West Bountiful to Finalize and Adopt Recreation, Arts, and Parks Master Plan



The city is in the final stages of developing a master plan to help guide future decisions related to Recreation, Arts, and Parks. The plan will be used to (1) create park construction policies and standards, (2) provide clear options on how to use available RAP tax revenues, and (3) help the city and developers recognize park needs when new areas are developed.

In creating the draft plan, the city's consultant compared existing facilities and services with future needs based on demographic data, technical input and public involvement obtained through a public scoping meeting, input provided from a steering committee, social media, and results of approximately 300 respondents to a specially designed public survey.

According to the survey, most respondents believe West Bountiful City currently provides adequate parks and trails; however, it is clear there is a need for a park in the south west portion of the city and additional trail connections. The first draft of the plan includes options for developing under-used park areas within the city as well as planning for future growth.

The draft plan is available for review at www.ldi-ut.com/westbountiful. Additional public input is welcome and encouraged and can be submitted at that site or via email to westbountifulparks@ldi-ut.com. City officials hope to have the final plan adopted in early 2018, so residents are encouraged to send in comments or otherwise get involved as soon as possible.

Seasonal Emergency Preparedness

In October, the Davis County Citizen Corps had a County wide CERT Competition using the training learned in earlier CERT classes. The one volunteer from West Bountiful was combined with CERT members from Woods Cross and Job Corps. Bountiful placed first, and our combined team placed 3rd. Congrats!

Cold weather is coming – be prepared! You probably checked your heater, got out the extra blankets, and the winter clothes, but did you remember to put some warmth items in your vehicle? What if your car breaks down? Can you stay warm? Can you signal other drivers? Have you updated the clothes in your 72/96 hour kit for winter weather? What if the power goes out for an extended amount of time? How would you heat your house? Have light?

You should also try out the family emergency plan. See how many family members remember any of it. Is the flashlight really where you left it? Can you find it in the dark? What about food while the power is out? Dare I say – can your kids survive without the internet? Can you? How will they charge their devices?

Happy holidays – hopefully you can spend time with family and loved ones. Take time to talk about your emergency plans, and collaborate. You can work together to get through any emergency. Update your emergency plans, and emergency kits, and make new goals so you can continue being prepared.

Winter Reminders

- **Christmas trees** left curbside in front of your home will be **picked up on January 2 & 3**.
- **Sidewalks must be cleared within 24 hours of each snowfall**, and remember that all snow from your property must remain on your property and not in the street.
- **Adopt a Hydrant**. Remember to shovel around any fire hydrants near your property so they are easily visible and accessible in case of emergency.
- Keep your **trees and shrubs trimmed** so the snow plows can make their way through the city. Trees are required to be trimmed to 14 feet above the roadway.
- PLEASE bring garbage cans in immediately after pick-up so they do not interfere with snow plowing.
- **Overnight parking is not permitted** on streets from **Nov. 15 through Apr. 1**. An exception will be made 2 days before and after a holiday.
- Parking on the street is **not allowed at any time**, regardless of day, **when snow is visibly falling**, or there is a visible amount of snow on the street and the street has not been plowed since the snow fell.

Help us light up the city. If you notice a street light is out, or lights at the park need to be replaced, please report it to the city at 801-292-4486. Thanks!

House Number Identification

The holidays are a time when we think about ways to be safe. One thing that may not come to mind is how we can make it easier for emergency services to find us when we need them. Homes that do not have house numbers on them or have them blocked by vegetation can make it very difficult for fire trucks or an ambulance to find you when you call. West Bountiful Municipal Code 8.12.020 requires homeowners to maintain proper premises identification. Please make sure your house numbers are clearly visible at all times.

West Bountiful's Wasatch Wranglers 4-H Club



Have you ever noticed the kids heading west on horseback down 400 North on Monday nights or watched the West Bountiful 4th of July parade and noticed the horse painted in honor of our American flag? How about stumbling upon a group of kids wearing a clovered t-shirt picking up trash, reading to sick kids or visiting the elderly? Perhaps they showed up on your front porch to sing you a Christmas carol? They have also been spotted in the foothills of the Wasatch Front riding horseback to an epic Easter egg hunt or serving our veterans high in the Wasatch Mountains providing trail rides and making lunch as a simple thank you to our American

heros and their spouses. These are West Bountiful's youth known as the Wasatch Wranglers 4-H Club.

The West Bountiful Wasatch Wranglers club is the largest community 4-H horse club in Davis County. The club is for youth ages 8-18 and run by community volunteers. Anyone with a horse, with a positive attitude, and who is willing to dig in and help is welcome to join.

4-H youth work hard. They wake up early before school to feed, break ice and care for their animals.

They spend the winter holed up in classrooms studying and attending education events about horse care and

events, public speaking, and self worth all while planning for the busy summer events ahead. 4-Hers give presentations, prepare study nights, and schedule service projects. Summertime is spent in a hot dusty arena practicing horsemanship skills. Success comes only with planning, practice and pushing themselves to discover their full potential.

All of those classroom hours and dusty arena nights paid off. Davis County and the Wasatch Wranglers brought home the 2017 Region Champion titles for both the Intermediate and Senior Divisions. The competition included teams of 8 sent from Davis, Weber, Box Elder and Cache counties. They take a test on horse knowledge and compete in six events.

The Wasatch Wranglers also brought home the Intermediate State Champion and Intermediate Reserve Champion titles in 2017. Top competitors from each county across the state compete against one another. With over 100 youth in the intermediate division, this was not easy feat.

Through the 4-H and BLM, West Bountiful youth also have the opportunity to train wild mustangs gathered off the desert. They have 100 days to gentle and prepare these mustangs for a competition and adoption. This is a state competition and Wasatch Wranglers brought home the Grand Champion Mustang and 3rd place mustang titles this year.

The club aims to not just share a passion for horsemanship, but help youth build important life skills along the way.

DARE Taught by City Police Department


The West Bountiful Police Department has taken over teaching the DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program for West Bountiful Elementary school.

West Bountiful Police Officer Allen Van Wagoner, who was already assigned as the liaison between the Police Department and the School, attended the 80 hour training to become a certified DARE Officer. The DARE program is taught in all 50 states, and 49 other countries. All curricula are science-based, age appropriate, and written by a national panel of curriculum and prevention experts and meets the core educational standards of health, language arts, and math.

As a police department we are very excited to have the opportunity to teach and interact with the students at the school. Being a smaller police department can make it incredibly difficult to implement very many additional programs. The DARE program allows us to us to teach students about the dangers associated with drug use and bring more awareness to the impacts that bullying has on people and at the same time maximize our efforts to build positive relationships with many students at one time.


Winter at Lakeside Golf Course





Package Theft Prevention

Package theft is a common occurrence across the country and tends to increase during holiday months. Many of these incidents are crimes of opportunity. A thief may not intend to target a particular home, but walks or drives by an area and sees an easy target. On occasion we hear about thieves who trail a delivery truck, stealing packages as they are dropped off. Not only is an untended package that is visible from the street vulnerable to theft, but it may indicate that no one is home, making the home a possible target for burglary.

The police department asks residents to be aware of the increasing number of package and mail thefts in our community and to take the following precautions:

- If you're expecting packages, ask a trusted neighbor to watch for deliveries and pick up your items if you are not home. Always be watchful for strangers going onto porches for no apparent reason.
- When ordering online from a big-box store request purchases shipped to the local store for pickup. With other online shopping, if being shipped via UPS or FedEx, check if you can have your packages available for pick up at a local FedEx or UPS store.
- Track deliveries online and request an email or text notification when a package has been delivered. Request a signature confirmation of delivery.
- An option is to provide delivery instructions to carrier that you prefer packages not be left on your doorstep if no one is home; request the carrier leave a notice to reschedule delivery.

- Avoid using residential mailboxes to mail payment for bills or to send greeting cards. The red flag sticking up is an invitation to a thief. When mailing anything containing account numbers, personal information, gift cards or checks, take them to your local post office or hand deliver them to your postal worker. Promptly remove mail from your mailbox, especially if you're expecting checks, credit cards, or other negotiable items

Often, people do not know that they have been a victim of mail theft until they find unauthorized charges made to their credit cards or bank accounts, receive overdue bill notices, or their mail is found far from home. If you see mail strewn along the roadside, witness suspicious vehicles or people stopping at mailboxes, or if you suspect you have been a victim of mail theft **REPORT IT IMMEDIATELY** to your local law enforcement agency.
