### Regular Meeting Town of Grand Lake – Board of Trustees Monday May 10, 2021, 6:00 PM

The Board will not discuss or debate these items, nor will the Board make any decisions on items presented during this time. Rather, the Board will refer the items to Staff for follow up. Time limited for Public comments is 3 minutes.

**Jim McComb – 768 C.R. 4980**

I would just like to give a shout out and a thank you. We had a community clean up for the town last Friday and I wanted to thank Doug Morton, Peggy Mann, Linda Trout, Chris Bryan, Jim Peterson, Suzi Maki, Jonah Landy and Kelly Croft for assisting us in that effort. I would also like to thank Keith Everhart for supplying the bags and vests that were necessary to get the job done, and his team also went around and picked up all the bags of trash we had collected. The one comment I would like to make regarding that cleanup, I think next year we will work harder to get more participation. I think there were probably some areas we could have done better on. Due to lack of people, we were unable to do it as thoroughly as we would have liked.

The other thing is, I would like to address the lot behind the Sagebrush. It took us a solid hour to pick up the trash behind that lot. I don't know who it belongs to, but it really, really gives a bad perspective on the town. I guess our Code Enforcement person could figure that out that would be a great help. I think that is a good move because I think it would have been very bad publicity and bad interest for the town on the part of the Board if that were to come about since Mr. Crone was very involved in the negotiations on that particular property. I think it would have been a very sad thing to have the Board do that. I would like to also indicate that we have a lot of things going on in town and there are a lot of things that need to be done. It seems that there are a lot of things that are not getting done in our town. I know there have been some comments in the past about the town being the best steward of its property, whatever that may be. You’re going to be talking about getting a Consultant for our Public Lands and I think its imperative that we start to look very strongly at how we are spending our money.

It’s very difficult to go around and try to tell other people to clean up their property when our maintenance facility probably hasn’t had a coat of paint in 20 years. I think it’s time to start doing some of those things within our community to make sure that our citizens know that we are trying to make it look as best as it can. We have fences falling down on public property, we have open storage of items on public property, which is not allowed by our code. We need to straighten that up and make sure that we present a good face to the community itself. It really doesn’t do us a whole lot of good to spend a lot of money on new equipment and then say, oh by the way we have not place to put it inside, so it’s going to be setting out in the snow and rain and freezing temperatures and deteriorate very quickly that way.

I think we need to take a look at what we are doing with our funds and spending some of those funds in town. Even some of the things that we’ve spent money on would be much better spent trying to clean up our own property rather than tell other people that they have to clean up theirs. I would hope that would be given some thought.

### **MANAGERS REPORT:**

This week four members of our community submitted a Recall Petition, which has been approved, to Recall Mayor Kudron. Staff is going to, at the encouragement of our Town Attorney, contract with Karen Goldman who is the expert on these types of elections, to assist our Town Clerk get through the process. There is a lot of risk that we can do things wrong here. For paying a consultant \$70 an hour we would be saving ourselves tens of thousands of dollars in lawsuit fees. Our attorney just went through a Recall election in Larkspur and they brought on Karen Goldman and stated she definitely saved that Town thousands of dollars.

The color dial is no longer being used in Colorado. Grand County had a rise in cases in April; but we have seen a significant decline over the past week. We have a two-week case count of 31 and a one-week case count of only 8 cases. As a result, many of the restrictions are being loosened by the County. For specific limitations, it is still best to go to the Grand County Public Health website. There are still adequate supplies of COVID vaccine. Anyone 16 years old or older is eligible to receive a vaccine. Please go to the Public Health website to find out how to get a shot. The Boat Ramp is now open on a

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limited basis. The inspector is not on-site yet, but, people can have their boats inspected at Lake Granby ramps where they will be given a daily code allowing them to access the Grand Lake ramp.

We have conducted several interviews and have offered the position to one of the candidates. We expect to hear back this week whether he will accept the position. Northern Water has started distributing sandbags, seed, and mulch from the Grand Lake Center ballfield. These materials are free to anyone who needs them to recover and repair fire damage. It is important that we all keep a look out for flood hazards during rainstorms.

Captain Rick will be putting the boats in the lake over the next couple of days. We are still on track to open the Marina by May 22. There is a chance that it might open earlier. The Golf Simulator is in and set-up at the Grand Lake Center. Staff will be training on how to operate the system for clients this week. We hope to have the simulator open to customers by next week.

### MAYORS REPORT:

Last week when I came into Town Hall to talk to some members of the Staff, I was there when one of our local businesspeople came in and I really take offense to how this person treated our Town Staff. Over the last year our entire Town Staff, and every business in the Town of Grand Lake, have done everything they possibly could to get through COVID-19. Our Staff has been inundated with requests about what's next and how do we do this, how do we do that. When the rules change every day at the national level it takes a while for those things to come down. These times have been frustrating, but I want to say right now that any person that comes into our Town Hall and starts making light and starts chastising people not knowing about the "Chinese Virus" and that's not what it is. It's a COVID-19 virus and it has killed millions of people.

If people want answers to the sign code, follow the instructions. Our Staff knows how to give those answers. Take those answers from them and be nice. Everybody is under an awful lot of stress and pressure because of those things that we had nothing in our control to do with. The COVID virus has changed the way that the world will treat one another forever. October 21, 2020, will change the way our community looks at fire, looks at safety, forever. We have to remember that every single one of our people are human beings that are just doing their very best. If you're having a bad day, take a chill pill before you go into Town Hall. I suggest you bring them something nice because they bend over backwards to do their jobs for you. Every single person on our Staff loves this Town and they have, I'm not going to say they would do anything for you, because they have done anything for you. We are so lucky that not only did we survive COVID but we did it in such a way that it made us proud. The next time you see a member of our Staff make sure to thank them instead of giving them a piece of your frustrations. If you have some frustrations take it out on me.

I want to thank everybody that Jim McComb mentioned the people that participated in the Town cleanup on Friday. Thank you to all of you who did that. We need to do a better job of it, and Jim keep on stewarding that and we will work on getting more people next year because it's a great tradition to show everybody that we are waking up and the Town means something to all of us. I also want to thank the over 100 volunteers that came to help out our community on Saturday with the Adopt a Family program. There were chainsaws and heavy equipment and shovels and pics. One of the things that a lot of the people outside of our area want to know is what has it been like the

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past six months. The only thing that we can say is there has been snow on the ground. It's only been in the last two weeks that we know what we were set with. Thank you to everyone who continues to help. In addition to doing what I am doing for the Town and for my business and my family, I am doing my very best for the community to get us funding for wildfire mitigation and flood mitigation on both public and private lands. We are a very small Town in a really big pond. It wouldn't be so bad if we were the only place that had hundreds of thousands of acres of fire burn, but this happened all over the West. When those funds become available and currently right now we are nineteen million dollars short just on taking care of the needs that were identified months ago.

I continue to talk to our state and our federal representatives to let them know that we need their help. We need our lands mitigated and we need our local people to be able to get those jobs done. We spent some time today talking about affordable housing and I spent time talking at the state and federal level also to get some directive on affordable housing and money through the stimulus dollars through Colorado Creative Industries. Because we are one of Colorado's thirty Creative Districts and a Space to Create awardee, we will be using our need to try to be able to move in such a way that the funding to get housing here can get through a lot of the red tape. It would take a three-year project and turn it into a project where we can get shovels in the ground when this Board has a location and a place and we are ready to do that. We are working on those issues.

I want you all to be COVID careful and COVID friendly. We are opening back up. The rules are changing. I hate wearing a mask. I've been vaccinated for three months, all of my family has been vaccinated, most of my friends are vaccinated. We have to continue to do our part because not everybody has. There are still people in the hospital, people in our county are still in the hospital. We are not done yet, but we are getting closer. So, remember to be nice. There are going to be people coming to Town that are not going to wear a mask. And there are going to be people who are wearing a mask all the time and ask why other people are not wearing masks. I don't have a good answer for either one of those. Do what is best for you. I agree with Trustee Bjorkman and I want to get us back to in person meetings as soon as possible.

My hesitation is not due to the Board but my hesitation is due to our audience. I don't want to meet in person and tell our constituents that they can't come in. I thought that might be a good idea at the beginning, but one of the things we've been hearing, especially as we're ending through this winter season is that people don't want halves. Either keep me on the sidelines or let me play. I think we need to watch that and as soon as we can meet reasonably and have an audience, start meeting again. Until then I think we are shortchanging our constituents by meeting in person and not letting them face us in person. I want to do that without having to tell people that they can't come in, because I think that is just as frustrating is when you want to say something and you have to stand outside the door.

Trustees, you received an email from the Board of Constitution Week, as well as, many of you may have read about it in the newspaper that Constitution Week is not going to be utilizing our funding for their day of Constitution Week. They have decided not to use the funds for Constitution Week. That said, there was a suggestion in their email that we consider using that for fireworks. In the past it has been the Grand Lake Fireworks Association and the Constitution Week Committee that has funded the fireworks for the

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Constitution Week fireworks, which is about nine minutes long. The cost of fireworks is about a thousand dollars a minute not counting our discount from the contract we signed earlier this year. Mike Tompkins is open to the idea of paying for the other five minutes to be covered in order to have a nine-minute show. This year's allocations that the Town has made would be used for fireworks and the Constitution Week Committee would then pay for the balance. I'd like to talk about that at our next meeting and I want you to think about that. I would hope that you would all say yes, we all love fireworks, assuming that it would be appropriate in terms of fire safety. Next year we would have to consider that as an appropriation and an ask for fireworks so I would like you to consider that.

Finally, as Mr. Crone stated, our Town Clerk has received an intent to Petition for a Recall Election. The paperwork has been certified and the four people that were on the application will be going out asking for a petition. I would like to say that I believe it is a small group of people that are frustrated. Change is difficult, we have been long meaning to get needs done in our Town. Our infrastructure was failing, our roads were collapsing, our sales tax revenues were not growing. This Board and previous Boards identified challenges and sought direction to find solutions. The Board before you, these seven people, have made an awful lot of decisions in the last year, not just me. As you are considering your options when it comes to a Mayor, know that I serve you. I have received no benefit other than what is inside my heart knowing that I have done a good job for this Town.

I have three more years and a lot of work left to do. The items that they are accusing me of, I will touch on them because you will be hearing about them. The first is Improper Leadership. It was stated that I purchased the Stanley Property, and as you know, the Board did that. Some might say that it was overwhelming community opposition. I will tell you this, those people who are able to vote for the Mayor for the Town of Grand Lake overwhelmingly supported the purchase of the Stanley Property. It is stated I am accused of misusing my power to pursue my own agenda of relocating the Town Public Works Facility within a remote high density residential area. I did receive a recommendation from our Public Works Director, as well as, from our Town Manger. As such, I put it on our August agenda and we discussed it, and we discussed it, and this Board made decisions.

I refused to listen to the Community by not allowing questions during Public Meetings. Public Meetings are a formal affair. It is very important that not only do we follow the law but that we also follow the intent of order. My promise to all of my Trustees was that they would be informed before being asked to make decisions. In the interest of information, I have gone myself out of order to ask people who have a depth of knowledge, understanding, or opinion that is on expertise of a particular item. As I explained in our previous meeting, ironically I would ask anybody to refer to the documents that I put forth when I was running for Mayor and if anybody would like to see them, I addressed this issue specifically and I am currently acting as I promised.

Inadequate guidance given to the Town Trustees and the Town Staff prior to important Town decisions. My guidance is based on available information. I am not the Trustees boss. I am one vote. I've been accused of being fiscally irresponsible by donating Town owned property without public hearings or input from the community, referencing Space to Create. That is not true. The Town has entered into a land agreement for the

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Art Space, Space to Create project. It is something the Board is going to need to do because that is part of our ten percent contribution. We will be talking about it soon.

Purchased property outside of Town without a Public Hearing or input from the community. We had over eight public meetings where people voiced their opinions. Some of the people that wish to see me recalled spoke at seven out of eight of those meetings. This Board made the decision to move forward to secure a Certificate of Participation to bring the funds into the Town to make it possible to purchase not only the Stanley Property but also to relieve the Town of the debt of the Thomasson property that has been over ten years in the making.

I commanded Town taxpayers to annual payments of \$129,000 through 2035. My signature is on the Certificate of Participation and as it has been clearly stated in today's meeting, I only sign things when I am directed to do so by the Board of Trustees. I have never once signed anything without approval or direction that I am not authorized to do so. The Grand Lake Center was used as collateral for the Stanley property purchase. The Town entered into a Certificate of Participation which allowed us to receive \$1.5 million dollars. We used those funds to purchase outright the Stanley property and the Thomasson property.

I've been accused of violating the Colorado Open Records Act and open meeting laws. I failed to inform the public about the purchase of the Stanley property. I have provided the public with the notice of the original October 28<sup>th</sup> meeting that was our two-day retreat. I refused to release minutes from Executive Session meetings. I don't get involved with CORA requests. Executive Session meetings are confidential and we don't have to provide those. That's the reason why they are confidential. They give the Board the opportunity to consider difficult items. Lack of open community meetings prior to decisions. One of the most difficult jobs of being in an elected office is you have to make those decisions. There's only seven people that make decisions for this Town currently. That's the Board of Trustees. We solicit input, but what we do not do, is manage a Town with 471 Trustees. That's why we are elected. That's why we talk to our constituents and we talk to different folks so that their input is heard. In all the cases where there is public opinion and public input needed, we solicit it.

The one thing we don't do is acquiesce to somebody's voice who is the loudest. I am one Trustee and every one of the other Trustees is challenged with listening with their own ears, making their own decisions and speaking their voice. I am very proud of this Board. We don't agree all the time very often. I think that's the sign of a healthy Board. This Board has gone through a lot of tumultuous time to earn the respect of one another and also to develop a trust in knowing that we are doing good for this Town. There is nobody on this Board who is acting out of just selfish reasons.

The final items that I was responsible for were insufficient financial and comprehensive planning. I am accused of no financial and comprehensive plans for the development of the Stanley property. I am proud of the fact that for the first time in fifteen years that this town does have a Comprehensive Plan that the Board can refer to. I am proud of the fact that this Board discussed the necessary items and the needs of the Town and recognized that we didn't have the resources to complete those needs. We also recognized that we didn't have the time to get everything done. It's kind of ironic because when this Board made the decision to move forward with pursuing the Stanley property, part of the discussion was that the Town would not be happy about it because



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this is a lot of change. It is. They are important decisions that help shape our future, that give the people that serve after us a chance to be successful. I am most disappointed as Mayor that I, or my Town Manager, or my Town Clerk, or my Town Planner, or my Treasurer didn't get a book. Not from the last Board, not from the last Staff, not from the last two Boards. There is nothing in Town Hall that told us the best way to do it. We got to figure it out on our own. Truth be told, I asked some of those previous leaders and I was told no. But then again, sometimes that's how things are here.

The Streetscape project for Park Avenue; I do want to remind everybody that was a one percent bond that was voted in by the people. And you are right, its costing us more and we are not getting the job done the way that we wanted to when it was first planned. I have said this before, and I'm going to continue to say it again, what we found underneath our roads, what was left to us, was a surprise! The people that built the roads before us didn't bury the pipes the way they should have been. The people that built the roads before us didn't pack down the dirt, so there were electrical wires through our intersections that were sagging. The people that led before us left us with problems that didn't have solutions. We can't do it all, but we need to get the ball rolling. And, it's the entire Board that is doing this, it's not just me.

I initiated reduced parking fees for a new development. When I joined the Board of Trustees, the parking in lieu fee was \$10,000, and that's the truth. I did point out to that Board that there hadn't been any new development in Town for eighteen months, and that Board had a discussion and that Board voted, and the parking in lieu fee, which is a fee that can be changed yearly, was changed to \$1,000. Development started and one of the things that was brought to our attention was that maybe we could get that fee without hindering development. I was Mayor Pro-Tem when the fee was pushed up to \$25,000. So, I suppose if I'm accused of making it \$1,000, I'll take the credit for making it \$25,000. I hope it doesn't stop development.

And finally, it says the Grand Lake Center. For those of you who know me, you know that I have been involved with the Grand Lake Center for a long, long time. I didn't understand why the Town bought it and then just let it sit there for years. We just let it die. It was a fight to keep it. Then the school district didn't maintain it very well, but the Town didn't add any maintenance. Then the Town bought it for \$10.00 and there wasn't a plan for maintenance. Suddenly, in our first year, it was like, we need to get this thing open and it cost over \$70,000 just to get the pipes turned back on, and that was unbudgeted cost. The second year it cost over \$110,000 and there were calls by the public to let it go because how could the Town spend that much money on an old school. There has got to be a better way to do it where it doesn't cost anything. But you couldn't do it when it was safe, so I served as a Board of Trustee liaison. When the clinic came, I sat with Mayor Peterson and Town Manager Jim White to have those first conversations, we needed that.

I don't have enough information to address the other reasons why they might be frustrated. I sure hope that the Grand Lake Center grows into what we all want it to be, which is a great place for people to gather, for our community to come together. We have a lot of work to do. There is a lot of deferred maintenance that continues to be done. The project of Winters Pioneer Park, countless hours last year were spent on over fifteen years of abuse and piles of slat and trash that the Town put on that park. We got it cleaned up. We still have more work to do. If you are asked to sign a petition, I ask you

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to think long and hard. I am here to be your Mayor. I am here to serve you. As we need to make changes we will. This Board makes sure that I am one voice. I always vote last and I don't ever put words in Trustees mouths. I appreciate the time you gave me tonight. I'm sure you will hear about this more and more. I will be providing written response to Town so that it can be posted on the Town website if anyone wants the information that I provided. I did put this together today because I received a notice from the Town and I do want it to be looked over by the attorney, that the Town makes sure that I am speaking in a legal and proper way as our Town moves through this as we have not done this before, or at least in a while. We will have to see how it goes. I thank you all that voted for me, I've got a lot of work to do and I'm not done yet.

**FUTURE ITEMS:**

Town Manager to work with the Housing Authority to look into the steps on creating a regional housing authority and what that will look like

Look into working with Trail Groomers to secure funding for our Trail outside of Town property

Direct Staff to put together a contract for a 1% loan to pay the up-front costs for the Fast Charge EV charging stations

We have scheduled a Workshop to last the entire workshop meeting time on May 24, 2021, to discuss a Moratorium Land Issue discussion in our Downtown
