Staff Focus - Angus Ogg

Angus Ogg is an Instrument Specialist at the Denver Folklore Center. He grew up in Everson, Washington playing violin and has been strumming the guitar since his early teens. While at Western Washington University, he studied music composition, classical voice and learned to play the piano.

In July 2019 Angus moved to Denver and that September began working at the store. "I found the Folklore Center shortly after moving to Denver while driving to my previous job. As it turned out, they were hiring at the time, and I jumped at the opportunity. It's the first time I've really loved what I do and have been excited to come to work every day. I've even picked up the mandolin since I've worked here."

While Angus enjoys a broad range of music, his focus is contemporary folk, modern classical/experimental and indie rock. He's also interested in DIY recording and some of the new tech computers provide to both record and make music. Angus says, "The person who made me want to pick up the guitar as a kid was David Gilmour from Pink Floyd, and the person who made me want to join choir in high school was Chris Cornell from Soundgarden."

Angus values the close-knit working environment and the friendships he's built with coworkers at the store. He loves the opportunity to learn about the instruments and new things about music in general. "The Denver Folklore Center is the best thing that's happened to me since moving to Colorado."



We Recommend... Flatt and Scruggs at Carnegie Hall

In 1963 the most popular bluegrass act of the day - Lester Flatt, Earl Scruggs and The Foggy Mountain Boys - played Carnegie Hall. This was a watershed moment for bluegrass music! It wasn't so much that sophisticated New Yorkers were finally accepting this hillbilly sound, it was that the powers that ran Carnegie Hall concluded these good old boys could make them some money. And let's face it, that's what showbiz has always been about.

This album was a recording of nearly the complete show. For folks who didn't have access to live bluegrass entertainment, this gave them a strong, delicious taste of what they were missing. It featured virtuoso playing, classic bluegrass

music, lonesome singing and even some cornball humor. It was a perfect sampler of a growing genre of music that would continue getting more popular. If you've never heard this album you would be well advised to give it a listen - go here.



Jerry Jeff Walker

Outlaw country singer and "Mr. Bojangles" songwriter Jerry Jeff Walker passed away in October at 78 years of age, after a long battle with throat cancer.

He was a member of the Greenwich Village folk scene in the 1960s and a founding member of the band Circus Maximus. In the 1970s, Walker was prominent in the hippie-country music movement in Austin, Texas, along with Willie Nelson, Ray Wylie Hubbard and Michael Martin Murphey.

Walker released his live album ¡Viva Terlingua! in 1973 – a classic to fans of outlaw country music – and had much success over the years, but "Mr. Bojangles" is the song he is best known for. First, Walker wrote and recorded it in 1968. Then the song became a hit for the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band and other artists like Bob Dylan, Dolly Parton, Nina Simone, Neil Diamond and, most notably, Sammy Davis Jr.


Blueridge Guitars Are Back!

Musician Spotlight - Arlo Guthrie

Activist, prolific songwriter, singer and master storyteller Arlo Guthrie has announced his retirement from the stage. The folk singer, famous for his classic epic-length album "Alice's Restaurant", doesn't explain exactly why he's retiring, but in a post on his website called "Gone Fishing," he says a series of health issues has made performing difficult.

Guthrie, son of folk legend Woody Guthrie writes: "It's been a great 50+ years of being a working entertainer, but I reached the difficult decision that touring and stage shows are no longer possible. I've cancelled the upcoming shows and am not accepting offers for new ones."
