CITY BUDGET PROCESS

I believe the most important responsibility of the city council is the planning and approval of the city budget. A budget is prepared for each year. A great deal of effort is expended to make certain each dollar of revenue is spent wisely and to use resources efficiently. We also desire to ensure long-term financial stability and to continue to plan for, improve, and maintain the City's infrastructure.

The budget process begins in January with each department head reviewing needs in public safety, infrastructure, planning & development, and parks & recreation.

This is followed by a budget kickoff meeting with the Mayor, City Council, City Administrator and Department Heads to share thoughts and ideas regarding services, issues, and needs. Direction and guidance are given by the council to department heads.

A tentative budget is presented, reviewed and adopted in a City Council public hearing. This year the public hearing is on April 13th.

Refinements are then made to the budget as the City Administrator and Finance Director meet with department heads to discuss specific budget needs and refine department budgets based upon resources, priorities and City Council direction.

The first draft of the proposed budget is then completed and is distributed to department heads and City Council for review.

A May 4th City Council budget discussion will allow the council to provide additional direction and recommendations for City Staff to prepare a finalized proposed budget.

On May 18th the council will meet and receive input on the proposed budget from Lindon Citizens in a public hearing.

Input from the public and council are incorporated and refinements are made to finalize the budget to be presented and adopted in a final public hearing on June 15th.



CENTRAL CORRIDOR TRANSIT STUDY



Lindon is one of seven cities collaborating with UTA, UDOT, and MAG to evaluate options for faster and more frequent high-capacity transit service between Lehi and Provo. Transit is a vital part of the broader transportation network needed to accommodate growth and guide planning in Utah

County. Public input will be gathered throughout the process and will be a key component to shaping the study. **Please visit centraltransit.utah.gov to provide your feedback on 1) the purpose and need of the study and 2) the initial range of transit corridors.** The desired outcome of the study is the selection of a Preferred Alternative (transit alignment and mode) that can be advanced to a transit study process for further evaluation. 

STORMWATER

WHAT IS IT? WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

Stormwater is precipitation (from either rain or snow melt) that falls on impervious surfaces, like streets or the roof of our house, and flows over them and into storm drains that lead directly to our lakes and rivers.



Water flowing over hard surfaces picks up pollutants along the way. Common pollutants include yard waste, motor oil, leaf litter, trash and salt used during the winter. Runoff containing these pollutants and flowing into storm drains is NOT treated before flowing directly into our lakes and waterways.

YOU CAN HELP KEEP OUR WATERWAYS CLEAN BY:

- **Never pile landscaping materials in the street**
- Using de-icing products sparingly and according to manufacturer's instructions
- Clean leaves, sediment and trash out of gutters and dispose of in garden or trash.
- Apply lawn and garden chemicals sparingly and according to instructions

March Recycling Facts: Why can't glass go in my co-mingled bin?



While glass is recyclable it must be taken to a glass drop-off container. It cannot be placed into your co-mingled bin. This is because co-mingled recycling is sorted by human hands.

When glass is dropped into a recycling truck from your container it breaks and creates sharp edges that are dangerous. If you wish to recycle your glass material please take it to a drop-off location. The nearest glass container to Lindon city is behind the Pleasant Grove City office building. Approximate costs for the season is \$400.


This includes all fees and uniforms (including shoes, bag, poms, cheer suit and long sleeve).

HOW I CAME TO LINDON...

On the Stringtown Road, in the 1809's, a small butcher shop and store were established and operated by Orville Cobbley. This business was located on what is now called State Street (on the corner of 400 North). Later this establishment was purchased by James Cobbley, who built the larger brick store in 1900. This store also served as the first post office (remember that the stagecoach and Orem railroad ran along the west side on the road).

Albert L. Cullimore purchased the property in 1900 and built a larger store to the south, using the original building as a warehouse. This became known as the Cullimore Mercantile. Since both James Cobbley and A. L. Cullimore served as bishops during their years, many of the small children grew up thinking it was necessary for the bishop to own the store. The early settlers could purchase anything they needed at this typical country store.




...served as bishop during their years as store owners, many of the small children grew up thinking it was necessary for the bishop to be the owner of the store.

The early settlers could purchase anything they needed at this typical country store-- hardware, cooking utensils, clothing, and bolts of cloth, large bins of potatoes, onions, dry beans, etc., along with fresh produce brought in by farmers in trade for other necessities. Housewives came with eggs, home-churned butter, or cream to trade for other commodities. How pleased the children were if there was an extra egg in the basket that could be spent for candy dished out of shiny glass containers.
