Dear Partner:

Thank you for your interest in our 24th National Public Lands Day (NPLD) event in Grand County. This packet is being sent because you have participated in one or more previous events or have requested the information on our NPLD site. NPLD is **September 22, 2018** and we are hoping to recruit 200 volunteers to help “lend a hand and care for the land”.

What’s New for 2018:

This year we are celebrating the 50th anniversary of the National Trails System Act. The act was signed into law by President Lyndon B. Johnson on October 2, 1968. Today, the National Trails System (NTS) includes 11 National Scenic Trails, 19 National Historic Trails and more than 1,200 National Recreation Trails which includes 21 National Water Trails. The system is also adding the preservation and development of Rail Trails crossing rural, suburban and urban communities. These trails run through all 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. As the slogan states: Discover. Connect. Explore. So join us in our celebration and explore Grand County’s trail system.

The Town of Grand Lake was recently designated as a “Gateway Community” for the Continental Divide National Scenic Trail System (CDNST or CDT for short). The CDNST is considered one of the “Triple Crown” jewels of our national trail system. The other two being the Appalachian and the Pacific Crest National Trails. The CDNST extends 3,100 miles from Canada to Mexico and runs through various ecosystems from tundra to desert and ranges from 4,000 to 14,000 feet in elevation. This is the 40th anniversary of the CDNST and Grand Lake will be hosting our venue location at the Grand Lake Community Center. They are also one of our projects this year in honor of their Gateway Community designation for the CDNST [see project listing].

If that’s not enough celebration for you, Grand Lake will also be celebrating “Constitution Week” with guest speakers, a 5K race and other unique events commemorating the signing of our Constitution. The celebration ends on NPLD event day [September 22, 2018] with a spectacular fireworks display that you don’t want to miss. For the past two years we had success in cutting down wasted food by not providing lunches. So this year we hope to continue with that endeavor again by **NOT providing lunches**. Please make sure you bring ample food for your lunch and snacks to keep you going until you enjoy our **catered dinner**.

We also want our site to be better at conservation, and leave less of a carbon footprint. To help us, we are asking our volunteers again this year to bring along a cloth or canvas tote bag to collect our little “goodies”, a reusable water bottle and their own lunch so we can eliminate our need for plastic bags and water bottles. Please carpool wherever possible. Volunteers can seek out carpooling opportunities on our Grand County National Public Lands Day Facebook page as drivers or riders.

Additional Information

The Interagency Fee Council has once again issued a special national, interagency free coupon in appreciation to all NPLD participants. The coupon is awarded to each volunteer, 16 years or older, upon registering at any participating NPLD event site on September 22, 2018. The coupons are valid for one day of entrance or day-use fees at participating federal land management agencies where the America the Beautiful Interagency Annual Pass is accepted (a list of agencies is shown on the coupon). The coupon is not valid at any concessionaire managed sites that do not honor the Interagency Pass and cannot be used as a “discount” towards any annual or interagency pass purchase. Volunteers may use the voucher as “cash” at day-use areas having an envelope/fee tube setup where they would normally purchase a daily pass. Coupon holders may also redeem the voucher at any District office, visitor center, fee or entrance station, or by mailing the coupon to the federal land agency to exchange for a normal one day pass for their favorite area. The coupon must be used by September 28, 2019.

Please confirm ahead if you are planning on bringing a large group of 20 or more people by contacting either the USDA Forest Service (USFS), Bureau of Land Management (BLM) or Headwaters Trails Alliance (HTA) at the numbers listed below. We look forward to seeing you at one of our work sites!

Projects

Nationwide NPLD 2017 had over 200,000 participants working in 2,600 registered sites, logging in around 680,000 service hours and valued at \$18 million dollars in public land improvements. National Environmental Education Foundation (NEEF) – our main sponsor - is hoping we can top that this year. Grand County has the distinction of being NEEF's largest, longest, continuous running event. Our success is because of you and others like you who have contributed tremendous support in donating time, money, materials, labor and food every year. We have accomplished so much in 23 years with your assistance. All of us here in Grand County extend our appreciation for your continued support and hope to see you again on September 22nd for our 24th NPLD event.

One of the reasons our site is so popular is because we provide a variety of work sites to accommodate everyone's passion. This year we have four (4) project work sites. A brief description of projects is listed below. Please indicate which project stirs your interest and record it on the attached volunteer sheet [last page in packet]. **Then either mail, fax or E-mail it in to us by Thursday, September 20, 2018.** Address and fax number are on the confirmation sheet. You may still choose another project site on event day at registration, but a few of our projects have size limitations. Early confirmation helps us to plan for work crew distribution and meals.

- **Continental Divide Trail Gateway [Town of Grand Lake]:** Installing new CDT signs, staining posts, branding boardwalks, and marking crosswalks. Project will accommodate 5 to 6 volunteers. Skill rating: EASY TO MODERATE
- **East Shore Trail [NPS/HTA]:** Work will consist of trail reroutes, brushing, lopping, clearing and installing water/erosion controls. Site will accommodate 30 to 50 volunteers. Skill rating: EASY TO DIFFICULT
- **Sherman Creek Trail [USFS]:** Project will be constructing a connector trail between Illinois Pass and Gilsonite motorized trails in the Stillwater Pass Area. Work may consist of creating turnpikes, brushing, lopping, clearing, and installing water/erosion controls. Site will accommodate 35+ enthusiastic volunteers that love to get dirty! Skill Rating: MODERATE TO DIFFICULT
- **Upper Colorado River Cleanup & Argentine Trail [BLM]:** Join the BLM in the 9th Annual River Cleanup, clearing trash and debris along a 19 mile-three-section stretch of the Colorado River, beginning at Pumphouse Recreation Area to Two Rivers. All work is accessed by floating the river. Space is available for approximately 50 volunteers who do not have their own boats with pre-registration highly recommended. If you are providing your own boat, then pre-registration is not necessary. Volunteers can meet at Pumphouse Recreation Area. This is a family-friendly work site. Participants are encouraged to bring their own boats, PFDs, and/or paddles. For more information or to pre-register, contact John Monkouski at (970) 724-3040. BLM will also host a work site at Pumphouse doing routine trail maintenance along the Argentine Trail installing water/erosion controls, clearing, brushing and other maintenance. Skill rating: EASY TO MODERATE

We are expecting a large number of people participating at our work sites and it is important for everyone to do their part in preparing themselves and their gear for the day. Please read this information carefully. PLEASE NOTE: THE VENUE FOR THIS YEAR'S NPLD REGISTRATION AND VOLUNTEER APPRECIATION DINNER WILL BE HELD AT GRAND LAKE COMMUNITY CENTER (THE OLD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL). ALL VOLUNTEERS ARE REQUESTED TO MEET AGENCY PERSONNEL AT GRAND LAKE COMMUNITY CENTER ON EVENT DAY AND NOT AT SITE LOCATIONS.

Directions to Registration at the Grand Lake Community Center:

From Denver: Take I-70 west to exit 232 for US Highway 40. Proceed through Empire, Berthoud Falls, over Berthoud Pass then through the towns of Winter Park, Fraser, Tabernash and Granby. Turn right (north) onto US Hwy 34 [follow Rocky Mountain National Park signs] and travel approximately 15 miles to the Town of Grand Lake turnoff. Turn right (east) onto West Portal Road, then turn right (south) on Lake just pass the Grand Lake Fire Station. Travel approximately ¼ mile on Lake to stop sign. The community center will be on the left side at the corner. The Community Center is approximately 2.5 hours from Denver.

From Estes Park: Travel west on US Highway 34, through Big Thompson Canyon, Rocky Mountain National Park to Grand Lake. Turn east (left) onto West Portal Road then turn right (south) on Lake just pass the Grand Lake Fire Station. Travel approximately ¼ mile on Lake to stop sign. The community center will be on the left side at the corner. Driving time from Estes Park is approximately 2 hours.

Where to Stay

Due to the Constitution Week celebration in the Grand Lake area, lodging discounts will not be available for NPLD volunteers this year. To obtain lodging information please contact Grand Lake Chamber of

Campgrounds

The USFS and NPS campgrounds are usually open with reduced services and with some closures this time of year. **Timber Creek Campground** in Rocky Mountain National Park will be left open for Friday and Saturday nights. If a Park Ranger or campground host should stop by, the password for free camping is "**National Public Lands Day**". However, there will only be a few sites available and they will be on a first come, first serve, "reduced services" basis, since the regular season is over. This means that there will be no water, trash pick-up or regular toilet facility maintenance (for example, no toilet paper). Only campsite and restrooms will be provided. Campers will be responsible to "pack it in and pack it out" and be prepared with your own necessities. The gates may swing shut, but will be unlocked. Please leave gates closed so as not to invite non-NPLD participants to take camping spots free of charge. There are many other campgrounds and dispersed camping areas near this year's event sites. What You Will Be Doing

Volunteers will be divided into crews of approximately 15 people during registration, and a variety of physical tasks will be assigned. Each work site has a difficulty rating, and crew bosses will be available to describe details of the work. Safety sessions will occur before any work begins. If you are interested in off-trail work or are unable to perform physical labor, please let us know. We may have some administrative and food preparation duties available. Arrive early at registration and a coordinator will try to accommodate your volunteer preferences.

What to Wear

The work sites are in high, mountainous areas so be prepared for cold, warm, wet or dry weather!! NPLD will not be postponed or rescheduled unless weather conditions are severe. Dress in layers and avoid cotton fabrics if you can. We suggest a change of clothing for the dinner and party.



What to Bring

Rain gear (jacket, pants)

Insect repellent

Sunglasses

Long-sleeved shirt

Drinking water & sack lunch

Tote bag

Sturdy leather gloves

Sunscreen

Cap or hat

Sturdy work pants (no shorts)

Special food needs or medications (if necessary)

Sturdy work boots (no sneakers or sandals)

Safety

Safety is always our first concern. We will avoid putting you in hazardous situations, but please keep in mind our area has been decimated by a mountain pine beetle infestation. Be aware of your surroundings at all times while navigating our trails. In addition, we will have several people monitoring work throughout the day to spot and correct unsafe conditions.

The work sites are remote. All are at or above 8,500 feet in elevation. If you have a condition that restricts your activity, please let your crew boss know. There are a wide variety of tasks to be done. We will find something appropriate for you. If one of the Crew Leaders or Safety Officers feels that you are poorly equipped or are physically unsuited for arduous work, we reserve the right to ask you to perform tasks that minimize risk.

For safety and liability reasons, there are age limits for volunteers. For those over 18 years of age, your signature at the time of registration is sufficient. For those 16 to 18 years old, we need a co-signature of a parent or guardian to work on the trails. Children between the ages of 12 and 16 may accompany their parents or guardians, but must be under direct supervision and will not be covered by any of the agencies in the event of illness or incidental injury attributable to the work project. Because access and parking are limited at most work sites, all participants must ride buses or vans to their work sites, or first check with agency staff. Due to the nature of physical maintenance on the projects, we cannot assume the responsibility for children under the age of 12.

Day Care

We do not know of any Day Care Providers in the Valley that take drop-ins at this time. You can call the Winter Park/Fraser Valley Chamber of Commerce to see if they have an updated list of local babysitters at (970) 726-4118, the Colorado State Workforce Center at (970) 887-1857 or post an ad on Grand County Online Garage Sale.



Other Information

Please leave your pets, horses, llamas or other animals at home for the day. Pets may create unsafe conditions at the work sites distracting the participants, and may not be welcome by other volunteers. In addition, please leave skateboards, roller blades and other recreational equipment at home, hotel or campsite. Even though it is fun to “play” during lunch with this equipment, the use also creates a safety hazard in some areas.

The Forest Service, National Park Service, Bureau of Land Management, Headwaters Trails Alliance and other partners will supply you with tools, hard hats, goggles, and other protective gear depending on your trail work duties.

Only breakfast and dinner will be provided by several of our generous sponsors and partners. **Please bring your own sack lunch.**

Please be on time! We cannot detain buses/vans and other crews while waiting for late arrivals. If you are unavoidably delayed, there will be someone at the registration area who can assist you and make sure you get to a work site, but you may not have a choice of location. There is not enough space at the trailheads for volunteers to drive their personal vehicles to the work sites.

Thanks to all of our 100+ local contributors who help make our NPLD event possible. Without your generous donations our NPLD event would not be as successful. Volunteers please visit our local shops and restaurants and thank them for their continued support in protecting our public lands.
