## Lightning Strikes <br> About 102"x102"

To make the quilt pictured


## You will need:

- $9 \frac{1}{4}$ yards of tan or tea stain
- $5 \frac{1}{4}$ yards of white
- 4 yards of various scraps which will be used to make 9
- $3 / 4$ yard of fabric for the binding. I used various $2 \frac{1}{2 \prime \prime}$ strips I already had

This quilt is made up of 2 different 9 patch blocks that feature small 9 patches. The two large blocks look like this:


The blocks finish at $13.5^{\prime \prime}$ once sewn into the quilt ( 14 " $\times 14^{\prime \prime}$ before sewing into the quilt)

You will also make various misc. simple 9 patches such as this one for cornerstones:

You all need sashing pieced blocks that look like this:

## You will need:

- $91 / 4$ yards of tan or tea stain
- $51 / 4 /$ yards of white
- 4 yards of various scraps which will be used to make 9 patches
- $3 / 4$ yard of fabric for the binding. I used various $2 \frac{1}{2 \prime \prime}$ strips I already had


## Cut:

For block 1: Make 21 blocks: They finish at 14 " $\times 14$ " before sewing into the top.


For each block:

- From tan/tea stain:
$2-5 " x 5$ " squares
$2-5$ " $\times 9.5^{\prime \prime}$ rectangles
$12-2^{\prime \prime} \times 2^{\prime \prime}$ squares for background of the 9 patches (if you strip piece these pieces, you do not need to cut individually)
- From a bright color that contrasts well with the background:
$15-2^{\prime \prime} \times 2^{\prime \prime}$ squares for the 9 patches (if you strip piece these, you do not need to cut these. You could sew bright strips to a tan piece and then subcut at 2 " strips to form segments needed.)

For block 2: Make 20 blocks: They finish at 14"x14" before sewing into the quilt top


## For each block:

- From tan:

2-5"x5" squares

- From white:
$4-5^{\prime \prime} \times 5^{\prime \prime}$ squares
$12-2$ " $\times 2$ " squares for the background of the 9 patches
- From colorful:
$15-2$ " $\times 2$ " squares for the bright parts of the 9 patches


## For sashing:

- From white:

64-5"x5" squares

- From tan:

64-5"x 9.5" rectangles
You will sew these two together to make a block that looks like this:

in my diagram, the layout shows these as lavender/white


## Construct blocks:

## Main block:

## Block 1:

To make a 9 patch, place a $2^{\prime \prime}$ colorful square next to a tan one and then another $2^{\prime \prime}$ colorful square.
Sew together. Make 3 strips in the colorway as shown.


Sew the rows together.


Make at least 3 identical 9 patches for each block. I was using scraps, so I just made sure I did that and chose various scraps.
Once the 9 patches are made, make the block like this.


Using your 5"x9.5" tan strip and a 9 patch, make 2 identical rows like this:


Using $25^{\prime \prime}$ tan square and a 9 patch, make a row like this:


Now sew together to make the block as shown above.
Make 21 blocks. Can be a variety of colors in the colorful part. They finish at 14 " $\times 14$ " at this point.

## Block 2:



Make your rows as shown:
Make 2 rows using a $\tan 5^{\prime \prime}$, a white $5^{\prime \prime}$ square and a 9 patch using white as the alternate square instead of tan.


Make a single row of white 5 " square and a 9 patch as shown and another white 5 " square.


Once they are finished, put together the block as shown above. Make 20 blocks.

## Sashing blocks:



This block finishes at 4.5" $\times 13.5$ ".
For each block, sew a $\tan 5 " x 9.5^{\prime \prime}$ to a white 5 " $x 5^{\prime \prime}$ square.
Make 64.

## Cornerstones:

They are simple 9 patches which are 5 " before being sewn into the top. Make 40 like this with white as the alternate block with various colors.


## How to put together this quilt:

1. Construct your blocks as described above.


With this particular pattern, it was hard to see the blocks themselves, so I did another layout where I could see the blocks themselves. It is here: With this one the sashings aren't indicated at all. That is on purpose - to help you see the blocks.


You will put your blocks together on the diagonal as shown.
The rows will alternate with the big blocks and the rows with the sashing/cornerstones. Follow the diagram. I will put a large diagram (full page) on the last page.

## 2. Sew together in rows.

3. Press well.
4. Sandwich, using whatever type of batting and backing you prefer.
5. Quilt as desired. I used circular swirls with a tight axis.

6. Bind, using whatever method you wish.
