# Yakima Valley Quilters' Guild

### Pay it Forward!

There have been times in our lives that we have all had a hand up in one form or another. So what if we Pay it Forward! as one of our Guild's charity commitments? The idea behind Pay it Forward! Is that we have a monthly charity or group that we donate to. Most are ones that we already work with but we have a couple of new ones to introduce. So let's start with January and Rod's House! <a href="https://rodshouse.org/about">https://rodshouse.org/about</a>

### It started with one girl...

In the winter of 2006, a young girl entered the non-profit agency For A Better Tomorrow. She requested rubber bands so that she could tie her pant legs out of the snow. She was 14 years old, pregnant and homeless. The father of her child had left town, her mother was institutionalized for drug use and her father was dying of cancer. After this incident, concerned community members, including Rod Bryant, came to a shocking realization; there were no services in Yakima to accommodate the unique needs of youth who are experiencing homelessness. Through the combined efforts of these individuals, donations from social service agencies and countless volunteer hours, Rod's House came into being.

Now, 10 years later, Rod's House has helped 1,500+ youth and young adults through the following programs...

Not every person wants to sew for every charity that we represent and donate to, so this will give you an opportunity to find the one you might be passionate about and want to give to. What we would be looking for in January are blankets, like the throws that Fred Meyers has on sale now for \$3.99. You can find them (sometimes) at WalMart as well for around the same price. There are socks, gloves on sale all over town, warm scarves, hand and foot warmers. These are homeless kids, on the street in the dead of winter. They need everything! In addition to the clothing, they need toiletries (unused), shampoo, soap, toothpaste, toothbrushes, warm winter items and how about throwing in a can or two of soup! There is a pantry there and the kids can take lunch bags when they leave for the day so Cup of Noodles, Mac & Cheese, snack items, cases of water or vitamin water and Styrofoam meal containers. There is such a huge need and remember that Rod's House is just a day facility, the kids are out at 6:00 pm.




Please meet Ann Martinez who has created Voices For Children Foundation for abused and neglected children in Yakima County. Ann spoke at our November meeting and told us about the Buddy Bag Project, a local program that she created for children in Yakima County. What is a Buddy Bag? A Buddy Bag distributes duffels and backpacks filled with age appropriate personal and comfort items, such as baby care necessities, toys, hand made quilts, books, diapers, undergarments, alarm clocks, and school supplies to help give a child a sense

of belonging and respect at such a helpless time in their life. The key ingredient to a Buddy Bag? **A homemade quilt**. Many guild members make these smaller quilts to be donated for the Buddy Bags. Yakima County has over 700 children each year that are removed from their homes for various reasons. Their parents have been unwilling, or unable, to provide them with appropriate care, and the state has determined that remaining in their family home would put them at serious risk. They have been removed from their home, and everything they know to be put into the Foster care system. It is heartbreaking.





### **Christmas Reindeer Crack**

### So good, you won't want to share! Better make a DOUBLE batch!!

### **Ingredients:**

- 2 cups bugles
- 2 cups fritos
- 3 cups salted pretzels
- 1 cup Chex mix
- 1 cup roasted peanuts
- 1 1/2 cups M&Ms
- 1 pack of white chocolate bark or melting chocolate (Ghirardelli melting chocolate)



- 1. In a Large bowl pour your Pretzels, Fritos, Bugles, Chex Mix, Peanuts & M&M's...
- 2. Place the melting chocolate or bark in a bowl & microwave for 90 seconds. Stir and, if needed, heat an additional 15 seconds until it's smooth and creamy. watch it closely, keep stopping to stir, it burns easily if you use this way! I recommend using a double boiler, easier and you always get perfect melted chocolate.
- 3. Drizzle melted chocolate over the mixture in the bowl and mix around to coat it all.
- 4. Once fully coated, take a large cookie sheet and pour coated mixture onto the sheet and spread it out and allow to cool completely.
- 5. Once cooled, break into pieces.
- 6. Store in an air tight container- does NOT need to be refrigerated. ENJOY!

- 1/4 cup of fresh dill chopped small
- 1 small head of broccoli
- 3 large carrots
- 1 red bell pepper
- 1 yellow bell pepper
- 1 English Cucumber

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350° as directed on the crescent roll package instructions.
- 2. Spread crescent rolls across the cookie sheet covering the cookie sheet and sealing the cuts between each of the rolls.
- 3. Bake according to crescent roll package instructions.
- 4. Cool completely before adding toppings (you can also cool it and lightly cover it with a paper towel and leave on the counter top overnight).
- 5. In a medium-sized bowl, add softened cream cheese, sour cream, ranch dip and fresh dill; stir until fully mixed. Chop all veggies very small and toss them all together in a bowl.
- 6. Spread ranch dip evenly across the baked and cooled crescent roll pizza base
- 7. Add mixed veggies, cut into squares and enjoy!





### **Shoofly Quilt Block Variation**

Block finishes at 9" unfinished

Due: January 8, 2020

Fabric Colors:

Background fabric: White on white Main fabric: Multi-Tonal Pattern

CUT:

White on white: 2 ~ 4" squares AND 4 ~ 3.5" squares

Main Fabric:  $2 \sim 4$ " squares,  $1 \sim 3.5$ " squares

Sewing Directions: Mark a diagonal line on the back of the 2-4" white squares. Put right sides together on one white 4" square and one 4" main fabric square. Sew 1/4" on both sides of the marked line on the white square. Repeat for remaining 4" blocks. Cut on the diagonal line to make  $4 \sim 3.5$ " half square triangle blocks. (See photo 1) Press to the dark side. Arrange the 4 HST's with white on white background, 3.5" squares with the 3.5" main fabric in the center and the 4 HST's in each corner (See photo 2) Sew the patches together in three rows, starting with the top row, then middle, and bottom. Iron the rows toward the white squares. Sew the three rows together and iron. Next cut down the center of the block -both horizontally and vertically (See Photo 3). Rotate the upper left and lower right corners 180 degrees and sew the four squares back together in a typical 4 patch block (See photo 4) and you are DONE!!
