




QUILT: RED PLAID FLANNEL 1










QUILT: DINNER PLATE DAHLIA


About this quilt: I am on a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day



About this quilt (continued): This piece faces the back of our home, featuring much landscaping done by us, a koi pond with a little stream entering into it (in Spring mallards lay eggs along the edge), fruit trees (we picked 40 pounds of cherries off of the tree in June and are about to pick peaches). Behind the viewer is a steep hillside covered with orange poppies for 2 weeks in May, the bottom of which are various veggie garden plots and more fruit trees. This piece can be either hung, used as a table runner, or placed at the bottom of a bed.

About this quilt: .: For years, I had planned to create a quilt to celebrate the centennial of the 19th Amendment which gave women in the U.S. the right to vote. In 2019, my daughter Angela gave me the book, The Woman's Hour by Elaine Weiss, which focused on suffrage in Tennessee, the final state needed for the amendment's ratification (8-18-1920) and inclusion in the U.S. Constitution (8-26-1920).

About this quilt (continued): The book was excellent and became my main source of information. I wanted a quilt that would be remind me of the struggles, the significant events, the states that ratified and when, the colors they used, and some of the individuals who worked for the women's right to vote. Many facts that I found the most interesting are machine embroidered on the quilt.

About this quilt (continued): There was so much interesting information that I ended up with details and facts on both the front and the back of the quilt. The back includes a depiction of Alice Paul's threecolor suffrage flag where she added a star each time a state ratified. The back left lists the countries which had granted voting rights to women before women in the U.S. could vote. On the right are some of the many women who were sent to jail for fighting for women's suffrage.


About this quilt: In 2018, I went to the Utah State Fair and saw a Fabric Challenge Quilt Display. I was so fascinated by it, that I went and bought piece of fabric for the 2019 Challenge right then and there. The challenge was to use some teal fabric with the theme, "Kiss and Teal" The first and last quilt I had made was in 1977 for my new baby daughter. It was simple embroidered squares with hand quilting. This was entirely different! I expect a lot from myself, so simple wasn't going to do.


About this quilt (continued): I spent 9 months chasing down ideas and techniques that could work. Finally, in July 2019, I drew up an idea for a peacock tail and started experimenting with ways to make it work. My family helped me make changes to the drawings and gave me feedback with the prototype. By Aug. 1, 2019, I hadn't started the real thing. Scared stiff, I made a deal with myself that I would do what I could whether I finished in time for the Fair or not. I had just 3 weeks to put it together.

About this quilt (continued): Working most of the days and well into the nights it was two and 1/2 weeks later and I was ready to quilt the pieced and appliqued top. I had never machine quilted before, but watched lots of YouTube. It wasn't the same. With 2 hours to go before the final deadline, I had finished the quilting - not great, but the best I could do. Finally, the binding, hanging pocket and quilt information was sewed on.

About this quilt (continued): With 30 minutes left, my sweet husband and I buzzed down to the Fair Ground and turned in the quilt. I'd done it! A friend's text came after the Fair opened with a picture of my quilt AND a Blue Ribbon. Shock. Shock and delight. Shock, delight and a new passion for quilting. I'll never be the same.




About this quilt (continued): Notice the yarn that is couched in place in the tail of the appliqued bird, and star. Also, the acrylic paint highlighting the quilting.




QUILT: O HOLY NIGHT



About this quilt (continued): It has some more painting in it's future, in addition to some "bling"! Thanks for looking!








