MEETING MINUTES

April 9, 2011 Quilt Council Meeting at Santa Clarita Valley Quilt Guild

The meeting was called to order at 10 AM by Jan Steffen, who led the Pledge of Allegiance. Board members present included Pam Overton, Don Beld, Jan Steffan, Becky Miller and Patti Voyles.

The very short business portion of the meeting addressed the following items:

- 1) A vote was requested by Jan on the minutes from the last meeting as presented in the newsletter. Motion to approve made by Jean Kuper with second by Becky Miller. Approved by membership with no dissenting votes.
- 2) A vote was requested to approve the treasurer's report presented by Don Beld in hard copy format. Motion to approve made by Jean Kuper with second by Becky Miller. Approved by membership with no dissenting votes.
- 3) Mileage rates have gone up to .51 cents for 2011 in line with California State guidelines.
- 4) Jan Steffen presented information about our website. For Guilds, the newsletter is available online via email. Please check SCCQG.ORG for correctness and email her with information about which members are to receive the mailing. Jan is posting all information including notifications, quarterly meetings, quilt show data and our opportunity quilts. The opportunity quilts can be posted with a .jpeg photo. Please remember that if you are a member guild, the insurance is less expensive than what you would be able to find elsewhere. Most of our locations for both meetings and special events like the shows require insurance. Teachers who are members of the council can post information on the website. You can put photos of quilts for the classes. You need to include your email, website, lecture data and classes. You are allowed to use the guild data to email.
- 5) The host guild for "Meet the Teachers" received \$750 to cover expenses.
- 6) Pam Overton as the Insurance Coordinator

for the council stated Insurance packets are available for the treasurer and president of the guild. Facility use requests must be sent in ahead of time to allow for processing. A contract copy is required to show need.

- 7) At Road to California there was no Flyer Table this year. Carolyn Reese will allow one next year if the guilds promise to keep it neat on a daily basis.
- 8) Becky Miller reminded us that all newsletter articles must be in by June 3rd.
- 9) Jan announced a break followed by teacher presentations.

Teachers were given 3 minutes to present their materials and were taken in order around the room. Guild members were able to visit with them during break and after the meeting to pick up materials or sign contracts. There were 30 teachers available to speak and 5 additional who attended the meeting. The extra 5 included:

Leona - African Embroidery;
 Kathy – an eco-comic crafty comic;
 Rita - applique quilts;
 Cassidy - a quilt comic or how to have fun; Don Beld - civil war, the 1880's in quilts.

The meeting ended at 12:13 pm after several member announcements.

Insurance

As we noted at the April council meeting, the insurance company has changed their policy as of January 1. For any insurance certificates for "proof of insurance with additional insured" we must send the insurance carrier a copy of the fully signed contract with the facility. They need to see the a) requirement for additional insured in the contract and b) any special language that is required. If you need that kind of certificate, please forward a copy of the signed contract to me via e-mail or snail mail. I will forward that along with your insurance cert request.

As always, those of you that are responsible for requesting the insurance certs, please remember to take the time to contact your facility and understand exactly what they need. If all they need is "proof of insurance" that's easy!

Please remember that there is a 30-day cutoff. If your request comes through the website 30 days or less prior to the event, then we must charge you a RUSH fee. If you plan ahead and request the certificate with plenty of lead-time, the fee is only \$10.

Speaking of the website, please remember that sending me the info in an e-mail won't work. We must have the data entered into the request form on the website. That ensures that we have all the information that is needed and we can provide it to the insurance company in a format that is useable for them.

Policy renewal. A reminder that our policy expires each year on September 28 and renews again on September 29. That means that the certificates issued from September 29 2010 through September 28, 2011 are only good for that time period. You will need a new certificate for any meeting/workshop/event dates after September 29, 2011. To make this as easy as possible for all, I will contact you in August to confirm which certificates should renew. As a general policy, we only "renew" certificates for meeting and workshop facilities. We DO NOT renew certs for quilt shows and

special events. Please remember to respond to the e-mail promptly and let us know if we should renew your certs. If we do not receive a response, they will not be renewed. You will then have to request them and pay the certificate fee again. Responding to the e-mail helps us all. We can identify which certs to renew and which not to and we can save you the certificate fee!

We've had a number of inquiries about what is and isn't covered under our policy.

- Guild board members are covered for errors and omissions
- Guild members in general are not covered. They are considered volunteer employees. The only way to cover them would be through workmen's comp insurance. It is presumed that each member's personal liability and medical insurance will cover them.
- Speakers are not covered. They are considered employees.

We have been looking into a group medical policy (to cover medical expenses in the case of an accident at a guild meeting or function).

We hope to have more information to present in the fall.

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INTERNET BROWSING

Have you checked out the latest in quilt websites and podcasts? There are so many options in the ether world that one could just check the websites all day and never actually quilt. Some are totally free and some require membership or subscription, but the variety is tremendous.

www.quiltingboard.com is a free service offering chats, tutorials, free patterns, round robins, BOM or even BOW week. It's a fun brose.

QNNTV.com has 4 main podcast shows: **Quilty** with Mary Fons is a show for beginners with some great tips; **Quilt It** is a podcast for longarm quilters; **Quilting Celebrations** with Patrick Lose offers quilting, crafting and home décor, **Quilt Out Loud** is hosted by Jodie Barrows and Mark Lipinski offers a general overall view to today's quilting world. There are also other shows available.

American Patchwork & Quilting offers a weekly quilt magazine www.allpeoplequilt.com.

This is free but does require registration...lots of patterns, how-to's and inspiration. They also stream a live Radio show via Internet every Monday from 4-5 pm EST with older shows airing 24/7.

www.thequiltingschool.com offers online courses and lessens from the vast world of quilt teachers in your own living room on your time schedule. This one has a charge.

Still operating is Quilt University. Each month there is a chatty email newsletter and a new list of classes, teachers and topics for your pleasure. Also comes with a price tag.

For some real block fun check out www.thequilterscache.com This site offers a wonderful list, pictorial, and diagrams of some basic blocks and wildly wonderful new blocks, including some paper piecing, that are just plain fun to explore and experience with your machine and fabric. Best! It's free!

Another free-bee is www.quilt.com. A long functioning site, this offers a wonderful index of blocks and some layout designs forms that you can download and fill with your own color ways. There is also a glossary for quilt terms, mystery quilt projects, foundation patterns for paper piecing and tutorials. If you are looking for a particular pattern, published or not, try this site first. There is also a section for recipes, too.

Also, worth mentioning is www.thequiltshow.com with Alex Anderson and Ricky Tims. This is a subscriber show with guests, how-to's and lots of fun.

Google tells me there are many more sites to visit. I don't have much personal experience with too many of these forums. My friends who do have experience tell me it's fun to be able to go back to the favorite episodes, and they are able to review techniques and instructions at anytime. Just beware it's easy to lose track of the time. Have fun exploring.

As a member guild, the benefits are several.


- Receive the newsletter. Any member of the guild can now receive the newsletter by signing up.

- Receive less expensive insurance for the guild.

Those guilds that do not pay their dues are not allowed to have their quilt show posted on the SCCQG web site. The guild doesn't have access to our less expensive insurance policy. The guild has access to the newsletter online, however, the guilds are not allowed to post their opportunity quilts at the SCCQG web site nor Teachers, you have privileges too!

- You will now receive the newsletter and receive notifications.
- You are given first selection to participate in Meet the Teachers.
- Teachers may send me a photo of one quilt to show in the gallery.
- Teachers, who are members, are listed on the website with name, email, website, lecture and workshops.
- Teachers have access to the Guilds' addresses to mail information.

Teachers who are not members do not have any privilege except to sign up to receive a newsletter and read the website.
