillman. In November 1944, Joseph Christiansen was appointed to fill the vacancy on the town board.

Officials elected for 1946-47

Arnold Hooley, town president. Joseph Christiansen, Kenneth R. Gillman, Oliver Johnson, and Clarence Wright as trustees.

Verland Johnson was re-appointed as town clerk and treasurer.


A note in the town minutes dated January 1947 indicated they could not find anyone to be the road and water superintendent because the pay was only 75¢ an hour and no one wanted the job. They raised the wages to 90¢ an hour, hoping to attract someone.

Officials elected
for 1948-49

LeGrande Ercanbrack, town president. Leonard Walker, Joseph Swenson, Albert Nielsen, and Fred Hoffman, trustees.

Verland Johnson was reappointed town clerk and treasurer, and Helois Johnson was appointed as deputy clerk and treasurer.

In March 1948, Albert Nielsen moved from Lindon and resigned from the board of trustees. Kenneth R. Gillman was appointed to fill the vacancy.

In October 1948, due to the death of Verland Johnson, Helois Johnson was appointed to take his place as town clerk and treasurer.

Because of the rapid growth of the town, a building code and zoning ordinances were needed to keep building in order. The first seven-man planning board was appointed in September of 1948.

In October 1949 a new ordinance was passed dealing with elections. The town president was to be elected for a four-year term, two board members for a four-year term, and two board members for a two-year term. Two years later two board members would be elected for a four-year term. All board members would be elected for four-year terms thereafter as their terms expired.

Officials elected for 1950-54

W. D. Chapman, town president. Victor Vicklund and Oliver Johnson each for a four-year term, and Alroy Gillman and Joseph Swenson for two-year terms.

Helois Johnson was re-appointed town clerk and treasurer.

It was during W. D. Chapman's term in office that Lindon became a third-class city. By virtue of his position as town president, Mr. Chapman became the first mayor of Lindon.

Councilmen elected in 1952

Harold Keetch and Reif Wadley. At this point a fifth council member was appointed--Oscar Lee Swenson.

Officials elected for 1954-58

Harold Keetch, mayor. Verl Christiansen, Ray Walker, and Kenneth R. Gillman as council members.

Victor Vicklund was appointed to fill the vacancy on the council left when Harold Keetch was elected mayor.

Cecil Bullock was appointed recorder, and Hazel J. Bullock was appointed treasurer. They resigned in July 1954, and Harold Erickson was appointed recorder and Elvie Erickson treasurer.

Councilmen elected in 1956

Ivan Blain and Owen Hooley.

Officials elected for 1958-62

Harold Keetch, mayor. Lee Swenson and Joseph Christiansen as council members.

Harold and Elvie Erickson were re-appointed as recorder and treasurer respectively.

Councilmen elected in 1960

Ray Walker, Lowell Gillman, and Paul Christofferson.

In May 1960, Charles Rodeback was appointed to fill the vacancy of Paul Christofferson, who moved away from Lindon.

Joseph Christiansen, mayor. Gordon Taylor and Ivan Walker as council members.

Orval Davis was appointed to fill the vacancy of Ray Walker for the last two years of his term.

Harold and Elvie Erickson were re-appointed as recorder and treasurer.

Councilmen elected in 1964

Lowell Gillman, Lon Hooley, and Dean Adams.

Officials elected for 1966-70

Joseph Christiansen, mayor. Nyle Harris and Leon Walker as council members.

Harold and Elvie Erickson were re-appointed as recorder and treasurer.

Councilmen elected in 1968

Glen Lewis, Paul Fage, and Lon Hooley.

Officials elected for 1970-74

Stanley H. Walker, mayor. Dale Gillman, Wendy Jarvis as council members.

Reed Walker was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Glen Lewis.

During this period, plans for a sewer system were formulated. It was determined to contract with Orem City for sewage treatment since Pleasant Grove's plant was overloaded and unable to handle Lindon's needs. The North Utah County Sewer District was in the early stages of organization and to join them would be more costly and time consuming.

Councilmen elected in 1972

Wayne Peay, LeRoy (Sam) Fryer, and Darrell Frampton.

It is interesting to note here that Albert Anderson and Robert Walker each gave fourteen years of public service. Joseph Christiansen served for fifteen years, and Harold and Elvie Erickson served for eighteen years in their positions as recorder and treasurer. Many others have given eight and ten years of service, but the above were mentioned because of the length of time they served Lindon City.

Officials elected for 1974-78

Willard Johnson, mayor. Douglas Johnson and Wayne Johnson, councilmen.

Harold and Elvie Erickson were re-appointed as recorder and treasurer.

Councilmen elected for 1976-80

Brian Pead, Nyal Smith, and J. Var Gillman. In February 1977 Mayor Johnson's work took him to Taiwan. Councilman Douglas Johnson was appointed mayor pro-tem. Mayor Johnson returned in November 1977 and resumed his mayoral duties.

In August 1977, William D. Williams was hired as city administrator at a salary of \$15,000 per year plus reimbursement of moving expenses of \$1000.00.

Officials elected for 1978-82


Tyler H. Rogers, Mayor. Theodore A. Norman and Orval H. Mecham as councilmen.

On June 13, 1978, William D. Williams was fired as city administrator for appropriating city funds for his personal use.

Mark R. Palesh was appointed city administrator on July 1, 1978.

Councilmen elected for 1980-84

Edward G. Winters, LeRoy Jacklin, and Dennis L. Thompson.

On October 13, 1980, Mayor Tyler H. Rogers resigned. Theodore A. Norman was appointed mayor pro-tem until a new mayor was chosen. Later that same month, on October 30, 1980, Leon R. Walker was appointed mayor to fill the unexpired term of Mayor Rogers.


Officials elected for 1982-86

Kenneth D. McMillan, mayor. E. Ray Brown and William C. Johanson, councilmen.


In September 1982 Mark R. Palesh resigned as city administrator.

On September 15, 1982, Councilman Dennis Thompson resigned to spend his sabbatical year in Scotland.

Wendyl L. Jarvis was asked, on October 1, 1982, to serve as temporary city administrator, and in that same month Diane Hacking was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Dennis Thompson.

Wendyl L. Jarvis was appointed city administrator/recorder effective the first of January 1983.

In June 1983, Edward G. Winters resigned and moved to Arizona. The following month Dennis L. Thompson, who had returned from his sabbatical leave, was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Edward G. Winters.

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In searching the minutes kept of the proceedings of Lindon's various municipal government administrations, many human interest stories were found entwined in the history thus recorded. There is a generous helping of humor, a rich mixture of the foibles of humanity, some pathos, some examples of poignancy, even a little skull-duggery--all the things that are found in a normal, healthy small community. Most notable, however, is the great amount of unselfish devotion to community service exemplified by the majority of those whose names are recorded in this account. The notations that follow add a little more to the human side of this history and help illuminate the contributions of so many individuals.

The following information on public safety has been taken from the minutes of the city council meetings.

21 June 1952

Minutes of a special meeting of the Lindon City Council and the special road committee held at the Lindon Church indicated plans for oiling the roads and means of financing were under way. Subsequent council meeting minutes referred to road oiling, but the first indication that some roads were oiled appears in the 13 Oct. 1954 council minutes where reference is made to a county bill to Lindon City for \$8,450.98 to pay for oiling 15,000 feet of Lindon City roads.

11 November 1954

Council minutes indicated the road oiling project would be bypassed next year. Subsequent minutes mention borrowing money to surface more roads, having difficulty collecting road oiling assessments, and liening property of those who were delinquent. The minutes suggested the County Road Commission be contacted to help on streets.

13 August 1959

T. Val Christiansen presented a bill for \$3,011.00 for blacktopping a section of 400 North and 200 East Streets.

All the roads in Lindon City are now oiled that are an approved width. In the fall of 1980, safety walkways were installed along the main roads leading to the Lindon schools. Some of the Lindon students now attend the new Aspen Elementary School on the Orem-Lindon boundary. During 1983, safety walkovers were installed leading to Aspen School. These walkways are enjoyed not only by the school students but also by the citizens of the community as they walk, jog, run, and ride bicycles.

* * * * *

The Volunteer Fire Department from Pleasant Grove provides the fire protection for Lindon City. They were, at an earlier period of the city's history, paid a set amount for each fire. At the present time Lindon City pays an annual fee for this service. From the city council minutes we read:

30 October 1950

First mention in council minutes of a discussion on fire hydrants. Locations were determined.

9 November 1950

Hydrant cooperation between Lindon and Orem was proposed.

29 December 1950

Valves and materials for fire hydrants were recorded as being on hand. Subsequent minutes allude to the installation of hydrants by 11 January 1951.

13 September 1951

Reference was made to a volunteer fire department--a trailer carrying a fire hose being the only fire equipment. Pleasant Grove was still the city's basic fire protection.

14 April 1960

The minutes report four fire hydrants were installed at a cost of \$60.00 each.

5 September 1963

Five fire hydrants were authorized to be installed on 400 North between 200 East and 700 East.

Fire hydrants are now installed throughout the city (1983).

1st town marshal

The law enforcement portion of Lindon's public safety began with Leonard Fryer, who is recorded as the first town marshal. He served under the first president and town board.

8 January 1934

Stanley B. Keetch was appointed town marshal.

18 May 1939

George Jacklin was appointed to the office of town marshal.

16 August 1941

George Jacklin resigned as Lindon's town marshal.

11 September 1941

William J. Robbins was appointed town marshall. Apparently Mr. Robbins did not function in this office since no mention is made until 11 November 1943 when F. L. Culmer was appointed temporary town marshall to allow him authority to deal with some youthful vandalism that was becoming a trial to him. It is assumed that Lindon City had no marshall until 9 March 1950 when Austin Dittmore was hired as town marshall and dog catcher. From the record of 16 January 1950, however, we do find that Clark Allred was offered the job of marshall but refused to accept it.

12 October 1950

Austin Dittmore resigned as town marshall. Lawrence Kirk was offered the job.

30 October 1950

Mack Ostergaard was appointed town marshall.

11 October 1951

Douglas Shumway was appointed constable.

22 July 1954

Oliver Johnson was hired as city marshall.

8 December 1954

Oliver Johnson resigned as city marshall. Leonard Walker was appointed temporary marshall.

13 February 1958

Nyal Smith, referred to as a new city employee, was evidently appointed marshall along with his assignment as road and water superintendent.

9 July 1959

Lindon City contracted with Pleasant Grove for police protection at \$150.00 per month plus the first \$50.00 in fines.

22 April 1963

Pleasant Grove requested Lindon pay \$250 per month for police protection.

11 May 1967

Lindon offered Pleasant Grove \$300 per month for police protection. The offer was rejected.

21 June 1967

The record shows that Lindon City budgeted \$8690.00 for a police department for 1967-68. Glen Lewis was offered the job of chief of police and he was to be responsible for assisting on night calls when needed.

12 July 1967

Richard Draper was hired as a police officer at \$100 per month. On October 11 the salary was raised to \$200 per month.

1 November 1967

Lindon City purchased a police car for \$2350.00.

7 July 1969

The budget for the police department was \$9799.40. Richard Ellis was mentioned as a police officer and was recommended to receive a raise of \$50 per month during the time he had full responsibility for the police department.

It was suggested that Ken Harris, who was retiring as a state trooper, might consider a position as a full-time police officer.

10 November 1969

Mention was made of Ken Harris and Richard Ellis as police officers; reference was made to "spare-time" police officers--evidently the police reserve, which performed some valuable service to Lindon over a ten-or-twelve-year period.

14 January 1970

Ken Harris was listed as chief of police.

9 June 1971

Carl Wilkinson was appointed chief of police, the office having been vacated by the untimely death of Chief Ken Harris.

8 December 1971

LaMar Jolley was hired as a police officer under the Public Employee Program, a federal program. Ronald Wall was also approved to be hired when more federal funds became available through PEP.

9 August 1972

Minutes show Officer Jolley giving a police report to the city council.

12 September 1973

Carl Wilkinson resigned and LaMar Jolley was appointed chief of police. Tom Sutch was hired as a part-time police officer. Reference was made to the police reserve system.

21 August 1974

Stanley Adams was hired as a police officer. Police cars were authorized to be used by officers on off hours.

4 November 1975

Robert Vaughn was hired as a police officer.

13 April 1977

Stanley Adams quit the police department.

25 April 1978

Kenneth Kauwe and Jack Wright were hired as police officers.

10 July 1980

A special meeting was held to abolish police reserve. The police department then consisted of the following:

Police Clerk: Jean Clark

15 July 1980

Police reserve was abandoned. Kelley Salmans was hired as a regular officer, while Gerald White was hired on the CETA program.

18 November 1980

Pleasant Grove was asked to contract for 24-hour police coverage in Lindon City. Pleasant Grove City Council declined to provide this service.

April 1981


LaMar Jolley was released as chief of police.

5 May 1981

Leon Laws was appointed chief of police.

The record has not named several who have served as police officers in Lindon City. Following is a list of those who appear on the personnel records in police protection positions or office staff positions. Hopefully none has been omitted.

Before we leave the official records of Lindon, it might prove interesting as well as entertaining to look at the lighter side of officialdom in the form of city ordinances.

The men who approved the first Lindon city ordinances were good, conscientious citizens. By reading through the ordinance book one can see that much thought and wisdom was used in the compilation of the laws. Some of the ordinances, however, undoubtedly took considerable time and manpower to apply and to enforce. But, it has been said, "Teach the people right principles and they will govern themselves."

The following ordinances are a sampling of those found in the handbook entitled, Revised Ordinances of the TOWN of Lindon, Utah County, Utah, published in the year 1925.

Section 171. Profanity.

It shall be unlawful for any person within this town to profane the name of Deity.

Section 121. Discharging Flippers and Slings.

It shall be unlawful for any person to discharge any flipper, or sling, or air gun within the limits of this town.

Section 146. Insulting Females.

It shall be unlawful for any male person to rudely or improperly

follow, pursue, lay hands on, molest, insult or insolently or offensively speak to or address any female person in any street or public place in this town.

Section 114. Bathing.

It shall be unlawful for any person to bathe or swim in any of the waters within the limits of this town, except in public or private bath houses, unless covered with a bathing suit so as to prevent any indecent exposure of his person.

Section 64-C. Board of Health.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Health to place near the front door or main entrance and upon the outside of any dwelling house, living room or apartment, wherein is domiciled any person having Spanish influenza, scarlet fever, small pox, diphtheria, bubonic plague, or epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis, immediately upon the discovery of the existence of any such disease, a flag not less than eighteen inches in length by twelve inches in height, upon which is printed in plain black letters at least six inches in height, the name of the disease which therein exists.

Section 64-X. Board of Health.

It shall be unlawful to hold a public funeral over the body of a person who has died from Spanish influenza, scarlet fever, diphtheria, bubonic plague, or epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis, or to remove the dead body or casket containing it to any church, meeting house, or place of public assembly, or to in any manner remove such body or casket in any public conveyance.

Section 280. Rates.

The annual water rates for the supply of water for this town are hereby fixed and established as follows, to-wit:--

For each home or family supplied with water, \$18.00, payable in four equal installments, \$4.50 on the first day of January, April, July, October, of each calendar year. (The above cited ordinance is one we wish had never been changed!)

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According to the Pleasant Grove Review of September 22, 1983, the CITY of Lindon has arrived at a historic landmark since its incorporation--the passing of its 100th ordinance.

Ordinance No. 100, plus No. 101 and No. 102, were passed at the city council meeting held September 7, 1983.

Of historical interest, the first ordinance to be passed by the city took place May 1, 1953, when Mayor W. D. Chapman signed into law the boundaries incorporating the city limits.

The 100th ordinance was written into law to provide a means of relief to the city for collection of assessments under special improvement districts.
