

My 2011 HQ Story

This month we wanted to tell you all a little about Nancy Bogard. Nancy is from Murray, KY. She has always sewn but her quilting was limited to hand quilting because she traveled for work and had to keep her work portable.

We will let Nancy tell you her story in her own words:

I am a retired car buyer and for years I traveled at least 4 days a week to Chicago and Wisconsin. I would take some hand work with me but never even thought about quilting on the machine until I retired in 2009. I tried quilting on a regular sewing machine but that just did not work for me. Too much material and too little space.

HANDI

This month we wanted to focus on thread tension and some of the issues that may be solved with correct thread tensions. We hope by following these simple steps you will have beautiful quilts each and every time. Remember, whenever you begin to quilt, set your bobbin tension first!

Problem: Top thread lays flat on fabric. Possible solutions:

- Upper tension dial too tight.
- Lint in upper discs.
- Machine is not threaded correctly.
- Lint in bobbin tension spring.
- Poorly wound bobbin.
- Thread not in bobbin tension spring.
- Bobbin tension is not set correctly.

Problem: Lower thread lays flat. Possible solutions:

- Upper thread tension is too loose.
- Lint in bobbin tension spring.
- Poorly wound bobbin.
- Machine is not threaded correctly.
- Bobbin is not set correctly.

Problem: Bottom loops.

Possible solutions:

- Thread is not flossed in top tension disks.
- Top thread tension is set too loose.
- Machine not threaded correctly.
- Burr on hook.

Their floor model was the HQ¹8Avanté. I talked to them about it and even gave it a test sew and then went home to dream. That was on a Friday, last March. On Monday, Larry said why don't you just go back and get the machine it is definitely what you want. His encouragement was all I needed. I made the 100 mile drive back by myself, bought the floor model, HQ Pro-Stitcher and all. They delivered it on Tuesday, the very next day.

It is hard for an adult to be that excited and still act like an adult. I put the kitchen table in the garage, next to the car and put the HQ¹8Avanté in my kitchen. It was March, after all, and I needed to be warm in order to practice.

I was quilting almost immediately. When asked how I learned so fast I have said I think it was because I had been doing it in my mind for so long all I needed was the machine. And I got the machine that could make it so easy for me to learn.

Now my quilting studio is almost finished. It is where the patio once was and I am almost ready to move in.

I have done meandering for several customers and they are thrilled so you see I have the answer to subsidizing my social security check. It is the best of both worlds. I can do my own quilts from start to finish. I can do customer work for money to buy more fabric and batting. All is good.
