During a heavy snowstorm, most of our resources may be spent keeping the main arteries open and your street may not be plowed until resources become available. ## **Public Works Pointers**

#### **Storm Water Pollution Prevention:**

What you can do if you see illicit discharge

Storm water runoff is any precipitation (rain, sleet, snow, or hail) that flows over land instead of seeping into the ground. In developed areas, rainwater travels over paved areas, picking up the debris from streets, and flows through storm drains. Storm water is NOT treated and can pollute rivers, streams, creeks, and lakes.



#### So what can you do about polluted runoff?

The easiest way to deal with pollution is to prevent it from happening in the first place.

- Wash the family car on the lawn, not on the road or driveway.
- Never dump anything down the storm drain! It is meant only for rainwater.
- Take a look at what your school is doing to prevent polluted runoff. Could you and your classmates do more?
- Clean up after your pet! Bring bags along when you walk your dog and encourage others to do the same
- Don't leave grass clippings and leaves in the street when you help with the yard work. Use them for fertilizer, compost them, or bag them.
- · Don't litter!

#### If you see illicit discharge

Many times people pollute water and don't know they are doing it.



## **Emergency Preparedness**

There was a Thursday last month when our first responders were really kept hopping. Lindon's great police officers were dispatched to one car accident after another, on top of their normal calls. There were no extra people and no time to spare.

Late that morning, as I replaced some used-up items in our Emergency Management trailers, I ran into one of our station's EMS personnel in the public safety building's bays. He was cleaning an ambulance between call-outs.

"Busy day!" I said.

"Crazy," he said. He told me their team had been deployed all morning and as far south as BYU because everyone everywhere was stretched so thin. "It really makes you think," he continued, "What would happen if we actually had a big event?"

"As it happens," I replied, "It's my job to think about that, and I think about it all the time."

If our normal resources can get completely tapped out on a typical Thursday, it really speaks to the fact that we need to be personally prepared as families, individuals, and businesses. It's not just about having supplies. We need to make and practice plans. We need to know what to do... and what not to do. In a big event, you may have to help yourself and help your neighbors or coworkers long before 911 can get to you.

FEMA released its annual National Preparedness Report on December 5th.

#### Here are a few interesting findings from the report:

- Cost of Disasters
  - -The cost of disasters is rising.
  - -In 2022, 18 separate U.S. disasters cost at least \$1 billion.
- Common Disasters These are the most likely disasters, nationwide:
  - -cyberattacks
  - -floods
- STRESSFUL Disasters The disasters most likely to stress or overwhelm capabilities:
  - -cyberattacks
  - -earthquakes
- Household Preparedness Gaps
  - -43% of households say they're going to prepare in the future, but they haven't started yet
  - -14% of households say they don't intend to prepare

It cannot be overestimated that **your** personal preparedness will make all the difference to your family's resiliency, and you could even save a life

## <u>Here are 12 things recommended for preparedness—</u> <u>One goal for each month of 2024!</u>

- 1. **January** Keep extra water, necessary medications, and working flashlights. These 3 things assist critical early needs in most disasters.
- 2. **February** Build an emergency kit for your vehicle. Then you have it near you no matter where you are. Don't forget to include a first aid kit and ways to keep warm during cold weather.
- 3. **March** Learn first aid, CPR, and/or other rescue techniques. Already learned? Practice your skills! Nothing beats muscle memory in a crisis! To help teach these things, we will have a **CERT class in March** (click on link to sign up.)
- 4. **April** Fill your car with gas every time it reaches half a tank. A fuel shortage after an earthquake in Utah is pretty likely. Make it a habit not to wait until you're on empty.
- 5. **May** Talk to your household. Plan together how to evacuate if you experience a house fire and how to protect yourself in an earthquake. Make a communication and a reunification plan. Get your kids involved. Write down your plans but more importantly, practice them!
- 6. **June** Prepare your home for an earthquake! Secure large furniture to studs in the wall so it won't fall. Take photos of your house and belongings for insurance purposes. Additionally, consider supporting any efforts put forward to retrofit public facilities for earthquakes, especially schools.
- 7. **July** Learn about the most common cybersecurity issues and how to avoid them. Practice good cyber hygiene!
- 8. **August** Whether it's your own business or you work for someone else, learn how to recover from an interruption of services and figure out how to take care of your assets—which includes your employees. How will you get your services back up and running? How will you recover data or equipment? We call this Continuity of Operations, and it's vital to your bottom line.
- 9. **September** Participate in the annual Lindon City Drill. Communications are always the first thing to lag or fail after a major incident, right when you need them most. Discover our Block Captain program and how to implement it in a post-earthquake response.

  10.October—Learn how to use a fire extinguisher and ... actually use one! We will have a **CERT class in October** to help with this.
- 11. **November** Become familiar with work and school emergency plans. Students will have practiced lots of safety drills recently. Ask them about their experience and find out the school's communication plan and their expectations for parents.
- 12. **December** Go through (or start building) your 72-hour emergency kit. Done and done? Then if you're shopping, consider gifts that will help a loved one be more prepared.



## LINDON'S ADU GUIDELINES

Accessory apartments, accessory dwelling units (ADUs), mother-in-law apartments, granny flats, secondary suites, or just an apartment in your basement. Whatever you prefer to call them, accessory dwelling units have been a popular solution to bring more moderate-income housing options into Utah communities. Lindon has been a long-time supporter of ADUs. Our first ADU ordinance was created in 2000, and today there are around 200+ legal accessory apartments in Lindon City.

In recent legislative sessions, new Utah state laws have been adopted to streamline the process of creating or legalizing accessory apartments. In response to these changes, Lindon has updated its accessory apartment code. Some of the changes include the elimination of impact fees for an accessory apartment, and overall reduced requirements for internal accessory apartments, including reduced required parking.

Lindon's ADU application process has been simplified, requiring less steps and focusing on promoting middle income housing.

Interested in having an ADU on your property? Lindon's planning staff have put together an accessory apartment handbook that outlines the new rules and guidelines for when you are considering legalizing or creating an internal, detached, or substantially-attached ADU. This handbook explains setbacks, utilities, and what zones allow ADUs. Please contact the Lindon City Community Development Department with any of your ADU questions.



ADUs in blue; main residence in white










## Lindon's Historical Sites



The Lindon City area was settled in 1861. Many of the first homes were built along an old wagon route between Pleasant Grove and Orem. This line of homes along the route became known as Stringtown. Mail for Pleasant Grove and Stringtown was dropped off under an old linden tree growing in the area, which provided the inspiration for the town's name. In 1889 the town applied for a post office and it was approved under the name of "Lindon." It is believed that a spelling error was made through the post office application process. The town became incorporated in 1924 and the current spelling, Lindon, was approved at the time of incorporation. The articles of incorporation, which also described the town limits, noted that the population was "458 souls", and it encompassed approximately three and one-half square miles. By 1950, the population had increased to 801 persons. By the 1960 Census, the population had increased to 1,150. In 2005, the population was estimated at 9,761. Today, Lindon's population is 12,545, and the city is 8.5 square miles.

Lindon City is rich with history. The changes over the years have been significant, but there are still historical sites within the city. In 2005, a historical guide was assembled to help guide interested residents or history buffs through some of the historical sites of Lindon City. The 2023 Lindon Historic Preservation Commission has created a link that will pull up these historical sites on a google maps walking tour. As we begin the Centennial year, take a few minutes to visit these sites and read the iconic wagon wheel signs. Learn where Lindon came from.
