The town was bonded for \$45,000.

Lindon Utah
Aug. 10, 1949

In the month of November 1941 under the leadership of Bishop Jesse K. Thorne, the Lindon ward Chapel, which was located one half mile north of the site of this building, was torn down. It was expected that we would start to rebuild in the immediate future. But on Dec. 7, 1941 the Japs attacked Pearl Harbor and we found our grand old United States in war. Building of all kinds were stopped by the Government. So we were forced to stop our plans until some future date.

On July 30, 1944 I was sustained as Bishop of the Lindon Ward. We started to plan for our new Chapel. I began to feel that the old site was not the place for us to build. and mentioned it to my counselors. Bro. Chapman felt that we should change the site, and Bro. Ash was opposed. In February of 1947. we met with a group of people from the Ward and looked over different places where we might build. Some of the leaders of the Ward, and some of the stake officers who lived in the ward, were very bitter toward moving the location of the Church Bldg.

The opposition was so great that I was caused to be greatly concerned. I felt that I indeed needed the help of the Lord in deciding the matter. Day after Day I pleaded with the Lord to show me the right way. One Morning ^{as} I was on my knees praying for the Lord to guide me in this important decision, I was taken

by the Spirit and placed about 50 feet west of the west doors of the Lindor School house. The Grey streak of dawn were coming over the Eastern mountains. I stood there alone. As I looked around the scenes that I saw were beautiful, the mountains, the Lake and the Valley. I turned and looked to the North west, as I did so a beautiful building came up before me. It was a beautiful Church, The Steeple rose to the heavens, and the Chapel faced the rising sun. It was beyond a doubt the most beautiful building one can imagine. As I looked it became noon day and the sun shone on the Chapel in splendor, then the scene changed, and as I looked again it was twilight and I saw the lights come on and shine forth from the windows, once again the scene changed and I saw the scene over again. As the lights came on the second time I found myself on my knees in my own bath room. Surely the Lord had answered my prayer.

I told my counselors of my experience they both agreed that we should change the site. We called a meeting of the people of the Ward and told them that we felt we should change the site and asked them to sustain us in our action. They voted 100% of all present to sustain us in our decision. So on May 31, 1947 we purchased the one acre of ground where this Church Building stands from Merrill J. Walker at a cost of \$1200⁰⁰ and he contributed \$400⁰⁰ back into the Building fund.

I bear testimony to all men that the things stated here in are true, and that the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints is the only true Church upon the earth. That Joseph Smith was a Prophet of the true and the Living God (over

HISTORY OF LINDON WARD

Compiled by Ruth W. Lovell & David B. Thorne

September 13, 1850, Pleasant Grove was settled. The land south of Pleasant Grove seemed at first worthless, having very little vegetation except for ^{grass} sagebrush, and very little wildlife.

The people of Pleasant Grove used this section of land as a herd ground. A boy from the village was hired to drive the cows each morning to this pasture and at night they were returned to their owner. Sometimes these hired boys had exciting experiences with the Indians. That forms the background for a little town that is now known as Lindon.

Thomas Nerdin, James Cullimore, James Henry Gillman, Fred Foulke, Riley Howard, Henry Brown, and Bro. Stout were some of the first men to settle along the highway. The people from Pleasant Grove nick-named it "Stringtown" because the houses were strung along one road, which is now the State highway.

About 1858 Thomas Nerdin ventured southward from Pleasant Grove and settled where the Nerdin Estate now is on the highway. A little later James Cullimore came to live just south of the Nerdins', and by 1860, James Henry Gillman took up the land where Alvin Gillman lives now. The first girl and boy to be born here in Lindon were Mrs Elizabeth Cullimore Ash and James Gillman.

Some of the other early settlers were as follows: Riley Howard, Thomas Wooley, Fred Foulke, Henry Brown, Garretts', ^{William Thomas} Fages', ^{John} Cobbley', Bill Lord, ^{John} Wrights', Piccupps', ^{John} Harris's, Alias Aston, Lewis Robinson, Alfred Keetch, Austin Mayhew, ^{Sam} Parks + ^{R. Rogers} R. Rogers, ^{John} Bezzants', Edwin Shoell, Stouts', George Slaugh, Frank Banks, and Alfred Harper.

The first Lindon pioneers lived in dug-outs for about two years, than some of the people got logs from the canyon and made log cabins with dirt roofs. Soon some of the people made homes of adobe.

They had very little furniture. Their chairs and beds were made of willows. Most of the children slept on the damp floor. The early settlers went to the hills and gathered berries and cherries for their winter food supply. Their clothing was very poor, but they were satisfied with what they had.

The men's trousers were made of buckskin. Most of the women's clothes were made of homespun cloth. The children went barefoot from starting of spring until winter set in. Then they wore shoes of moccasins. The people had many different amusements such as quilting bees, bonfires and house parties, corn husking bees; they would have a big feast of cornbread, molasses and buttermilk for refreshments

It was very comon to see a young man going down the street, on the way to some dance or entertainment, with his girl holding to one arm and a squash or some other vegetable under the other arm to pay his admission.

Their schools were not like we have today. The house was a rude log cabin. Their main books were the Bible and the Blue-back Speller. The did not have separate rooms for each grade, but all went into the same room.

There were only six students when school started in Lindon. Two of them were Elizabeth Ash and James Gillman. Joseph W. Ash was the first school teacher. The teachers were not paid in cash, but with garden vegetables or some other products. It is said they were paid out of the wheelbarrow instead of the bank.

As the people began to settle in the Basin, which is east of the highway, it became necessary to get more irrigation water. In 1883 they incorporated the North Union Canal Companey with Robert Thorne as president. Every man in the basin went out with pick and shovel to dig that canal. Many back aches also many shovels were worn out, even tho they followed the natural lay of the land to dig the canal. Fr om that time on Lindon has grown in Agriculture.

About 1880 a Sunday School was organized in Stringtown, which was held in the school-house. George Ash and Alfred Harper being the first leaders, while they still had to go to Pleasant Grove to their Sacrament meeting.

In 1890 a new ward was formed. It was known as the Pleasant Grove 2nd. Ward. James Cobbley was Bishop, Alfred Keetch 1st. councelor, Robert Thorne 2nd. councelor, and Joseph William Ash Ward Clerk. The boundry lines of the ward were as follows; North boundry - Pleasant Grove city limits as it stands today. South boundry - to Provo Canyon Road and west to Utah Lake.

Imediately they took steps to build a church. It was begun in April after much discussion as to where the location would be. The site selected was the west portion of the Joseph Ash property. Joseph W. Ash being the donator.

Every ablebodied man and boy participated in what ever he was able to do. to help the building to be erected. The adobe were even made right there on the grounds. By December the building^{was} erected enough to hold a dance in. The proceeds were given to ^{The Church Fund.}
 Alfred E. Cul^{culmer}~~lmer~~ was the architecture of the building, but before its completion he died. His funeral was the first one to be held in the church.

~~During the year~~ of September 25th., 1898 a petition was sent to the Government to obtain a Post Office. The town had to have a name so suggestions for names were submitted by a committee from Pleasant Grove 2nd. Ward. The Government received the suggestions and selected Lindon as the name, named for the Linden tree. Some h ow the spelling was changed and we spell it LINDON. With a new name and a post office Lindon was quite important now. Bishop Cpbbley had charge of the post office it being housed in the same building with his store. His children Emily, Nettie, and Orval did the work. The mail was taken from and put on the Union Pacific train a little south of where the beet dumps now is on the lower highway; altho there was no station the train slowed down to deliver and pick up mail.

Rural Free Delivery was instigated in 1902 in the United States so the Post Office was discontinued and Rural Free Delivery Route was started from Pleasant Grove post office with Benjamin Walker as first mail carrier. He served for 16 years and from then on Clarence Hilton took over and is still delivery mail on the rural route.

The west four rooms of the present day school house was built in 1901. In 1911 more room was needed so two east rooms were built on, one upstairs and one down. Also the building to the north was erected at this time.

Again in 1919 another room was added in between the furnace room building and the east portion of the main building.

After the fire of December, 1948 the school board granted us a new addition on the north side of the building. With the ramp between there is no more going outside to go from one building to the other.

By 1946 ~~our~~^{the} community had grown to a population of about nine hundred people. The church authorities decided that such a population was too much for one ward, and so Lindon was divided into two wards. The second ward was taken from the south portion. It is now known as Windsor Ward.

The fall of 1947 the Lindon church was condemned and torn down. Plans were laid to build a new one, and as a temporary meeting place was needed the School Board granted us the privilege of meeting in the Lindon School house. We are still holding our meetings there awaiting the completion of our new building.

LINDON SUNDAY SCHOOL

The first Sunday School held in this locality began early in 1872. It was held in a house belonging to John J. Slauch, under the direction of Joseph W. Ash, assisted by the ward teachers. This organization continued until 1874, when the members of this school met with the Pleasant Grove school in the ward meetinghouse until January 5th., 1878. A school was then organized known as the Pleasant Grove South Branch. Joseph W. Ash had general supervision of three schools then existing in the settlement, namely: the North Central, and South schools. Alfred Harper was superintendent of the South school. On March 3, 1878, James Cobbley and James Hooper were chosen as his assistants, with Edward A. Harris, secretary. The last-named was succeeded as secretary on January 2, 1881, by George R. Ash.

On February 5, 1888, the school began as an independent organization with James Cobbley, superintendent; George R. Ash, first assistant; Alfred W. Harper, second assistant; and Charles A. Cobbley, secretary. On April 12, 1891, the school was re-organized with George R. Ash, superintendent; Alfred W. Harper, first assistant; Robert Thorn, second assistant; and Minnie Bjork, secretary. The last-named was succeeded by James H. Walker, on December 23, 1894. July 9, 1899 Robert Thorn was succeeded as second assistant by John Y. Walker.

The name of the ward was changed to Lindon, September 25, 1898. The present officers are: George R. Ash, superintendent; Alfred W. Harper, first assistant; John Y. Walker, second assistant; and James H. Walker, secretary.

The enrollment of the school is 20 officers and teachers and 204 pupils. It convenes in the ward meetinghouse.

The historical report shows that F.C. Banks has been a Sunday School worker over 30 years; Joseph W. Ash, Robert Thorne, A.B. Walker, Alfred W. Harper, over 25 years.

LINDON WEST BRANCH SUNDAY SCHOOL

Lindon West Branch Sunday School began September 3, 1893, with 13 officers and teachers and 28 pupils, and has since increased to 18 officers and teachers and 57 pupils. It convenes in the West District schoolhouse.

Its officers past and present are: Thomas Williams, superintendent; Edward Harris, first assistant; James T. Wright, second assistant; Delia Swenson, secretary, from date of organization to February 28, 1897, to December 31, 1899; Albert Heaps, first assistant; James T. Wright, second assistant; Thomas Williams, secretary; from February 28, 1897 to March 5, 1899; James T. Wright, first assistant; Alma Swenson, second assistant; Emma Cobbley, secretary; from March 5, to December 31, 1899.
