

Stack-n-Whack

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Per Bethany Reynolds, who designed the Stack-n-Whack technique: “Stack-n-Whack is an easy way to create quilt blocks with unique kaleidoscope designs.” In this class, you’ll learn how to properly stack and cut multiple layers of print rectangles at one time, then turn them into a unique eye-catching design. The class will also cover cutting different shapes for alternative designs.

Required Book: Magic Stack-n-Whack Quilts - 1998 Edition by Bethany Reynolds. We will be making the “60° Triangle Magic” pattern.

Supply List:

- 4 yards of one fabric with a 15” to 20” print repeat
 - Fabric must include 6 repeats of design
 - Striped fabric work with this design as well as fabrics with distinctive colors
- Sewing machine that you are familiar with. It should be clean, oiled and ready to go. Don’t forget your foot controls, plug-in cord and your machine’s Operations Manual. If you have an extension table for your machine, bring that as well. Bring the machine’s accessories that came with it, i.e. screw driver, thread spool lock, dust brush, etc.
- Good quality 50 weight 2 ply cotton thread to use in your project
- At least two bobbins, pre-filled before class
- Sewing machine needles (I typically use Topstitch needles, size 90/14)
- Fabric scissors/shears
- Cutting mat, 18” x 24” preferred
- Ruler: 6” x 24” ruler (min. size) with 60° marking on ruler. Recommended Ruler: 6 ½” x 6 ½” for cutting Block Triangles and Block Accent Triangles
- Rotary Cutter with clean sharp blade
- Marking chalk or marking pens
- Seam ripper
- Notepad/paper & pen/pencil for notes
- Several gallon size re-sealable plastic bags for your project parts, should you not finish the project during the class
