## Notes Before You Begin

- Read through all of the instructions before beginning.
- All of the seam allowances are 1/4" unless otherwise noted.
- Press seam allowances open unless otherwise noted.
- Width of fabric (WOF) is equal to at least $42^{\prime \prime}$ wide.
- Right sides together has been abbreviated to RST.
- Remember to measure twice and cut once!


## Cutting Instructions

## From each of Fabrics A-T, cut:

one 8" x WOF strip. Subcut: one 8 " $\times 10-1 / 2$ " rectangle
Trim the remainder of the strip to $5-1 / 2$ " wide, then subcut:
two 5-1/2" $\times 3^{\prime \prime}$ rectangles for the flying geese
two 5-1/2" squares
Trim the remainder of the strip to 3 " wide, then subcut:
four 3 " squares for the flying geese
From the Binding Fabric, cut:
five 2-1/2" x WOF strips

## Assemble the Blocks

In order to best match the hearts with their background fabrics, it is advised to make each block one at a time, or to stack each of the cut pieces in twenty separate stacks by block before doing any assembly line sewing.

The block fabric pairs are as follows. Each block contains:
one $10-1 / 2$ " $\times 8$ " rectangle and two $5-1 / 2$ " $\times 3$ " rectangles of the "heart" fabric two $5-1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ squares and four 3 " squares of the background fabric
The "Heart" fabric is listed first and the background fabric is listed second.
Block 1: Fabrics E \& A
Block 2: Fabrics D \& S
Block 3: Fabrics C \& P
Block 4: Fabrics O \& F
Block 5: Fabrics R \& H
Block 6: Fabrics T \& B
Block 7: Fabrics K \& L
Block 8: Fabrics J \& R
Block 9: Fabrics B \& C
Block 10: Fabrics M \& E
Block 11: Fabrics I \& G
Block 12: Fabrics F \& D
Block 13: Fabrics G \& I
Block 14: Fabrics N \& O
Block 15: Fabrics Q \& T
Block 16: Fabrics P \& M
Block 17: Fabrics L \& K
Block 18: Fabrics H \& J
Block 19: Fabrics A \& N
Block 20: Fabrics S \& Q

The following steps are specific to Block 1, however the same process is also used for each of the remaining blocks.

Step 1: Place a $3^{\prime \prime}$ Fabric A square RST at one end of a $5-1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 3^{\prime \prime}$ Fabric E rectangle. Mark a diagonal line on the wrong side of the square, as shown. Sew on the marked line and trim away the excess fabric, leaving a $1 / 4$ " seam allowance. Press toward the triangle.


Step 2: Repeat Step 1 at the remaining end of the rectangle. The resulting flying geese block should measure 5-1/2" x 3". Repeat to make a second flying geese unit.


Step 3: Sew the two flying geese units together along one short side. Press.

Step 4: Place a 5-1/2" Fabric A square RST in the lower left corner of the 10-1/2" x $8^{\prime \prime}$ Fabric
 E rectangle. Mark a diagonal line on the wrong side of the square, as shown. Sew on the marked line and trim away the excess fabric, leaving a $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ seam allowance. Press toward the triangle.


Step 5: Repeat Step 4 in the lower right corner of the Fabric E rectangle. The resulting block should measure 10-1/2" x 8".


Step 6: Sew the flying geese pair from Step 3 to the top of the block. Press. The block should measure 10-1/2" square.


Repeat Steps 1-6 for each of the remaining pairs of heart and background fabrics to make a total of twenty blocks.

## Assemble the Quilt



Step 7: Arrange the blocks into five rows of four blocks. Note the fabric placement in the Quilt Assembly Diagram.

Step 8: Sew the blocks together to form rows. Press the rows to the left in the odd numbered rows and to the right in the even numbered rows.

Step 9: Sew the rows together to form the quilt center. Press the row seams open.
Your quilt top is complete! Baste, quilt, bind and enjoy!

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
