## Circling the Wagons

106"x106"

To make the quilt pictured:


This quilt is made up of one $8.5^{\prime \prime}$ block (before sewing into the top) and it looks like this: It seems to be a variation of a card trick block (one that isn't made from triangles).


## You need:

- $53 / 4$ yards of a very light background - I used a white with little purple flowers on it
- 7 yards of various light and medium blues -with some of the darker saved out to make the cornerstones
- $5 / 8-3 / 4$ yards of your color choice for the binding. I am going to make a scrappy binding.


## Cut:

I am giving totals if you are going to cut blocks individually.

Main block : (need 100 such blocks)


From background - shown as white blender:

- 2-4.5"x2.5" rectangles

From blue 1:

- 1-4.5" square

From blue 2:

- 1-2.5"x4.5" rectangle
- 1-2.5"x $2.5^{\prime \prime}$ square

From blue 1:

- 1-2.5" square
- 1-2.5"x4.5" rectangle


## For cornerstones for entire quilt:

From background fabric:

- 60-1.5"x1.5" squares

From the darkest blue you have:

- $60-1.5^{\prime \prime} \times 1.5^{\prime \prime}$ squares


## For sashing:

From background fabric:

- 220-1.5"x8.5" rectangles


## Borders are dealt with later under how to make the quilt.

## How to make these blocks:

## Main block:



First decide on the block colors that you want to put together, then cut out the necessary pieces for that block. I actually cut them out in groups needed for that color since I was using upcycleds. I cut out $1004.5^{\prime \prime}$ squares from various blues for the square block, all my background strips and then a variety of blues in groups of 1 square and 1 rectangle. I laid out my block beside my sewing machine and then sewed it together like this:

1. Step one. Sew a blue $2.5^{\prime \prime}$ square to a background $2.5^{\prime \prime}$ square

2. Step two: Attach a background 2.5 " $\times 4.5^{\prime \prime}$ rectangle to it like this:

3. Step three: Sew the different colored $4.5^{\prime \prime}$ square to the block you just made like this:

4. Step four: Sew a different $2.5^{\prime \prime}$ blue to the same blue as the $2.5^{\prime \prime}$ square shown above to a $2.5^{\prime \prime}$ background fabric like this:

5. Step five: Sew a blue 2.5 " $4.5^{\prime \prime}$ rectangle the same color as shown on the left in step 4 to a $2.5^{\prime \prime} \times 4.5^{\prime \prime}$ background fabric like this:

6. Before actually sewing the last two strips to the top piece you have, make sure they are right. Sew them together like this:



You will need to make 100 of these. I used a wide variety of blues in mine.

## How to make this quilt:

1. Using this diagram, lay out your blocks.


Make this layout:
Make rows that look like this. Attach a $1.5^{\prime \prime} \times 8.5^{\prime \prime}$ background sashing strip in between each block. Be careful of the block placement.


Make a row of sashing/cornerstones.

Once made. Attach to the main row above. I put a darker cornerstone only where it fell so that it made a center focal point in the white area.
Attach another row of the blocks to this unit so that you now have a unit that looks like this: (You will have to flip the row so that the circle effect appears.)


Make 5 such units.
Now attach all units together with a row of cornerstones and sashing like this:
Eventually it will look like the diagram shown above. Add a row of sashing and cornerstone to the top as shown.

## 2. Add white border

From white or very light blue - use your background fabric if possible -

- Cut 2" x WOF (width of fabric) and piece until you have two pieces that are 2"x91.5" Sew to sides.
- Cut 2" x WOF and piece until you have two pieces that are 2 " $\times 94.5^{\prime \prime}$ Sew to top and bottom.


## 3. Add piano key border:

From blues in all shades. 188-2.5"x 6.5" pieces. Also cut 4-6.5" squares for the corner pieces.

- Sew 472.5 "x6.5" rectangles together in one long strip to make a piano key border. Make 2.

Press well. Attach to sides.


- Sew $472.5^{\prime \prime} \times 6.5^{\prime \prime}$ rectangles together in one long strip to make a piano key border. Add a $6.5^{\prime \prime}$ square to each end. Make 2. Press well. Attach to top and bottom.


Here is the overall layout with piano key border:

4. Press well.
5. Sandwich, using whatever type of batting and backing you prefer.
6. Quilt as desired.
7. Bind, using whatever method you wish.
