Musician Tim O'Brien Shares DFC Memories

When <u>Swallow Hill Music</u> recently shared this April 1978 Denver Folklore Center concert calendar with Grammy winning singer-songwriter and multi-instrumentalist <u>Tim O'Brien</u>, a calendar that includes what some believe may be Tim's first solo concert, his response was "Those were some heady days, a lot of things forming."

While Tim didn't recall much about his show, he had plenty to say about many of the other artists on that calendar, including the Baby Watson Brothers, the Bluegrass Cardinals, Norman Blake, Harry Tuft and, not surprisingly, Hot Rize. "...a scene I was a small part of was bubbling and cooking."

Tim shared so many recollections from that time the folks at Swallow Hill had to blog about it. You can read more, and get a closer look at the calendar, which was designed by Bev Schware, <u>here</u>.

Staff Focus - Saul Rosenthal

"Music was imprinted in my DNA" is how Denver Folklore Center Co-Owner Saul Rosenthal describes his connection with music. Saul was born in Philadelphia, which happens to be where store founder Harry Tuft and current co-owner Claude Brachfeld were also born – they joke that to own the DFC you have to be from Philly. His introduction to music came from his mother who was a very good pianist with a wonderful singing voice. Saul began singing and playing piano (a 1934 Steinway parlor grand) at six years old, and then took classical training for 10 years. He still has the Steinway - "it's in perfect condition and my wife is now taking lessons on it."

Classical music has always been a critical part of Saul's life, especially chamber music. In 6th grade he studied Dvorak's New World Symphony, which led him to attend classical concerts. He and a friend would take the subway to the H&H

Some of the careers Saul's had over the years are: Associate Professor of Sociology at Creighton University, Regional Director at the Anti-Defamation League and President of SFR Public Relations.

Today Saul also plays the keyboard, mandolin ("enough ukulele, demonstrate to customers") and (he with harmonica studied harmonica legend Clay Kirkland at Swallow Hill). His early musician influences included the Kingston Trio, John Denver (when he was in the Chad Mitchell Trio), New Christy Minstrels, Beach Boys and the Righteous Brothers. More recently he's become a huge fan of John Gorka, the Hillbenders, Great Big Sea and local musicians Dakota Blonde, Rich Moore and Mollie O'Brien.

Saul first visited the DFC in 1993 and became an "FOH" (friend of Harry Tuft) around 2000. Later, when


Automat and put nickels into slots to get their lunch before attending the junior symphony, conducted by a young Leonard Bernstein. "My introduction to orchestra music was at the hands of one of the greatest conductors of all times."

At 16 he began playing guitar – his first was a Gibson Folk Jumbo. "It was way too big for me, but it was a cool guitar."

After moving to Chicago, Saul frequented folk music clubs and listened to Steve Goodman, Josh White, Peter Paul and Mary, Judy Collins, Joan Baez, Bob Dylan and others. "But like other musicians I had to get a day job to pay the bills and support my guitar addiction."

Harry decided to sell the store, he spoke to Saul. Harry "didn't want to turn it over to a corporate entity that didn't have at its core a respect for and a desire to continue to support the acoustic and roots community." Instead, on August 16, 2016 he sold the store to Saul (and Claude).

Harry still frequents the store and says he "couldn't be happier." Saul feels the same way. "Seeing a customer get the instrument they want and walk out with a giant smile on their face" is one of his favorite things about working at the store. That and the DFC crew. "They are all wonderful people with great expertise." As Saul says, "It's all about the people."



We Recommend... Mermaid Avenue Volume I - by Billy Bragg & Wilco

In 1992, Nora Guthrie and the Woody Guthrie Foundation commissioned British folk singer Billy Bragg to bring new life to Woody Guthrie's legacy of songs that had previously gone unrecorded and unheard for years. With over 1,000 songs and lyrics in the archives, Billy Bragg set out to create a collection that illustrated Guthrie's artful lyricism and masterful songwriting.

What initially started as a single live performance tribute concert in New York's Central Park eventually became a multi-year recording project with the help of Jeff Tweedy and his band <u>Wilco</u> as well as other notable collaborators <u>Natalie</u> <u>Merchant</u> and Corey Harris and Jay Bennet. *Mermaid Avenue Volume I* (and eventually *Volumes II and III*) helped expose new generations of people to Woodie Guthrie's work by presenting it in a contemporary folk context and is worth a listen indeed! Melodicas

The melodica (which is also called a melodion and pianica, depending on the brand) is a free-reed instrument similar to the harmonica and pump organ. It has a keyboard on top and is played by blowing air through a mouthpiece - there's the standard mouthpiece that fits into a hole in the side of the instrument, as well as a longer flexible hose mouthpiece. Pressing a key opens a hole, allowing air to flow through a reed. The keyboard usually covers two or three octaves, allowing for many musical styles and applications. These small instruments are lightweight, portable, very playable and have a loud, clear sound. The melodica is a whole lot of instrument at a very affordable price.
