running a birdbath heater is no more than a small light bulb.

Suet is a high fat, high-energy food to get the birds through the cold winter weather. If you are using raw suet from the butcher do not put it out if the temperature rises above 40 degrees. The fat can become rancid and can cause the birds to get beak

rot, which softens their beak, and they will die because they cannot eat.

There are many varieties of high quality, year round suet available. Some of the customer favorites here at the Bird Store are: hot pepper, peanut butter, and sunflower heart suet. Give those hungry birds

# A Bird You Wont See at Your Feeder!

You won't even see this bird in the United States.

### What is it?

It's a Southern Yellow-billed Hornbill and it is native to Southern Africa. I saw a photo of this bird and it looked like it had such attitude I had to find out what it was.



The Yellow-billed Hornbill is a medium sized bird, standing 19 – 24 inches tall and is characterized by a long yellow and down-curved beak. It's beak is HUGE in comparison to its body, its so large in fact that the first two neck vertebrae are fused together! Now that's a lot of beak to hold up! They are sometimes called "flying bananas" because their huge bills look like bananas.

And like most other Hornbill species they have a long tail, long eyelashes, stubby legs and stubby toes. This is probably why this particular bird species was used as the character Zazu in the Lion King (actually Zazu was a Redbilled Hornbill). Nature is brilliant; lets make a bird with some glam in the eyelashes and the tail and bring it back to reality with some stubby legs!

The Yellow-billed Hornbill is found in the dry savannas of Southern Africa where they generally tend to be loners unless it is breeding season, nesting season or if there is local migration during dry season. They are powerful flyers and have a piercing cry. They eat mostly arthropods, particularly termites, beetles, larvae (beetles and termites), grasshoppers and caterpillars.

The breeding season starts with the first autumn rain and goes from September to March. (Remember they are south of the equator) Once the male southern yellow-billed hornbill has mated, it will stay with his mate and establish a territory that it will defend. The nests are placed in natural cavities in trees, cliffs or earth banks. The male then proceeds to bring bark, leaves and grass, which will be put on the bottom of the nest. During this time, the female will seal herself inside the nest by blocking the entry with a wall made from her droppings and food remains. The male will help by bringing mud for her to work with.

The only opening that is left is a vertical slit from the top to the bottom. The male passes the food through the slit with his beak. The female and chick droppings are forcibly expelled through the slit as well. The vertical slit provides good air circulation through convection and when coupled with the wooden walls, it provides a good insulation. Eggs take about 24 days to hatch. Once the chicks are old enough they will break out of the nest and start flying.

## Interesting Fact

Taking advantage of the fact that

she is imprisoned; the female will shed all of her flight and tail feathers simultaneously and regrow them during the time she stays with the chicks.

Once the chicks are half-grown, the female will break out of the nest in order to help the male. The chicks will rebuild the wall themselves and continue to be fed through the slits by the parents. Once the chicks are fully-grown, they will break out of the nest and start flying.
