 I have 29 grandchildren – that's a lot of picnic quilts.









- The pattern was originally called "Fabric Land" but I am calling it "Backwards Fabric Land" because I did the opposite version of this pattern!
- The pattern was designed by a lady named Elizabeth Dackson. I found her pattern online and really fell in love with it. Originally the pattern had a white background and black lines and that's what I switched.





Backwards "Fabric Land" – Con't

The back I designed myself using denim. I collected denim for about 6 months before I had enough different color variations to make the back look like the front. Side note, I will never cut 4.5" squares out of denim again.

Backwards "Fabric Land"

– Con't

I made this quilt for my brother for his birthday, and it took me FOREVER to get it done! There are 1,420 squares on the front and 437 on the back for a grand total of 1,857 squares! Overall, I loved doing this quilt and by far it's still one of my favorites!



This is a butterfly wall-hanging. Each block is 12". I wanted to experiment with the ruler base on my long-arm and quilt each block differently. But my long-arm was only 16", and I had trouble handling the 3rd row of 12" blocks.

- I went overboard making about 100 butterfly blocks, so plan on making 2 more large quilts from them. My little long-arm couldn't handle it, so I ended up buying a larger long-arm (used but still pricey). So, this little quilt cost me a lot but is my foray into a whole new world of quilting.

 I also designed and combined some quilting designs to make it my own. It is machine pieced with the crayon coloring and some embroidery.

I hand quilted it with an 80/20 cotton batt. I completed it on August 2, 2017. I made it for my granddaughter, and gave it to her soon after finishing it, so I never got to show it to anyone when I finished it.







Adventures with Andrew






- I had purchased these panels last year thinking I would do something with them sometime, but he told us in November that he was leaving for the Army, so my plans got ramped up quickly.
- I made this quilt for him to celebrate these friends and places.

I used the Riley Blake panels of Arches, Capital Reef, Zion, Bryce and Grand Canyon as the outside border and a large center panel of Capital Reef. We camped for years in our National Parks, so the upper part of the center panel has family pictures printed on white broadcloth and the bottom part has pictures I found on his friend's social media accounts and printed those off. (I do question Riley Blake for not making their fabric panels the same size, but that's a rant for another time!)





I surprised him with this quilt for his 34th birthday Feb 9th and he was very appreciative. He has been around my quilts long enough to appreciate the work that goes into them. He was very complimentary of the quilting by Deonn and loved the way it accented the top. He has shown it to his buddies at the Park and they all have requested quilts of their own!



▶ I did enjoy making this one. But, I do enjoy the challenge of the more complicated quilts. The quilter did a wonderful job custom quilting this small wall hanging.





Quilt 1 THE SEW MOAB BEE Barbara Spencer - Creston, Iowa

- Original design with one solitary appliquéd Bee. Is it protecting the hive?
- Small cross-hatched quilting gives texture.
- Bees are hard at work inside doing what bees do! Inspires me to have a bee skep.









Quilt 2 SUNBONNET SUE'S BEES Karen L. Chabot - Snyder, Colorado

- Sunbonnet Sue is THE fashionista!
 Does she have her own blog? Here
 she is nurturing bees by tending to
 her Bee Hive.
- Needle-turned appliqué, fusible appliqué, and embroidery detail.
- The bees appear friendly, don't they?









Quilt 3 BEES BRING BEAUTY TO LIFE Mary Hillman - Irvine, California

- This Wool appliqué quilt gives a soft texture which makes you want to touch.
- Bee buttons add a bit of cleverness.
- Painted bee fabric is a unique touch which adds depth.
- Hand embroidery and beading details throughout.









Quilt 4 TASTE OF HONEY Miri Gur - Ramat-Gan, Israel

- Fancy-cut bee fabric in a unique checkerboard design gives this quilt its visual balance.
- Zig-Zag binding finished all around.
- Diagonal quilting suggests bee flight among the neutral floral.









Quilt 5 HIVE FOR THE HONEY BEE Kathy Grossman - Moab, Utah

- Inspired by the Irish poem by William Butler Yeats, "The Lake Isle of Innisfree."
- Hand embroidered and quilted.
- Sticks and larger-than-life bees for embellishment.
- Shall we relax with a cup of tea?



The Lake Isle of Innisfree

I WILL arise and go now, and go to Innisfree,
And a small cabin build there, of clay and wattles made:
Nine bean-rows will I have there, a hive for the honeybee,
And live alone in the bee-loud glade.

Quilt 6 HONEYBEE

Judith Schonewald - Israel

- Flight of various bees encircling golden pollen using the historic hexagon block which hints of a bee hive being near.
- Pastel, variegated thread used for the quilting and binding adds to the summertime feel.
- Gold metallic, hand-sewn embellishments adds that ray of sunshine.









Quilt 7 SWEET MEMORY Maya Chaimovich - Ramat-Gan, Israel

- An explosion of flowers for the bees to feast upon!
- Multiple non-traditional fabrics used to add depth and interest.
- Are some of the bees drawn on the intricately cut fabric?
- Variegated thread quilting of full bloomed florals.









Quilt 8 SWEET HONEY - HONORABLE MENTION AWARD Jacquie Foote - Ashburn, Virginia

- Machine pieced and hand embellished using various trims, beads, and jewelry findings.
- First-time quilter who used this quilt challenge as Covid-19 isolation therapy.
- Quilt is fashioned after a Hexagon to play upon the bee's honeycomb.









Quilt 9 THE FIFTH DAY OF CREATION Dina Ben Nathan - Israel

- Life is abuzz with this paperpieced(?) quilt as bees fly to-andfro.
- A twisted Log Cabin gives the floral shape and also movement complimented by the various floral fabrics.
- A subtle pebble-like fabric reminds one of stones upon a garden path, especially since also used for the binding.



The Fifth Day

Then God said, "Let the waters abound with life, and above the earth let winged creatures fly below the firmament of the heavens." And so it was. God created the great sea monsters, all kinds of living, swimming creatures with which the waters abound and all kinds of winged birds. God saw that it was good, and God blessed them, saying. Quilt 10 SUNFLOWER & HONEYCOMB Ruth Barak - Israel

- Clever use of green tone-on-tone fabric to give depth and leafy quality.
- The bees and sunflower center are very fuzzy since they are handworked with floss and silk ribbon. Are the three-dimensional flower petals applied using the Fibonacci sequence?
- Honeycomb shows bees hard at work storing their honey for winter all stitched with variegated thread.









Quilt 11 BEEZY LISSY Judy Ball-Farber - Israel

- Symmetry gives a calmness to this quilt while the bees are singing their buzz songs.
- One side (top) is bias-bound while the other three sides are finished with a zig-zag stitch and variegated thread. Quilted by using the 'stitch in the ditch' method.
- Notice how the central strips are green floral to entice the bees and, of course, it is a sun-shiny day with that blue!









Quilt 12 BEES BETWEEN FLOWERS Nera Eshel - Israel

- An explosion of flowers where no weeds are welcomed which delights the bees.
- Can you spot the pink rose in full bloom perfection? It is shy and you get just a peek of its beauty.
- Placement of the dusky grey leaves gives the quilt its balance.
- Stitched with metallic thread on the diagonal and finished with a minute zig-zag.









Quilt 13 FLOWERS FIELD - FIRST PLACE WINNER Avigail Ben-Avi - Israel

- A profusion of three-dimensional flowers grace this quilt giving it a softness for the bees to land upon.
- Free form quilting compliments the movement of the bees as they fly from one flower to another.
- Composition is enhanced by the florals going outside the frame of the binding which leads the mind to believe that there is much more to see.









Quilt 14 FOR THE BEES Peggy Harty - Moab, Utah

- Clever use of hexagons disguised as flowers. The delicately winged bee can't resist the temptation!
- A black bead is used for the bee's eye as well as being hand stitched.
- The Trapunto method gives softness and contributes to the flowers' three-dimensional quality. Hand appliquéd and machine quilted.
- Asian-inspired fabric used for the binding pulls everything together.









Quilt 15 THE HIVE AND THE BEES Tova Waks - Israel

- There are so many bees in this quilt that I had to stop counting. Some are hidden and some are playing 'Follow the Leader!'
- Who would think that Aboriginal fabric would work?
- Hand embroidery gives central bee its happy demeanor.
- Notice the netting to simulate the hive.









Quilt 16 LET IT BEE

Shulamit Ittach - Israel

- City-scapes have their share of potted plants, and I think of water fountains and roof-top gardens, garden walls, and fences.
- Quilting is hidden by the use of 'stitching in the ditch' and following fabric design.
- The bees' antennas and feet are all machine stitched.
- Movement is provided not only by the bees but by the curly-whirly fabric and curved piecing.









Quilt 17 ONE BEE Zohra - Israel

- Now this is a bee that I would like to hang out with! She is so fashionable with her fuzzy scarf and metallic hose on her legs. She must be the QUEEN.
- Gossamer wings are made from netting and wire. Trapunto makes this bee visually important amongst the others.
- Binding is a fruit design which we would not have without the bees to pollinate.
- A splash of pink adds to this Queen's whimsy.









Quilt 18 BEE ATTACK Rachel Shaol - Israel

- The bees just can't resist these two blousy blooms!
- Opposition of colors gives a perspective of the flowers being up close ready for picture-taking.
- Hand embroidery is used for the florals and golden metallic threads to enhance the bees' golden stripes.









Quilt 19 LOVE YOUR BEES

Joan Porrance - Grand Junction, Colorado

- Fussy-cut bee fabric was shaped into hearts to state this positive message.
- The green, water-droplet fabric suggests that a spring shower has just occurred.
- Strong, vivid colors give this quilt a poster-like quality.
- Appliqué has been enhanced with outline quilting and the flower centers are embellished with French knots and beads.





Quilt 20 BEE HAPPY

Chris Lee - Grand Junction, Colorado

- The piecing on this quilt is teenytiny. Look closely to see how the checked fabric was precisely cut for the sashing.
- The Bee and sentiments are hand embroidered using 6-stranded floss to give more weight to the messages. They pop up from the base of the quilt.
- Simply bound with black fabric to enhance its graphic appeal.
- Machine pieced and hand quilted.










Quilt 21 BEE FLOWER

Petunia Marsh - Coplay, Pennsylvania

- Turquoise background fabric is the perfect setting for this summer flower which hints of a breeze making it dance.
- Iron-on appliqué is enhanced with variegated floss embroidery which gives the flower a watercolor affect.
- Green batik binding lends your thoughts to green leaves and meadow beyond.
- Outline quilting, done in grey, is the perfect foil to the mix of colors.









Quilt 22 WHAT'S THE BUZZ Sally Bradley - Kingman, Arizona

- Lots of various types of stitches with hand embroidery and machine stitching. Quilting is curved inside the hive to mimic its roundness.
- Bees are hand painted and stitched to look 'fuzzy' and threedimensional.
- Was the background quilting done with ruler work?









Quilt 23 UTAH - THE BEHIVE STATE Vonda Louthan - Moab, Utah

- The bees are buzzing all over the place in this patriotic quilt!
- Machine pieced and hand quilted to mimic the bee's flight. Notice the sweet heart motif.
- Machine embroidery proudly states how Utah loves its Bees.
- The Hive and tiny Sego Lily are needle-turned appliquéd.



Why is there a Beehive on Utah's State Flag?

It is the spirit of Industry that puts the beehive in the middle of Utah's state flag. A Bee is a symbol of industry, commerce, and hard work which was perfect for Utah, since it was so difficult to settle.

The Sego Lily is Utah's State Flower. It symbolizes Peace.







Quilt 24 - SECOND PLACE WINNER 2020 - WHEN WILL IT BEE OVER? Audrey Graham - Moab, Utah

- Montage of 2020's historic moments forest fires, environmental damage, COVID-19, emotional stress, and the loss of loved ones.
- Hope is shown through the use of seeing puffy clouds in the blue sky.
- Masks are three-dimensional with felt, ink drawing, and machine stitching enhancements.









Quilt 25 MIDNIGHT BUZZ Nancy Krieger - Moab, Utah

- Moonshine is glowing with the use of silver metallic fabric.
- All of the small bees are threedimensional and lined with a black undersides. This makes the bees appear to be flapping their wings.
- Moon Bees are made with looped, hand embroidery. It is nearly impossible to not touch these!
- Machine quilting shows off the bees' nightly activity.
- Notice the tiny, black inner border.










Quilt 26 ACTIVE PATIENCE Michelle Walker - Moab, Utah

- The bees are enjoying their snack of strawberry goodness!
- Linear design is a perfect foil for the wild strawberries' flourish.
- Machine pieced and hand quilted.
- Notice the unique corner technique of the binding.









Quilt 27 ENERGETIC EXTRACTORS Cathy Gerving - Moab, Utah

- This quilt has an engineered quality about it with the use of mixed-media, namely the different sizes of springs to lend the bees and flower breezy movement.

 Some bees are 1-1/2" above the quilt sandwich!
- The flower is English paper-pieced. Hand embroidered and hand pieced.
- Maybe we would place this vase outside since the bees are loving it so much?









Quilt 28 HOLLYHOCKS - THIRD PLACE WINNER Marian Eason - Moab, Utah

- Childhood memories of visits to Granny's house. She had Hollyhocks by her back door...and lots of bees!
- Hollyhock centers are made with French knots and the bee is buried inside gathering pollen. Gold metallic and stranded floss for embellishment.
- Back of the chair is stuffed and also 'fussy cut' which gives an inviting touch to sit and watch the Hummingbirds and smell the Wisteria.










Quilt 29 DABAR - FOLLOW THE WORD Cynthia Smith - Tucson, Arizona

- Strong Hebrew and Biblical references went into the thought process for this quilt.
- Delicately hand tied with the words hand embroidered.
 Appliquéd using a satin stitch.
- Notice how the scale of each fabric sets off the central message.







2014 Annual Themed Challenge Delicate Stitchers Quilt Guild




Delicate Stitchers...

- The Delicate Stitchers Quilt Guild, founded in Moab in 1998, has had an annual challenge show since 2002. Our first challenge was started by member Darleen Nelson on her return from a trip to Cameroon, Africa to visit her daughter. She returned with about 100 yards of fabric, and she gave each member half a yard and challenged us to make an "African" quilt.
- Nineteen years later, we still have an annual themed challenge, and we have covered a gamut of subjects. Darleen passed away about a year ago and we know she would be proud to see us carry on this tradition.
- Our "home" for the challenge shows is in the Moab Museum, recently renovated to showcase the fascinating history of the Moab Area.

Impressions of Canyonlands

2014 was the 50th anniversary of the creation of the Canyonlands National Park. A huge celebration was planned and the Guild was asked if we would use Canyonlands as the inspiration for our theme. Seventeen members completed twenty-two quilts and the reception was attended by a record crowd.

This May, we will hold our 19th annual themed challenge entitled "The Straight Skinny". All quilts must measure 12"x48". This was to have been the 2020 challenge, but was delayed a year by Covid-19.

This exhibit features quilts made by Nanette Sturgill, a long-time member of the Utah Quilt Guild and Quilters Holladay.

Nan's love of quilting forged an outlet for her creativity. Her area of expertise was in reverse appliqué, specializing in Celtic quilt designs.

The Celts were a collection of tribes with origins in central Europe who shared a similar language, religious beliefs, traditions and culture. It's believed that Celtic society started to evolve as early as 1200 B.C. The Celts migrated throughout Western Europe—including Britain, Ireland, France and Spain.


Nan's vision to modify Celtic archeological and historical designs into something that could be used in fabric provided the foundation for her motifs. That work exemplified her passion for Celtic culture and mythology. She enjoyed the stories told through these symbols and designs and her dedication inspired her to share them with us. Nan won ribbons for her quilts at the Springville Museum of Art, the Brigham City Museum of Art & History and at Quiltfest. One of her quilts is published in "500 Favorite Quilts," which was an American Quilting Society contest.
