## Four-Patch Quilt

Use a $1 / 4$ " seam allowance throughout.

Yardage Requirements: $\quad$ crib ( 44 " $\times 56$ ")
Alternating blocks $\quad 3 / 4$ yard (more for fussy cutting)
Four-patches
Inner border
Outer border

Binding
Backing and batting
$1 / 2$ yard (each of 2 fabrics)
$1 / 4$ yard
1 yard (non-directional)
*1 5/8 yards (directional)
$1 / 2$ yard
2 7/8 yards. seamed horizontally
throw (56" X 80")
$13 / 8$ yards (more for fussy cutting)
1 yard (each of 2 fabrics)
3/8 yard
$13 / 8$ yards (non-directional)
*2 $1 / 2$ yards (directional)
5/8 yard
4 7/8 yards, seamed horizontally

Cut the following for the crib quilt:

| Alternating block | (3) $6 \frac{1}{2} / 2$ strips, subcut into (17) $61 / 2 "$ squares |
| :--- | :--- |
| Four-patch fabrics | (4) $31 / 2$ strips from each four-patch fabric |
| Inner Border | (4) $1 \frac{1}{2}$ strips |
| Outer Border | (5) $61 / 2 "^{\text {strips }}$ |
| Binding | (6) $21 / 2$ strips |

Cut the following for the throw quilt:
Alternating block
(7) $6 \frac{1121 "}{}$ strips, subcut into (38) $6 \frac{112 "}{}{ }^{\prime \prime}$ squares

Four-patch fabrics
(7) $31 / 2$ " strips from each four-patch fabric

Inner Border
(6) $1 \frac{1}{2} / 2^{2}$ strips

Outer Border
(7) $6 \frac{1}{2} /{ }^{2}$ strips

Binding
(7) $21 / 22^{\prime \prime}$ strips

Four-Patches - Following diagram, sew $31 / 2 "$ strips into pairs, press toward dark. Sub-cut into $31 / 22^{\prime \prime}$ pairs. Sew pairs together to form four-patches. Make 18 four-patch blocks for crib quilt and 39 fourpatch blocks for throw.
Assembling quilt - Sew alternating blocks to four-patches to form
 rows. Sew rows together.
Borders - Sew inner border strips together, end-to-end. Measure length of quilt, cut 2 or 3 inner border strips this length. Sew one to each side. Measure width and cut two strips this length. Sew to upper and lower edges. Repeat with outer border.
Quilt as desired, bind.
*Directional fabric - Cut 2 (crib) 3 (throw) strips across the width first (upper and lower borders.) Then cut 2 strips for side borders the length of the fabric. Remaining fabric may be used for binding.
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
