Pursuant to Utah Code 20A-4 Part 3, the Mayor and City Council are the Board of Municipal Canvassers for the City. Following each municipal election, the board must meet to canvass the election returns no sooner than seven days after the election and no later than 14 days after the election. "Canvass" is defined as reviewing the election returns and making an official declaration of the results.

At the canvass meeting, the board will:

- 1. Publicly open the returns and determine from them the votes of each voting precinct for each person voted for.
- 2. Declare "elected" those candidates that have the highest number of votes.
- 3. Certify the vote totals for persons that were submitted to voters.
- 4. Review and sign the election report.

This year's municipal primary election was to reduce to six the number of candidates for three citywide seats on the City Council; therefore, the six candidates receiving the highest number of city-wide votes are those who will be elected and move on to the General Election.

A draft copy of the official report will be available for your review at the August 20 meeting. The official poll books are also available for your review to confirm ballot counts.

This memo is a follow-up to the previous staff recommendation to award a well drilling contract to Lang Drilling for \$798,110.00.

Background

For many years West Bountiful City has pursued an additional source of water to strengthen and protect the city's ability to provide culinary water to residents. Currently, the bulk of the city's water comes from purchases from Weber Basin Water Conservancy District, with supplemental amounts from the city's Stone Creek Well and purchases from Bountiful City's surplus water. An additional source controlled by West Bountiful City will protect from future cost increases and supply disruptions.

At the August 6th 2019 city council meeting, staff was asked to return with more information related to the overall process, the suitability of the location and the overall cost of the project. This additional information will be discussed at the August 20th meeting with the assistance of the city's consultants CRS Engineers.

The following is an outline of items that will be discussed at the upcoming meeting.

Process

- 1. What are the key differences between this process for well development compared to the city's previous effort?
- 2. If the contract is awarded, what is the time requirement for each of the next steps until completion of a production well?

Location

- 1. Will this location produce enough water?
 - a. Has anything changed since the 2014 hydrology report in this regard?

- 2. Will this location produce good quality drinking water?
 - a. What is the likelihood that water could be contaminated from sources such as chemical plumes, the interstate, the train line, or other sources?
- 3. Is leasing this land from UDOT a risk to the city's investment? [see UCA 72-6-116 (3)(a)]

<u>Cost</u>

- 1. How does the proposed cost compare to other recent wells in the area?
- 2. Since the number of bidders was so low, should the city consider re-bidding it?
- 3. If the drilling is successful, what are the other costs required to finish the well?
- 4. As the cost of the test hole is comparable to the cost of the full-size hole, should the city consider forgoing the test hole?
- 5. Are there options to reduce costs of the drilling?
- 6. Given the inherent risks of well development, should the city consider purchasing additional water from Weber Basin instead of developing a well?

4.3 BID ITEM 1 – MOBILIZATION/DEMOBILIZATION/CLEAN-UP

4.7 BID ITEM 5 – DRILL 12-INCH BOREHOLE FROM 200 TO 450 FEET

- 1. This item includes all Costs associated with all labor, materials, supplies, tools, and equipment required to drill a 12-inch minimum pilot borehole to a depth of 250 feet. The measurement is from a depth of 200 feet (assumed bottom of the installed conductor casing) to the total depth of the completed borehole. - 2. This item is measured on a Linear Feet (LF) basis and constitutes the total cost to the Owner.

4.8 BID ITEM 6 – PERFORM GEOPHYSICAL LOGGING

- 1. This item includes all cost of performing the geophysical logging of the pilot borehole. This pay item shall constitute full compensation for all labor, equipment, tools, supplies, and materials required to complete this portion of the Work for this construction project.
- 2. This item is measured on a Lump Sum (LS) basis and constitutes the total cost to the Owner.

4.9 BID ITEM 7 – PERFORM FORMATION WATER QUALITY TESTING

- 1. This item includes all cost of performing the geophysical logging of the pilot borehole. This pay item shall constitute full compensation for all labor, equipment, tools, supplies, and materials required to complete this portion of the Work for this construction project.

4.10 BID ITEM 8 – REAM THE BOREHOLE OUT TO 22-INCH DIAMETER BOREHOLE

4. Award of Well Drilling Contract for 400 North Well for \$798,110.

After unsuccessfully drilling a well in 2012, the city commissioned a well siting study by hydrologists to find locations most likely to provide good sources of water. The current proposed location has an anticipated yield of between 600 to 1000 gallons per minute. The average peak summer demand is about 800 gallons per minute. Staff's goal is to develop a well that can meet the current summer peak demand. The land for the proposed well was obtained by way of lease from the Utah Department of Transportation at no cost to the city.

The bid documents include costs for both a test well and a production well (contingent on the results of the test well). A smaller hole will be drilled first to determine the suitability (water quantity and quality) of proceeding with the production well. The contractor is also required to install a twenty-foot high sound wall 800-feet in length on the east and south side of the drilling operation to help mitigate light and noise impacts to neighboring properties.

63 There was discussion about timing, funding and what was done differently this time to 64 better ensure success. Mr. Huffman explained the city commissioned a hydrology study several 65 years ago and it has taken this long to find a suitable site. Drillers have been prequalified to drill for 66 municipal drinking water. Each well will take about 2 weeks to drill. The project will be funded 67 through the water fund. The original projected budget was about \$2M which included land 68 acquisition, a pump house, etc.

Mr. Huffman was asked about the downside to tabling the decision until the next meeting so more research could be done, and Mr. White would be available to answer more questions. There was an interest in contacting other cities to see if the proposed numbers are in the ballpark. He responded that he doesn't have any concerns moving forward but tabling this issue should not be a problem; just a few weeks' delay.
