If Not Me, Then Who?

I am so appreciative to serve as your Mayor. Lindon is a wonderful place to live, raise a family and pursue our life's ambitions. It is small, but close and big enough to have many opportunities to grow and enjoy life. We have incredible people who serve each other. We as individuals are what make a community. We share our skills and talents to enhance our quality of life. We look out for each other.

I have given some thought of what I might write that would be beneficial to each of us as citizens of Lindon. I teach a class at Utah Valley University. I have students from High School and College age and people who have returned to college after many years in the workforce or after raising their children. The class is "Principles of Leadership". They want to become a better leader and have greater influence on effecting change. Many of them feel they have very little influence and whatever they do really doesn't matter. They feel inconsequential. They as individuals can't make a difference. Well, many of us feel that way. What influence or difference can "I" really make?

I try to answer that question by giving invites to my students. My first assignment, "invite" is for each student to pick up trash and put shopping carts away before the next class period. I ask them to relate their experience and how it relates to leadership in our class discussion. It provides for a very simple experience to illustrate how we as individuals can have influence for good. It is the beginning of taking the focus off of ourselves and putting it onto others and seeing how we impact each other.

I invite them to observe the next time they attend a sporting or community event to become more aware of the arena, venue or gathering place and notice the difference of how things look before and after the event. I enjoy attending the Utah Jazz games and college sporting events. The stadiums or arena are clean and inviting before the event starts. When the game is over and people leave a transformation has taken place. The stadium or arena looks different. I invite you to make the same observation the next time you go and see what thoughts come to mind.

I invite the students to always strive to do things right and to ask themselves, "What is the right thing to do?" A leader does the right thing, whether anyone follows or not. I invite them to be a part of the solution, not just identify the problem, but find a way to resolve it. Yes, sometimes we are not in the position or have the responsibility or authority to solve the issue, but we can bring it to the attention of those who are in a position and be a means by which issues can be addressed and resolved.

I invite all of us to continue to be community minded and help each other to move forward in a positive way in addressing and finding resolutions to the challenges we all face in our community.

It's that time of year again, when we get together as a community and practice our emergency response skills. The Drill Down to Safety this year will be held on Monday, September 12th at precisely 6:00 pm. At that time we ask for everyone in the City to respond to their Block Captains home. If you will be out of town or cannot attend that evening, please let a trusted neighbor know in advance so they can report that your family is away but accounted for. In an actual event, that little notification may save hours of unnecessary resources searching to determine your condition.

Please use the opportunity to connect with your friends and neighbors and make it a fun evening! The Drill this year will be simplified and will be used to test our communication capabilities and our ability to account for each and every community member. Our goal is to work through problems and make our mistakes as we practice drill and not in the middle of an actual emergency.

Lindon City will continue to lead in the effort of personal preparedness and as a city is dedicated to promoting safety and emergency preparedness efforts among its residents. Our efforts as a community are getting attention as each year more cities come to observe us to help develop their programs. Please

participate in the drill and make this a fun event with neighbors as you practice together for that day which we all hope never comes!


“CHILD FIND” PROGRAM

The Alpine School District Department of Special Education is attempting to contact persons with disabilities between the ages of birth and twenty-one, in compliance with the Federal law, which mandates the provision of free educational programs and /or services for such persons. If a child is having significant difficulty with vision, hearing, speech, behavior, is experiencing slow development un-typical for his/her age, physical impairments, or learning difficulty, he/she may be a child with a disability.

If you know of any child whom you feel might qualify for these services, including students suspected of having a disability even though they are advancing from grade to grade, in a private school, homeless, immigrant, please contact the principal of your school or the Special Education Office of Alpine School District at 801-610- 8410. If you are the parent of the child with an IEP enrolled in a public school, we are required by Utah Code to inform you of the availability of a scholarship to attend a private school through the Carson Smith Scholarship Program. HOW I CAME TO LINDON...



My parents were Richard and June Cullimore and they lived in Lindon when I was born. My father's family came to Lindon as pioneers from England. My father always took great pride in his pioneer heritage and the fact that the Cullimore's were one of the first families to settle Lindon, along with families such as the Gillman's, Walker's, Keetch's, Bezzant's, Wadley's, Wright's, Ash's, etc. My father considered himself to be a farmer and would have been very happy to just be a farmer, if he were able to support his family. However, he worked various jobs including brick mason, truck driver, custodian, etc., to support his farming hobby and family.

Growing up in Lindon was magical because we really did know everyone in town and we also had endless open fields to run and play. There were only two wards in the LDS church when I was a child. State Street was the dividing line for the two wards. My parents did not worry about where we were or where we were going when we left the house. We were only expected to be home, on time, to eat three meals a day as a family. Friends were always welcome at our table.

When I left Lindon for school and to serve a mission for the LDS church I thought that I would make my home somewhere else. However, my love of Lindon soon kicked in and I moved back with my wife Brenda and our oldest daughter Tiffany to build our home. We had two more children, Cindy and Jordan. Their days growing up in Lindon were also magical for the same reasons as when I grew up.

I have had the privilege of serving the citizens of Lindon as a Councilman and Mayor and take great pride in being involved in efforts to maintain the great traditions and friendly atmosphere that have always existed in this special town. It was very hard to give up being involved in the political leadership when I became a judge. The tradition and practice of open spaces and large lots certainly gives Lindon a quality of life that not all cities enjoy. It also makes Lindon a great place to live and raise families.

Lindon Monthly Recycling Facts

September: Recycling Do's and Do Not's! What goes in that can?

Recycling can be confusing. Keep this list of what "can" and "cannot" be recycled in your commingled container handy. For additional information don't forget to visit the city website!

- **Do Recycle:**
 - Corrugated cardboard
 - Paperboard: food boxes, paper towel rolls, etc.
 - Paper: magazines, junk mail, office paper, phonebooks, newspaper, paper grocery bags, etc.
 - Aluminum and steel food containers
 - Plastics: milk and juice jugs, shampoo bottles, detergent bottles, etc.
- **Please do not use your Commingled Bin for these Items:**
 - Glass
 - Styrofoam
 - Food waste
 - Green waste

HELPFUL RECYCLING TIPS

- Food containers do not need to be washed thoroughly or even rinsed out. As long as food containers are scrapped clean they can be placed in your recycling bin.
- Plastic grocery bags are recyclable but are best left out of your recycling container. These light plastic bags are difficult to run through the sorting machinery at the recycling facility. Most major grocery stores (such as Smith's and Wal-Mart) provide a drop off site for used grocery bags. Please recycle your grocery bags this way.
- The garbage and recycling truck looks the same—are my materials actually being recycled? Absolutely! On occasion, a driver may service a garbage route, empty his truck, and then service recycling containers. The same truck can service both types of cans (garbage and recycling) in the same day. The loads are never mixed, however, if you do see a driver dump a garbage can and a recycling container back to back, this is likely due to contamination in the recycle container. Please remember to follow the guidelines above.
- To make sure you have enough room for recyclables in your cart, remember to break down all larger items such as boxes and even milk jugs. Taking the extra time to break down your boxes will give you added space in your container.
