## **Circling the Nines**

Top finishes at about 95x95"

To make the quilt pictured:



## You need:

- About 5-6 yards of various purples and blues fabrics. I used 2" strips already cut up and in my bag. You will need some lightly hued ones for the rail fence blocks for a subtle effect.
- About 6 ½ yards of white
- About ½-5/8 yard of fabric for the binding. (I used scrappy 2.5" strips.)

Note: This quilt is made up of 2 blocks plus the border block: a 9 patch (though there are two colorways for the 9vpatches) and a rail fence block.

For this quilt you will need

- 98 9 patch blocks with the darks in the corners, and
- 98 9 patch blocks with the whites in the corners
- 169 rail fence blocks with a pale lavender or blue as the center rail


### Cut:

<u>Note</u>: I used already cut 2" strips of purples and blues and various whites which I pulled out of a bag of already cut up strips.

#### For your 9 patch blocks:

Cut off 2" segments. Like this:


Using yours scrappy strips, made strip sets, out of white, blue or purple, white and blue, white, purple. They should look sort of like this:



You will need 294 strip sets with the colors -- white, purple/blue, white like this:



You will need 294 strip sets with the colors -- purple/blue, white, purple/blues like this:



#### For your rail fence blocks:

Cut

- 169 light lavender or lt. blue strips, 2"x5"
- 338 white strips 2"x5"

#### For your white spacer blocks:

• 56 white 5"x5" squares

#### For side setting triangles:

• 14 - 8"x8" squares cut twice diagonally like this: - This will give you 56 side setting triangles. Mix up the colors a bit, choosing a variety of deeply saturated colors. (These will be a bit too big—you can trim off before you bind.)



#### For the corner setting triangles:


• 2-4% squares, cut once across on the diagonal. I used two different fabrics. This will give you 4 corners. They will be a bit too big. Trim after all is quilted and before you bind.



#### **Construct blocks:**

**For the 9 patch**, using previously cut off strip sets as described above, construct your 9 patch blocks. They will be 5" at this point.

This is how your 9 patch block needs to look:



Make 98 of each set.

#### For your rail fence block:


Sew 2 whites and a light blue or lavender to make this block: They also should be 5" at this point.




Make 169.

## How to put together this quilt:

- 1. Make blocks as described above.
- 2. To make the center, using the diagram below, lay out the blocks and sew together in rows. Watch the placement of the 9 patch blocks.



For constructing a quilt top on point use this drawing to help you. Start in the corner like this drawing shows and add one row at a time. I put the corners on last.

- 3. Press well.
- 4. Sandwich, using whatever type of batting and backing you prefer
- 5. Quilt as desired. I did an all over stipple as I did not want to distract all from the delicate design.



6. Bind, using whatever method you wish.
