## Graduated Coins

93.5"×105"


To make the quilt pictured:

## You need:

- 3 yards of white for sashings and border
- 6 yards of various greens cut into $2.5^{\prime \prime} \times 6.5^{\prime \prime}$ in a variety of shades - from light to dark
- $3 / 4$ yard of various green strips to make binding


## Cut:

From various green scraps:

$$
500 \text { strips - } 2.5^{\prime \prime} \times 6.5^{\prime \prime}
$$

For sashings
From white:

- $9-3.5^{\prime \prime} \times 100.5^{\prime \prime}$ strips (piece as necessary to get the length needed)

Note: Use $1 / 4$ " seams throughout.

## Construct blocks:

To make a quilt this size, cut 500 strips from your greens that are $2.5^{\prime \prime} \times 6.5^{\prime \prime}$. (I have a ruler that is $6.5^{\prime \prime}$ wide which is why I used that number - you could use any width if you wanted.)

Separate them into piles of light, medium, dark like this.


After I made three piles, I then took and divvied them into 10 piles, while making sure I had a variety of lights, mediums and darks in each pile.

Here are my 10 piles of lights:


Here are my 10 piles of mediums:


The darks I did similarly.
Here are my stacks of strips ready to be subdivided and placed in shade/intensity order.


Once I had all 10 stacks, I took one stack a at time and divided it further into the lightest, next lightest, etc.


I then laid them out in order from light to dark.
This was the hardest part.
When I had doubts about that, I took a photo with my camera and changed it to black and white to see if I could tell which was darker. I then tried my best to put them in the correct order. I wasn't always perfect with it, but I think I managed to succeed in the overall effect.


When I took photos, and then changed the same photo into black/white, this is how it looked.

I used my table, which pretty much gets used for everything to lay them out. Obviously, you could use the floor.


Once I got them in the order I wanted, I stacked them up carefully and took them to the machine like that and sewed them together IN THAT ORDER. All 50 of them. I will admit to have many, many doubts as I worked on it. I just didn't really "see it" in person as I was doing it even though on the computer it looked cool. But I kept going.

Press well. You now have one of your rows. Make 10 just like that. It wasn't hard once I got the hang of it.
How to put together this quilt:

1. Sew together in rows (now called columns) as discussed above. Make 10 columns.


Sew columns together, alternate direction of columns so the colors alternate dark/light putting a sashing strip cut $3.5^{\prime \prime} \times 100.5^{\prime \prime}$ long between each column. Match centers, Pin. Sew. Press well.
2. Add border: white

- Cut 2-3"x100.5". Add to the sides.
- Cut 2-3"x92.5". Add to top and bottom.

3. Press well.
4. Sandwich, using whatever type of batting and backing you prefer.
5. Quilt as desired.
6. Bind, using whatever method you wish.
