#### Spring Meadow

After seeing a vintage quilt with a paper-pieced star and needle-turn appliqueed flowers, I knew I had to try to make it simpler with my raw edge applique technique. By cutting a rectangle in half diagonally for the star points, a larger, rounded space is created for the flower motif in the center. So simple, so striking, so fun for spring. Try a light tan tone-on-tone background, or all the same colored flowers to coordinate with your decor. Add a basket of fresh cut flowers as a centerpiece for the perfect springtime table.

## Lemon Poppy Seed Cake

Springtime and lemon desserts go hand-in-hand at our house. And if it includes lemon curd, all the better! Here's one from a Taste of Home cookbook that's a real winner.

3 eggs, separated (at room temperature for 30 minutes)
1 box lemon cake mix
1 cup 2% milk
1/3 cup buttermilk
1/3 cup canola oil
1/4 cup unsweetened applesauce
1/4 lemon juice
1 Tbsp. grated lemon peel
4 tsp. poppy seeds
2 cups heavy whipping cream
1/4 cup sugar
2 tsp. vanilla
1 jar (10 oz.) lemon curd

In large bowl, combine cake mix, milk, buttermilk, oil, applesauce, lemon juice, egg yolks, lemon peel and poppy seeds; beat on low for 30 seconds. Beat on medium for 2 minutes. In another bowl beat egg whites until stiff peaks form; fold into batter.

Pour into 2 greased and floured 9" round baking pans. Bake at 350° for 22-28 minutes or until toothpick inserted near center comes out clean. Cool for 10 minutes; remove from pans to wire racks to cool completely.

In a large bowl, beat cream until it begins to thicken. Add sugar and vanilla; beat until stiff peaks form.

Cut each cake horizontally into two layers. Place bottom layer on a serving plate; top with <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> lemon curd. Repeat layers twice. Top with remaining cake layer. Spread remaining lemon curd over top of cake within 1" of edges. Frost the sides and top edge with whipped cram mixture. Refrigerate until serving.
