FALL TREE PLANTING PROGRAM

Between October 1 and November 30 a limited number of tree coupons will be available at City Hall to North Newton residents on a first come, first served basis. The coupons are good for one-half the purchase price of a tree or shrub up to a \$75 maximum.

 Limit one coupon per household.

 Trees must be an eligible species from a provided list.

 Trees purchased under this program must be planted in the front yard or street side of the property.

 Participating nurseries are Esch Landscaping, Harvest Greenhouse, and Schroeder Nursery of Newton; Sha-Na-Kee Tree Farm and Stone Creek Nursery of Hesston; and Prairie Fire Farm of Moundridge.

FALL CLEAN UP WEEK

Fall Clean Up Week will be November 5 through 9. North Newton will provide free curbside collection for <u>tree limbs and yard waste only</u>. Different types of material are picked up at a time and it takes several days to complete the project.

Please note the following guidelines:

 Bagged leaves, grass, and yard waste will be picked up, as well as manageable sized limbs.

Thorny bushes and small limbs can be placed with larger piles of brush and limbs.

Place limbs parallel to the street for easier grappling.

• Keep piles away from utilities and meter pits.

6 Do not mix any trash or recyclables in the bags and set yard waste away from recyclables and household trash to avoid confusion.



NORTH NEWTON COMMUNITY FOUNDATION (NNCF) UPDATE

The NNCF and community suffered a grievous loss with the passing of Sher Klassen Neufeld on June 13 after her valiant battle with cancer. She was an enthusiastic supporter of the NNCF, serving as Vice-Chair of the Board and providing the initial donation of \$5,000 to the Foundation. In memory of her life of service and dedication to the City, the Sher Klassen Neufeld Endowment (SKNE) in the amount of \$10,000 has been established with the NNCF. The intent of the endowment is to improve the quality of life in North Newton, with annual earnings available to support activities ranging from improved recreational facilities, programs in the arts and humanities, to general fund contributions to reduce residential property taxes. Specific use of these earnings will be made each year on the basis of recommendations by the City Council to the NNCF.

With Sher's passing, Jennifer Vogts has taken the position of NNCF Vice-Chair and Pamela Copper, Branch Manager of Via Christi Clinic in Newton, has joined the Board.

Since establishment, the total asset balance of the NNCF has registered steady growth. It now comprises four funds: 1) Operating Fund-\$455; 2) Vincent Hill Memorial Park and Playground Fund-\$1,584; 3) Sher Klassen Neufeld Endowment-\$10,000; and 4) Impact Fund-\$12,277. Asset growth has been facilitated by a one-year grant of \$5,000 from the City made available as a dollar-fordollar match by other donors up to a maximum of \$250. To date \$1,485 of the City grant remains to be matched. Individual donations of at least \$250 to the Impact Fund qualify the donor to be identified as a founding contributor to the NNCF. Contributions are tax deductible. Checks should be made payable to "NNCF" and sent to Board Chair Jim Goering, 301 Bluestem, North Newton, KS 67117.

The NNCF Board is eager to have community input on possible uses consistent with the general frameworks [of their mission statement]. All suggestions are carefully considered and can be mailed to Jim Goering labeled "For Real and Permanent Good". The next meeting of the NNCF Board is Tuesday, October 16, 7:00-8:00 a.m. at City Hall. The public is invited to attend.

ADVANCE NOTICE TO PET OWNERS



Dog and cat owners are being given advance notice that the 2013 City pet tags will be available after December 1 with the deadline being March 1, 2013. REMEMBER, all dogs and cats must be licensed every calendar year with the City of North Newton and you must show proof that their

rabies vaccination is up to date at that time. If your pet gets a two or three-year vaccination that hasn't expired when you get your 2013 city tag, you do not need to re-vaccinate for rabies.

City pet tags assist staff in locating the owner of a pet that has been picked up. When owners cannot be located, animals are taken to Caring Hands Humane Society. Animals that are not claimed by their owner may be adopted out or euthanized.


