## Frisky Boxes

92"x103.5"

To make the quilt pictured:


This quilt is made up of one block - it looks like this and measures $11.5^{\prime \prime}$ as a finished block $-12^{\prime \prime}$ before being sewn into the quilt.


## You need:

- $121 / 2$ yards of various blues - both lights and darks. I was using various cut up pieces of shirts or other second-hand items. I used all shades - from lights to mediums to darks. There was not a standard "every other block is light or dark. I simply aimed for variety of shades so I could achieve contrast.
- $3 / 4$ yards for the binding


## Cut:



For each block, you need to cut:

- Fabric 1:
$1-5 " x 5$ " square for the center (you can use a charm pack)
- Fabric 2 - contrasting to fabric 1

2-1.5" $5^{\prime \prime}$
2-1.5"x7"

- Fabric 3 - contrasting especially to fabric 2 to let the box outline show

1 - $2.5^{\prime \prime} \times 7^{\prime \prime}$
1-2.5"x9"
$1-3.5^{\prime \prime} \times 9^{\prime \prime}$
$1-3.5 " \times 12^{\prime \prime}$

I made a total of 72 blocks. I made each block different since I was using my upcycleds.

## How to make the block:

Sew the $1.5^{\prime \prime} \times 5$ " strips of fabric 2 to the side of the Fabric $15^{\prime \prime}$ square. Press.


Sew the $1.5^{\prime \prime} \times 7$ " strips of Fabric 2 to the top and bottom of this unit:


For the outer round I did it in the log cabin style simply to keep myself from getting confused
Sew the $2.5^{\prime \prime} \times 7^{\prime \prime}$ piece of fabric 3 to the right of the square unit


Next add the $2.5^{\prime \prime} \times 9^{\prime \prime}$ piece of fabric 3 to the bottom like this:


Next add the $3.5^{\prime \prime} \times 9^{\prime \prime}$ piece of fabric 3 to the left side like this:


Finally add the top piece $-3.5^{\prime \prime} \times 12^{\prime \prime}$ piece of fabric 3 :


Make 72. They should measure $12^{\prime \prime} \times 12^{\prime \prime}$ before being sewn into the top. I made mine all different. I didn't cut them all out at the same time - I cut out a few and made them and then cut out some more.

## How to make this quilt:

1. Using this diagram, place your blocks $n$ rows. I tried to mix up the colors and directions of the blocks to make the blocks not be even with each other and to make them look a bit mixed up.


Here's my attempt to place the blocks in a pleasing arrangement as regards to color and direction of the pieces.

2. Once you have them laid out so that it is pleasing to you, sew the blocks together in rows and sew those rows together.
3. Press well.
4. Sandwich, using whatever type of batting and backing you prefer.
5. Quilt as desired.
6. Bind, using whatever method you wish.
