



Water Conservation

Although Winter felt like Spring, it is almost officially here. Which means irrigation water will be running again and our efforts for conservation will increase. During the irrigation season, the city newsletter will provide a few excerpt from the Weber Basin Water newsletter containing information on Weber Basin events, conservation tips, and any news that will be important to communicate

As always, our water year at this point is unpredictable. We had an unusually dry January and February, but anything can happen in the next month. Members of management and board members of Weber Basin Water will meet at the end of this month to discuss the 2015 water year. Included in this discussion is the date when the secondary water shut will be (October 1st versus October 15th).

Indoor Conservation Tip

Turning off the faucet while you brush your teeth can save up to 4 gallons per minute. That's 200 gallons a week for a family of 4

Outdoor Conservation Tip

Spring is on its way! Now is the time to check your irrigation system and valves for leaks, breaks, and any sunken or tilted heads. Remember, a broken head can waste up to 40 gallons per *minute*. Running an irrigation system with a broken head for 30 minutes is comparable to taking a 7 hour shower. No one needs to be that clean.

The month of February was quiet with the amount of calls the department responded to, but the firefighters continued with a full schedule of training and began work on community projects. They did respond to a grass fire in February and there were no injuries and no significant damage. Not only does the department want to focus on training to strengthen their skills, they also take pride in serving the community of Uintah. Watch for the Uintah City Fire Department at the Easter Egg Hunt this year. They will be serving up a pancake breakfast and will bring Engine 91 for the kids to see. We will also take pictures of them if they would like.

The department completed its regularly scheduled training drills for the month of February. Some of the trainings were; correct radio procedures and command set up, this also included a command tabletop exercise and scene size up training. They also completed mayday-training, practiced initial fire attack skills and training for multi casualty incidents. The firefighters also were tasked with basic life support, cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and automated external defibrillator (AED) training.

There were also training classes that Chief Pope, Deputy Chief Marz and Firefighter Sacco attended to advance their skills. Chief Pope attended BLS/CPR/AED Instructor Training. Chief Marz completed Fire Instructor I Training and Firefighter Sacco completed both Fire Instructor I Training and EMS Instructor training.
