



# Kimber Bear Market Bear

When words are not enough this adorable bear can provide comfort for a little one in need. Designed for charitable giving, the Kimberbear is sweetly sized for tiny hands and can be packed in comfort kits prepared for children in foster care, entering emergency shelters, or receiving treatment at children's hospitals. Stitched in soft Cuddle from Shannon Fabrics, an embroidered heart on the chest shows the Kimberbear only has love to give.

### **Materials Needed:**

### **HOOP:** 5 x 7

Embroidery Fields:

Part 1: Arms 6.17 x 4.93" or  $125.3 \times 156.8 \text{ mm}$  Part 2: Legs  $6.94 \times 4.98$ " or  $126.5 \times 176.3 \text{ mm}$  Part 3: Body  $4.72 \times 5.69$ " or  $120.0 \times 144.5 \text{ mm}$  Part 4: Muzzle  $4.13 \times 4.47$ " or  $105.0 \times 113.6 \text{ mm}$  Part 5: Head  $4.94 \times 6.94$ " or  $125.5 \times 176.3 \text{ mm}$  Finished Size: Approximately  $12 \times 14$ "

**STABILIZER:** Lightweight Cut-away (No-show Mesh)

### **FABRIC:**

Fabric 1: Bear ¼ Yard of 58-60" wide fabric

Fabric 2: Nose Fabric Scrap
Fabric 3: Heart Fabric Scrap

- Point 2 Point Turner
- Clip 'n Glide Bodkin



### **Cutting Instructions:**

### Fabric 1:

Arms	cut <b>(2)</b> 6½ x 8"
Legs	cut <b>(2)</b> 6½ x 8″
Body	cut <b>(2)</b> 6½ x 8″
Head	cut <b>(2)</b> 6½ x 8″
Muzzle	cut <b>(1)</b> 6½ x 8"

- Trim ¼ yard Cuddle® to 8" x Width of Fabric strip
- Sub-cut strip into (9) 61/2" pieces



### Fabric 2:

Nose cut **(1)** 4 x 4"

### Fabric 3:

Heart  $\operatorname{cut} (1) 4 \times 4''$ 

## **Pattern Key**



Indicates thread color change.



Corresponds with the specific embroidery machine step.

This pattern was designed with Cuddle® and Luxe Cuddle® by Shannon Fabrics which comes in 58-60" widths on the bolt.

Plush fabrics like Cuddle<sup>®</sup> have a directional design or nap. This means the fabric will lay smooth when brushing your hand in the direction of the nap, compared to standing up when brushing your hand against the fabric nap. Design files will stitch an arrow with the first placement line showing which direction the nap of the fabric should lay, so the bear will feel smooth from head to toe.



### Part 1: Arms

## **Embroidery Instructions:**

- Load the 5x7\_ Arms\_Kimberbear embroidery file into the machine
- Hoop stabilizer only






• Stitch **the arm** placement line



**Note:** An arrow is stitched with the first placement line. This shows the direction the nap of fabric should lay, so the bear will feel smooth from head to toe.




- Place (1) Arm Fabric **right side up**, completely covering the placement line
- Tape in place

- Place (1) Arm Fabric **right** side down, completely covering the placement line
- Tape in place

• Change thread to match fabric



• Stitch the arm tack-down line (This stitch leaves an opening for stuffing Poly-fil® and turning **right** side out.)



• Remove all tape



6.

- Remove project from hoop
- Trim approximately ½" away from stitch line and opening (Shown in **red**.)

**Note:** Due to the stretch of the Cuddle<sup>®</sup> fabric, it won't be necessary to clip curves. If using a cotton fabric to make bear, clipping curves is recommended before turning pieces right side out.




• Using the Clip 'n Glide Bodkin, turn arms right side out



• Gently press the scallop top of the Point 2 Point Turner against the curved seams of the bear to smooth



• Carefully stuff with Poly-fil® about ½ full, with the filling most compact at the bear's paws for a floppy look





• Attach the Kimberbear part label to the top of arms and set aside for assembly



## Part 2: Legs

- Embroidery Instructions:
- Load the 5x7\_ Legs\_Kimberbear embroidery file into the machine

• Hoop stabilizer only



• Stitch the leg placement line




**Note:** An arrow is stitched with the first placement line. This is to show the direction the nap of fabric should lay, so the bear will feel smooth from head to toe.





- Place (1) leg
   Fabric right side
   down, completely
   covering the
   placement line
- Tape in place



6.

• Change thread to match fabric



• Stitch the leg tack-down line (This stitch leaves an opening for stuffing Poly-fil® and turning right side out.)



• Remove all tape



- Remove project from hoop
- Trim approximately ½" away from stitch line and opening (Shown in **red**.)

**Note:** Due to the stretch of the Cuddle<sup>®</sup> fabric, it won't be necessary to clip curves. If using a cotton fabric to make bear, clipping curves is recommended before turning pieces right side out.



• Using the Clip 'n Glide Bodkin, turn legs **right** side out



• Gently press the scallop top of the Point 2 Point Turner against the curved seams of the bear to smooth



• Carefully stuff with Poly-fil® about ½ full, with the filling most compact at the bear's paws for a floppy look




• Attach the Kimberbear part label to the top of legs and set aside for assembly



## Part 3: Body

## **Embroidery Instructions:**

• Load the 5x7\_ Body\_Kimberbear embroidery file into the machine



• Hoop stabilizer only




• Stitch the body placement line



Note: An arrow is stitched with the first placement line. This is to show the direction the nap of fabric should lay, so the bear will feel smooth from head to toe.



- Place (1) Body Fabric **right side up**, completely covering the placement line
- Tape in place



- Place water-soluble topping, completely covering the fabric
- Tape in place

**Note:** Water-soluble topping will keep the pile of the Luxe Cuddle<sup>®</sup> from getting caught in the needle or under the presser foot.

• Change thread to match fabric



• Stitch the body tack-down line



• Remove all tape (Do not remove water-soluble topping at this time.)



• Change thread to desired color




• Stitch the heart placement line


 Carefully cut away topping from inside the heart placement line

- Place the Heart
   Fabric right side
   up, completely
   covering the heart
   placement line
- Tape in place

• Stitch the heart tack-down line



• Remove tape

• Trim fabric close to the stitch line

• Stitch the heart decorative outline



**Note:** Shown in black for illustration purposes only.




 Tear away excess water-soluble topping



14.

- Place (1) Body
   Fabric right side
   down, completely
   covering the body
   placement line
- Tape in place



15.

• Change thread to match fabric



• Stitch the final stitch outline
(This stitch leaves an opening for attaching the arms, legs, and head.)




• Remove tape



16.

- Remove project from hoop
- Trim approximately ½" away from stitch line and opening (Shown in red.)

Note: Due to the stretch of the Cuddle<sup>®</sup> fabric, it won't be necessary to clip curves. If using a cotton fabric to make bear, clipping curves is recommended before turning pieces right side out.



17.

- Turn body right side out
- Gently press the scallop top of the Point 2 Point Turner against the curved seams of the bear to smooth

**Note:** Do not stuff with Poly-fil<sup>®</sup> until arms and legs are attached to the body.



### Part 4: Muzzle

## **Embroidery Instructions:**

- Load the **5x7**\_ Muzzle\_Kimberbear embroidery file into the machine
- Hoop stabilizer only





• Stitch the muzzle placement line



Note: An arrow is stitched with the first placement line. This is to show the direction the nap of fabric should lay, so the bear will feel smooth from head to toe.




- Place the Muzzle Fabric right side **up**, completely covering the muzzle placement line
- Tape in place



- Place water-soluble topping, completely covering the fabric
- Tape in place

Note: Water-soluble topping will keep the pile of the Luxe Cuddle<sup>®</sup> from getting caught in the needle or under the presser foot.



5.

• Change thread to match fabric



• Stitch the muzzle tack-down line



• Remove tape (Do not remove water-soluble topping at this time.)



• Change thread to desired color



• Stitch the mouth detail stitch





• Change thread to desired color



• Stitch the nose placement line





8.

• Carefully cut away topping from inside the nose placement line

**Note:** Because the nose applique will cover the Cuddle, it's okay if some of the fur gets trimmed as you cut the topping inside the nose placement line.



• Place the Nose Fabric right side **up**, completely covering the placement line



10.

• Stitch the nose tack-down line (This stitch leaves an opening for stuffing Poly-fil®.)



• Remove tape

Note: Do not trim nose fabric at this time. The nose fabric will be trimmed in Direction Step 13B.



- Remove hoop from machine
- Fold the Nose Fabric down to expose nose opening
- Using the Point 2 Point Turner carefully stuff Poly-fil® through opening in nose from **Direction** Step 10



12.

- Smooth fabric back in place
- Tape top of nose fabric to hold in place






A. Return hoop to machine. B. Trim fabric close to Stitch the nose final tack-down line. Remove tape.

D. Remove project from hoop. Trim muzzle approximately 1/4" outside the muzzle tack-down line. Shown in red. Do not remove topping from inside

muzzle at this time.

## Part 5: Head and Ears

## **Embroidery Instructions:**

• Load the 5x7\_ HeadandEars Kimberbear embroidery file into the machine

Note: Complete part 4: muzzle before starting part 5: head and ears.





Hoop stabilizer only




• Stitch **the** placement line



Note: An arrow is stitched with the first placement line. This is to show the direction the nap of fabric should lay, so the bear will feel smooth from head to toe.



- Place the Head Fabric **right side up**, completely covering the placement line
- Tape in place



- Place water-soluble topping, completely covering the fabric
- Tape in place

Note: Water-soluble topping will keep the pile of the Luxe Cuddle® from getting caught in the needle or under the presser foot.

• Change thread to match fabric



• Stitch the tack-down line



Remove tape
 (Do not remove water-soluble topping at this time.)



7.

• Change thread to desired color



• Stitch the eyes detail stitch





8

• Change thread to desired color



• Stitch the muzzle placement line





9.

 Clip water-soluble topping from inside the nose and muzzle placement line (Shown in red.)



10

 Place the previously stitched Muzzle (from Part 4) right side up, aligning nose stitch line and completely covering the muzzle placement line

**Note:** The muzzle will be larger than the placement line. It will be trimmed down at a later step.



- Tape muzzle securely in place
- Stitch **the muzzle tack-down line** (This stitch leaves an opening for stuffing Poly-fil®.)





- 12.
- Remove tape
- Using the Point 2 Point Turner carefully and lightly stuff Poly-fil® through opening left from **Direction Step 11** (Be careful not to overstuff muzzle.)



## 13.

• Tape muzzle opening closed



14.

• Stitch the muzzle final tack-down line



**Note:** Thread color should match decorative outline thread color.



## 15.

 Trim Muzzle Fabric close to the muzzle tack-down line (Shown in **black**.)



16.

• Stitch the muzzle decorative outline



**Note:** Shown in black for illustration purposes only.



Remove all water-soluble topping



18.

- Place (1) Head
   Fabric right side
   down, completely
   covering head
   and ears
- Tape in place



19.

• Stitch the final stitch outline
(This stitch leaves an opening for attaching the ears to the head and the head to the body.)



• Remove tape



20.

- Remove project from hoop
- Trim approximately ½" away from stitch line and opening (Shown in red.)

Note: Due to the stretch of the Cuddle<sup>®</sup> fabric, it won't be necessary to clip curves. If using a cotton fabric to make bear, clipping curves is recommended before turning pieces right side out.



21.


- Turn head and ears right side out
- Gently press the scallop top of the Point 2 Point Turner against the curved seams of the bear head and ears to smooth

**Note:** Do not stuff head with Poly-fil<sup>®</sup> until after the ears are attached to the head.



## **Part 6: Bear Assembly Instructions**


- Place arms and legs in the correct openings on the bear body (Shown in red.)
- Pin in place



• Change bobbin thread to match top thread




- With a sewing machine, attach arms and legs to body using a wide zig zag stitch (Shown in red.)
- Carefully stuff Poly-fil® into body



Note: The zig zag stitch will "sink into" the long fibers of the Cuddle® fabric. Check front and back of bear to make sure the seam is closed and limbs are securely attached.

- Place ears in the openings on the bear head (Shown in red.)
- Pin in place



4.

- With a sewing machine, attach ears to head using a wide zig zag stitch (Shown in red.)
- Carefully stuff Poly-fil® into head

Note: Check front and back of bear to make sure the seam is closed and ears are securely attached.


- Place head in the neck opening on the bear body
- Pin in place
- Carefully and lightly stuff Poly-fil® into the bears neck (Be careful not to overstuff.)



• Using a needle and thread, sew opening on bear neck closed (Shown in red.)
