SPRING IS BUDGET SEASON

Spring is here and what does that mean in the Finance Department at Lindon City? It means Budget Season!

Lindon City's fiscal year is July 1st to June 30th. The City Council adopts a budget each year before June 22nd which goes into effect on July 1st. The budget is an important document which serves as the City's financial plan and provides the guidance necessary to implement the goals and plans of the Mayor and City Council.



The Budget Process

An annual Budget Kick-off Meeting was held in February at which the Mayor, City Council and Department Heads met to discuss and brainstorm City issues. This influences the City's budget by addressing new projects and goals that stem from concerns raised by staff, Council Members and residents. These items may be immediately addressed or may need many years of planning, such as major road or utility construction projects.

Public Meetings



Department Heads submitted their budget requests last month and the City Administrator and I will meet with them to address any necessary changes. I will present budget drafts to the City Council and the public as listed to the left. These meetings and work sessions help guide the development of the City Budget through input by Department Heads and direction and prioritization from the Mayor and City Council.

The public is encouraged to participate in the budget process by attending and commenting in these public hearings.

Utah's Transcontinental Railroad 150th Celebration

150 years ago, a group of

dignitaries gathered on a dusty rise not far from the shore of the Great Salt Lake to witness a spike made of solid gold be driven into a laurel-wood railroad tie with a silver hammer. The Transcontinental Railroad was born, linking the United States from shore to shore and heralding America as a bold, innovative and forward-looking world leader.

Utah's Transcontinental Railroad 150th Celebration Commission will celebrate the 150th anniversary of the "wedding of the rails" by the driving of the Golden Spike at Promontory Summit, Utah in 1869 on the weekend of May 10 – 11, 2019. The Commission is also engaged in promoting other commemorative events and activities that inspire, unify, educate and advance the legacy of this historic moment.

In coordination, Lindon City is promoting their ties to the Railroad by inviting everyone to visit the historic Lindon Depot site (with a historical site



marker) that was located on the west side of State Street at the bottom of the Lindon Hill



which is now the new Taylor Drug in Lindon that is now open.

In participation of this historic event <u>Taylor Drug</u> will be giving away <u>free</u> popcorn and will have information available at the pharmacy on the celebration. Also, watch for Taylor Drug's grand opening celebration to be announced soon!





NOTICE: SECONDARY WATER SYSTEM ANNUAL UPDATE & WATERING RESTRICTIONS

April 2019

Dear Resident,

Spring is here and summer just around the corner! Depending on weather conditions and water availability from the canal system, Lindon City anticipates turning on the secondary water system in mid-to-late April. During that time frame, crews will be charging the secondary system and checking for leaks. Some areas of the city will be turned on sooner than others as they progress through the system.


Wise water use is always recommended to help avoid water shortages and additional watering restrictions. The Utah State University Extension Office has published information indicating that watering for longer periods with less frequency between watering will help your lawn become healthier and greener. Watering on a 3-day schedule is generally adequate for well-established lawns.

To help conserve water, please remember to turn off your automatic timers for your sprinkling systems when it is raining. In addition, please adjust your sprinkler heads to keep the water off the sidewalks and driveways. Water going down the gutter is wasted. Please help us use our water wisely by calling the Public Works offices (801-796-7954) if you happen to see a broken sprinkler head or a wayward sprinkling system.

Please remember the city's policy is *no outdoor watering between the hours of 10:00 a.m.* to 6:00 p.m. This policy is in compliance with State watering guidelines and encourages continued use of wise water practices. Studies have shown that 50% of the water used during day-time hours is lost to evaporation. Watering on an every 3rd day schedule is generally adequate for well-established lawns. The city's ordinances contain watering restrictions for drought conditions, inappropriate watering, and/or wasting water. These restrictions will be enforced. The city will make every effort to contact residents by phone and/or a door hanger when a problem exists. Voluntary cooperation will be solicited. However, if problems continue, the secondary water could be shut off at the city's valve.

Warning: The secondary water system is un-treated water from canals, ditches, and springs. Do not drink from a secondary water connection. Do not connect the secondary water system to the culinary water in any way. Cross-connections have the potential to contaminate your home drinking water and the city's culinary water system!

How I Came to Lindon...

Remember, on May 10, 2019, we will celebrate the completion of the Transcontinental railroad. Last month you read a little about the first railroad into Lindon. You can follow-up and read more in the Lindon, our town book.

In August of 1912, the plan for an electric railway was announced that would run from Salt Lake City to Provo. It was later continued from Provo to Payson. Construction began in October of 1912. It ran through all the cities along the way. By mid-July in 1915, twenty trains per day were running to and from Springville.

"The SL&U (often called the Orem Railroad) had twelve electric steel passenger cars that were sixty-one feet in length and weighed forty-three tons each. Each car seated sixty-six passengers each. The trains were capable of traveling at speeds up to sixty-five miles per hour and operated on 1500 volts D.C. the line also operated four passenger trailers, two of which were observation cars, the only ones in Utah." The cost was about one- and one-half cent per mile travelled.

"The Lindon depot was located on the west side of the road at the bottom of the Lindon Hill. This depot is remembered as being one of the nicest on the line, with its spotless wooden floors and hardwood benches. There are still many who have fond memories of the young people gathering at the depot on a Sunday afternoon for an excursion."

With the advent and availability of motorized vehicles, use of the railway declined in the late 1930's. In 1946 the service was shut down. You can still talk with those who rode the train throughout the county to visit family and friends. The tracks were later removed.

We will celebrate these memories and many more, and the railroads on May 10, 2019, from 6:00 PM until 8:00 PM at the Pioneer Park in Lindon on 100 S. 500 E. Come join with your friends and neighbors old and new.
