

- 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened
- 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 green onions, finely chopped
- 1 to 2 chipotle peppers in adobo sauce, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons lime juice
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 16 jalapeno peppers, halved lengthwise and seeded
- 1 package (17.3 ounces) frozen puff pastry, thawed and cut lengthwise into 32 strips





Witches' Fingers

- I-I/2 cups vibrant green candy coating disks
- 6 pretzel rods, broken in half
- 6 jelly beans, cut in half lengthwise
- In a microwave, melt candy coating; stir until smooth. Dip broken end of pretzel rods in coating; allow excess to drip off. Place on waxed paper; press a jelly bean half onto dipped end of each pretzel to resemble a fingernail. Let stand until almost set. Using a toothpick, make lines on each pretzel to resemble knuckles.







Nancy Roehr from O'hana shared with us how our donations have been put to good use over the past 5 years. Along with the Guild, other local community donations have helped over 100 women receive breast imaging. O'hana is fiscally responsible with the funds donated to them in that they partner with the woman in paying for her exam. Whatever the woman is unable to pay, the scholarship will pay the balance. In addition to the scholarship fund, funds have been requested to provide a breast cancer book to newly diagnosed breast cancer patients. Nancy said on average there are 150 new cases every year and this book helps the woman understand her treatment. Additionally, Nancy was gifted ice bag covers. 



LOTTO BLOCK

November 6 This makes 2 blocks Unfinished block: 7" X 7"

Cut:

One 2 1/2" WOF strip white on white

One 2 1/2" WOF strip winter green or blue

Sub cut:

2 1/2" strip into 2 1/2" x 2 1/2" pieces. (total 16 each color) Stack each set with one white and one colored fabric face together.

Cut each square in half corner to corner to make a triangle. Sew 16 triangles on the diagonal to make squares. Each square should now measure 2 1/8"

Layout squares in 4 by 4 pattern below. Sew together. When the block is sewn together it will now measure 7" X 7".

CHARITY SEWING

Kitty Cat Beds

This is a great way to use your scraps of fleece and batting. You'll need a walking foot, fleece and left over batting.

Start with two pieces of fleece rectangle or square, no smaller than 12" x 12" and no larger than 18" x 18".

Cut a piece of batting about 1" smaller all the way around than the two pieces of fleece. It needs to be smaller because if it's the same size the batting will fray out as soon as it is washed. Layer the bottom fleece, batting and then top fleece. Sew close to the edge all the way around. Next secure the smaller batting piece. You can feel the batting inside. Sew all the way around that batting area. Sew again all the way around to secure the center part of the batting. Have fun! Heart shapes look great in the middle too.
