Growing up with artists as parents, Libby Williamson explored many ways of creating, and this is reflected in her fiber art today. With complex layers of fabric, paint, dye, print , thread, and more, Libby's work surprised viewers with the abstract detail you see when you get in close. She completed a four year study in printmaking and art education which earned her a BA in Fine Art and is a credentialed Art teacher in New York, and California.

Her Unique, Mixed -Media Artworks have been exhibited in Museums, Galleries, and Quilt Exhibitions world wide. In addition to making art for juried exhibitions

and sale, Libby teaches mixed-media art quilting and sewing to students of all ages in her studio in Orange, California, and at art retreats, museums, guilds, and art stores across the world. Libby has been featured on Quilting Arts TV, and The Quilt Show.

Hand-sewing, free-motion machine stitching, painting, dyeing and printing on fabric all find their way into Libby's art. " My approach to art and sewing is very loose, joyous, and forgiving." In Libby's world, not much can outshine paint caked beneath her fingernails, glue in her hair, and a bowl of ice cream!





These wonderful wallhangings, garments and bags will adorn the room during the tea luncheon. It's so fun to see how each member interprets the challenge theme and uses their fabric. The rules are simple:

- Members must buy a kit to participate. Kits will be available at meetings until sold out. \$15, cash or check only.
- Your entry must be inspired by our theme, Bee Thankful.
- You must use each of the three fabrics, a little or a lot, front or back, dyed or whatever! We just must be able to recognize it.
- You must include the two included charms, (the bee and the flower), a piece of the twine, and one hexagon shape. The shape can be appliquéd, pieced, quilted, drawn, embroidered, etc. The white fabric with the hexagon shape already on it does not count!
- Perimeter of the quilt should be no less then 48", not greater then 160".

HOSTESS BIOS

Since several of the ladies who are volunteering their sewing rooms for the tour, I thought it would be nice to know a bit more about them.

SHARON FARLEY

I began sewing as a 10 year old 4-H'er. I was in 4-H for 10 years and loving the competition. I majored in Home Economics in college continuing my passion. When I went to graduate school I met a faculty person who became my friend and partner in crime. She was a quilter and tried her best to entice me. I held firm that I could sew anything but was NOT a quilter.

The year my mom passed I found quilt tops in a cedar chest. Unfinished! Sewn by my grandmother. I could not stand it. A work that was started and unfinished did not make sense to me. I reached out to my "Quilter Friend" to figure out what to do to finish them. Once again a student of hers! Together we problem solved. At that point I recognized that I cannot stand seeing works incomplete, never realizing the life they were destined! That was the green light for my friend. I was presented over and over challenges to rescue unfinished works. A sashing here, a border there. In this timeframe I moved and found myself in South County. What else is in South County - BCQG! I went to a meeting then another and another. For FIVE years I showed up because I was always so inspired by the art of the speakers. My mantra was that I loved the inspiration but I am not a quilter.

At the time of the pandemic I had NO stash. I was gifted many huge totes of fabric. I was home alone with you-tube, going nowhere and now I have a whole lot of fabric. I perfected half square triangles. I perfected 4 patches and 9 patches. I cut them up and disappeared them. On and on it went. There was a dear lady that kindly drove to my house representing BCQG and picked up what I was sewing for philanthropy. I'm forever grateful. I decided to do a challenge because everyone on youtube kept talking about them and I thought "Why Not"? I did 100 blocks in 100 days. I finished early!

In 2022 I joined the guild. I'm super happy to support the good it does. I continue to be inspired for the speakers. I find the members friendly and supportive. I am in 2 friendship circles. And I still am in love with rescuing and finishing projects others lose interest in.

See you in September! Please carpool. My neighbors will thank you!!!!

TERESA THORDARSON

My love of sewing started at 14 when my mother gifted by first sewing machine, a Kenmore. I made clothes, pillows, curtains, stuffed animals and did many alterations; I just loved it. Later after becoming a busy Mom and a few years away from my machine, I started up again in a big way when my daughter became a competitive figure skater. All of a sudden she needed a costume for every routine; Short Program, Long Program and Artistic and I needed a serger! The costumes were beautiful, elaborate, crystals and I loved it! The thing I loved the most is that her creative outlet was also mine, I was so proud of her but also a bit proud of myself. We got asked many times at competition where we got her dresses and when they found out would ask if I could make one for their daughter; the answer always I'm sorry but no. I was always too busy away from the rink with my other two sons, a husband and a business to take that on. Honestly, there were times she skated with a new costume that I wondered if the glue on the crystals was actually dry. My daughter is a grown up woman now, married and a successful producer in LA, again so proud of her. So, my machines were put away again for a few years.

Until...my amazing friend Tina Mudd introduced me to quilting. She talked about it often, knowing I was a sewer, but I really didn't think it was something I'd be interested in. When she invited me to the 2019 Tea and Tour, I decided to go because time with Tina was always well spent. The Tour was amazing and the Tea was such a good time, I won 2 huge baskets! I don't usually win anything, perhaps a higher power was nudging me. COVID hit just months later and although most of the world was looking to fill time I was heads down twelve hours a day in a business that doubled in just a matter of weeks. After a year of that I turned my attention back to quilting and finally finished my first quilt using fabrics from the basket I won at the Tea and Tour. It was nothing special, I didn't even use a pattern, in fact, I didn't know there were patterns, ha ha! I did one more without a pattern but once I discovered patterns and the guild, I was off and running. Now you can fine me in my studio almost every evening, it is truly a happy place.

NANCY LANE

My name is Nancy Lane, I have loved sewing and fabrics for as long as I can remember. I learned to sew from my grandma, she lived to be 106 years old and was still sewing and crocheting up until she was 100 years old. I started using as many different fabrics as possible in a quilt, which led to my love of making "Scrappy Quilts". By the 90's I was obsessed with all things quilting. "Sandy's Designs" was founded in 2002 when I started creating patterns and teaching at local quilt shops. Beach Cities Quilters Guild has been an important part of my quilting life. This year's goals are to continue with philanthropy quilting, become comfortable with curved piecing and experimenting more with thread painting. From the Treasurer

My dear fellow members, I have four items to report this month:

1. As I did last month, I will send out the link to the July Profit & Loss Report with the last snippet of the month - August 27th. I made a few changes to the report, the biggest is that I created two new lines that show how much sales tax we take in, and how much we pay out. As of January 2023, the State of California requires quarterly reports (and payouts) instead of an annual payment. And, our illustrious Special Event Treasurer, Karen Bean, has been on an extended vacation, so I wrote some Tea & Tour expense checks against our General account. Karen and I will move those expenses over to the Tea & Tour account when she returns.



2. The Budget Committee met on Sunday, July 30th to review the Committee Chair recommendations for the BCQG 2023-2024 Budget.

After almost two hours of discussion, and despite our best efforts, we are still looking at a deficit this - a Quilt Show - year. We agreed to dip into our cash reserves up to \$7,500 this fiscal year, if it is needed. And it is clear that we need to find additional revenue streams and/or further reduce expenses for the 2024-2025 fiscal year and going forward.

Key items that we changed:

We have increased the Workshop fee for members from \$30 to \$35. All non-members will pay \$60 for our workshops. This will be effective with the November 2023 workshop

We will continue to have three storage units, one for Philanthropy, one now for Ways and Means <u>(their storage unit fee will</u> <u>come out of their monthly income</u>), and our general unit that stores our records and event items.

We split out the Operations Expense line into two entries. Now, Operations expense is for required State fees, Tax Preparer fees, and P.O. Box fees. The SCCQG expense line originally was for mileage to meetings, but now all SCCQG meetings will be on Zoom. We moved our annual membership and insurance certificate fees to this line (no change financially).

Things to keep in mind:

- Despite the pandemic, our guild managed not to dip into reserves.
- We did not have a Quilt Show in 2020, and then we moved it to a new location, a different date, and went from 3 days to 1 day and an evening event.

The Committee believes if we - as a guild - diligently advertise our upcoming Quilt Show, and have a discussion about other ways to reduce expenses in the future (i.e., going dark one month in the year, increase membership dues slightly, find local speakers to reduce hotel and travel expense, etc.) we can continue in a more fiscally responsible way.

- 3. The Board approved this budget on August 17th. I plan to send out a link to the new Budget the week of August 27th.
- 4. Our bylaws require that our members (that means YOU!) must also approve the 2023-2024 Budget, so <u>please make eve-ry effort to attend our September Guild meeting, even if it is just to vote!!</u> (But stay for Libby Williamson, I hear she is a hoot!) We must have 111 votes to have a Quorum, and we are averaging just under that number at our meetings. Every vote counts!

As always, please contact me if you have any questions, or might be willing to help our Guild's Budget next year by finding and applying for Grants.


Lastly, we need to fill 2 more positions on the Quilt Show Committee...WE NEED YOU!

Only BCQG members can sign up during the first month that registration is available. Going Back To Our Roots

- We plan to demonstrate domestic machine quilting techniques at future Sew Day meetings to enable and encourage members to finish their quilts.
- We will continue to have NICU, pillowcase, Teddy bear kits and tops paired with batting, backs and bindings ready for quilting available at Sew Day and guild meetings.



Block Party— Hearts

Hearts - Quilt Assembly

Layout:



Fabric Requirements:

Fabric	Size
Sashing	½ yard
Corner Stones	16 2" squares (1/8 yard)
Borders & Binding	1 1/4 yard

Cutting:

- Sashing Cut 2" strips WOF Sub cut strips to 12.5"
- 2. Corner Stones Cut 16" squares for corner stones
- 3. Borders
- Cut 5 5" strips WOF
- 4. Binding

Cut 5 strips 2 ¼" (or 2 ½") for binding

Assembly:

1. Arrange blocks

Arrange the layout of the blocks to your preference.

2. Sashing

Sew a sashing strip to the right side of each heart block. For the left column of 3 blocks, attach a sashing strip to the left side of the block.

Assemble the blocks to make a row of 3 blocks.

Create 4 rows of sashing blocks with corner stones. Attach a row of sashing to each row of hearts.

Attach these finished rows together.

Attach the last row of sashing blocks to the bottom of the last row.

3. Borders

Measure and size the left and right borders to quilt size and attach.

Measure and size the top and bottom borders to the quilt.

4. Finish

Quilt as desired and attach binding.



This year we are offering our advertisers a chance to tell you about their business.

This month we are featuring "Sewing Center of OC".

The Sewing Center first opened in SoCal when we took over the last two "Fabric City" stores in September of 2001, one in Anaheim and the other in Temple City. Sadly, the fabric store was centered around a sewing machine department business model which was no longer viable in SoCal, so we closed the two locations. Subsequently, we became the Singer Sewing Center of Orange County and set up shop across the parking lot from M & L Fabrics where we sold Singer and Baby Lock machines and a limited selection of fabric. Some years later we had the opportunity to join forces with the Quilt Cupboard Quilt shop in Garden Grove where we enjoyed a long run of serving the sewing community and building our brand. We dropped the Singer brand and removed their name from ours, and we added the Elna line of sewing machines as changes in the sewing machine industry developed. When the Calico House Quilt Store sadly closed its doors, Sheri (the owner of the Quilt Cupboard) and I felt like their old location was a definite upgrade from our Garden Grove location. And as luck would have it, our lease was up so we moved to the wonderful city of Placentia and became neighbors again. Since then, we have added the Juki and Janome machine lines.
