"What do you like about living in Lindon"? It's a question I often ask people when I'm out and about. I love living here. It's so very peaceful. I know many of you attended Lindon Days last month. We do things a little different around here. We keep it more "Home Town" style. We don't have the big mechanical carnivals but opt for the Free Kids Fair in the Park, events in our Horse Arena, the very solemn Flag Retirement ceremony, Huck Finn Fishing event, one of the best Car shows in the State, and on and on and on! Even in our "Grand Parade" your elected officials tried to hand out Otter Pops to everyone along the way – we have more of them planned for next year to cover the ever growing number of people who attend the "Best One Mile Parade in the State"! Our fine staff and MANY members of the community pull together to put on this six day city party the first FULL week of August every year and plans for next year have already begun! But Lindon is more than just one week a year. This month we have "Drill Down for Safety" where we will pull together to test our strength to see how we might do in an emergency situation. It will take just a few minutes of YOUR time – ALL OF YOU – to see how well our community could handle a possible disaster.

As a community we volunteer help in many areas that binds and connects us as a community. Our local schools gladly accept volunteers for many programs and you don't need to have a child attending to lend a helping hand. One of the EASIEST ways to help out is the "BOX TOPS for Education" program. All you have to do is clip, save and send those little labels on many products you already purchase all the time. Once you've saved some, just drop them off at any of our local schools (K-8) or send them with a neighbor's child and 10 cents for each one goes **straight** to kids programs and supplies – not to overhead costs. You could even contact our local schools to see additional ways to give a few hours a month.

In an actual event, that little notification may save hours of unnecessary resources searching to determine your condition.

Please use the opportunity to connect with your friends and neighbors and make it a fun evening! The Drill this year will be simplified and will be used to test our communication capabilities and our ability to account for each and every community member. Our goal is to work through problems and make our mistakes as we practice drill and not in the middle of an actual emergency.

Lindon City will continue to lead in the effort of personal preparedness and as a city is dedicated to promoting safety and emergency preparedness efforts among its residents. Our efforts as a community are getting attention as each year more cities come to observe us to help develop their programs. Please participate in the drill and make this a fun event with neighbors as you practice together for that day which we all hope never comes!

Lindon Tree Advisory Board Opportunities

Go Out On a Limb, Join the Lindon Tree Board! The City of Lindon is seeking individuals of the community to serve on the Lindon Tree Advisory Board, which was established to provide clear



guidance for planting, maintaining and removing trees from streets, parks and other public spaces as well as activities that are required or prohibited.

The Tree Board will meet quarterly and its scope of work includes hearing and ruling on appeals of denied administrative permits (for tree removal), establishing a community forest work plan, recommending public tree care policies, maintaining a list of recommended and undesirable tree species, and promoting public awareness of trees and of the city tree ordinance. The community members of this board will serve a 4 year term.

"CHILD FIND" PROGRAM

The Alpine School District Department of Special Education is attempting to contact persons with disabilities between the ages of birth and twenty-one, in compliance with the Federal law, which mandates the provision of free educational programs and /or services for such persons. If a child is having significant difficulty with vision, hearing, speech, behavior, is experiencing slow development untypical for his/her age, physical impairments, or learning difficulty, he/she may be a child with a disability.

If you know of any child whom you feel might qualify for these services, including students suspected of having a disability even though they are advancing from grade to grade, in a private school, homeless, immigrant, please contact he principal of your school or the Special Education Office of Alpine School District at 801-610-8410. If you are the parent of the child with an IEP enrolled in a public school, we are required by Utah Code to inform you of the availability of a scholarship to attend a private school through the Carson Smith Scholarship Program. LINDON MONTHLY RECYCLING FACTS

Acceptable Recycling Items:

- Corrugated cardboard
- Paperboard: cereal boxes, paper towel rolls, etc.
- Paper: magazines, junk mail, office paper, phonebooks, newspaper, paper grocery bags, etc.
- Aluminum and steel: clean food cans, etc.
- Plastics: milk and juice jugs, shampoo bottles, detergent bottles, etc.











Do Not Recycle:

GLASS, styrofoam, food waste, green waste, textiles (old clothing), hazardous waste (paint cans, car tires, batteries, etc.)

HELPFUL RECYCING TIPS

- Food containers do not need to be washed thoroughly or even rinsed out. As long as food containers are scrapped clean they can be placed in your recycling bin.
- Plastic grocery bags are recyclable but are best left out of your recycling container. These light plastic bags are difficult to run through the sorting machinery at the recycling facility. Most major grocery stores (such as Smith's and Wal-Mart) provide a drop off site for used grocery bags. Please recycle your grocery bags this way.
- The garbage and recycling truck looks the same—are my materials actually being recycled? Absolutely! On occasion, a driver may service a garbage route, empty his truck, and then service recycling containers. The same truck can service both types of cans (garbage and recycling) in the same day. The loads are never mixed, however. If you do see a driver dump a garbage can and a recycling container back to back, this is likely due to contamination in the recycle container. Please remember to follow the guidelines above.
- To make sure you have enough room for recyclables in your cart, remember to break down all larger items such as boxes and even milk jugs. Taking the
 extra time to break down your boxes will give you added space in your container.

HOW I CAME TO LINDON......



Like many Utahans our family roots comes from distant and diverse places: Oregon, Tennessee, Hawaii, New Mexico, and that's just my grandparents.
