BEAR RIVER HEALTH DEPARTMENT UPDATES:

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic and to help encourage continued adherence to the Governor's Directive issued March 27, 2020, the Bear River Health Department is extending health order 2020-03 to May 1, 2020. This order continues business operations as long as prescriptive measures, including social distancing and sanitation requirements, are followed.

DID YOU KNOW?

According to the CDC, the virus that causes the COVID-19 infection is thought to spread mainly from person-to-person. Spread can often occur between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet) and is transmitted through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks. It may be possible that a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then

touching their own mouth, nose, or possibly their eyes. This is not thought to be the main way the virus spreads.

To prevent spread of COVID-19, CDC recommends:

- Clean your hands often
- Avoid close contact, especially with people who are sick
- Use a cloth face cover when around others
- Cover coughs and sneezes
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily
